

Ending HIV Together

Priority Population: Transgender People

Michigan's Equitable Plan has an ambitious goal of **reducing new HIV infections by 90% by 2030**. To meet this goal and improve health care for all people, health care systems need to address disparities by prioritizing disproportionately impacted groups, such as transgender people.

Transgender people had a new HIV diagnosis rate of more than double the state average from 2021 - 2023. This disproportionate impact is driven by historic and systemic discrimination in our health systems.

Goal One: Increase HIV Testing

615

The state tested 615 transgender people for HIV in 2022. This **represented 2% of all 2022 tests funded by the state.**

How does Michigan's Equitable Plan seek to achieve these goals and reduce disparities for transgender people?

Funding HIV testing, PrEP navigation and HIV care service initiatives at LGBTQ+ community centers, mobile health clinics, and housing developments.

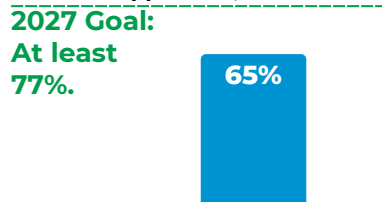
Leveraging trainings and policy to ensure providers of HIV care are prioritizing creating non-stigmatizing patient experience for transgender people.

Offering tailored trainings, services and data collection to improve and understand PrEP uptake and barriers among the transgender population.

Goal Two: Improve Viral Suppression Rates

Transgender people have **lower rates of viral suppression** than other priority populations. Michigan has further to go to ensure they achieve the 2027 goal.

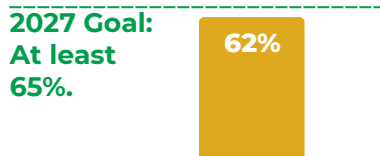
Percentage of Transgender People with HIV Currently Virally Suppressed, 2022



Goal Three: Increase PrEP Referrals

Due to data limitations some transgender people who do not receive a pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) referral **may be undercounted**, potentially inflating this rate.
