

# ✓ What are SSPs?

**Syringe services programs**, also known as SSPs, are community-based programs that provide comprehensive harm reduction services.



SSPs provide a variety of services.



Access to free sterile needles and syringes



Safe disposal of needles and syringes



HIV and hepatitis testing and linkage to treatment



Hepatitis A and B vaccination



Overdose treatment and education

## SSPs also provide:

- ✓ Referral to mental health services.
- ✓ Referral to substance use disorder treatment.
- ✓ Other tools to prevent HIV and hepatitis, including counseling, condoms, and PrEP (a medicine to prevent HIV).

SSPs are an effective public health strategy.

SSPs reduce needlestick injuries among first responders and the public.



- ✓ SSPs provide safe disposal sites for the collection of used syringes.
- ✓ SSPs reduce the number of improperly discarded syringes.
- ✓ SSPs reduce the danger of needlestick injuries to public safety workers and the public.



A study of Connecticut police officers found that needlestick injuries were reduced by **two-thirds** after implementing SSPs.<sup>1</sup>

After the implementation of a SSP in Portland, Oregon, research demonstrated a nearly

**66% decrease**

in the number of improperly discarded syringes.<sup>2</sup>

SSPs reduce new HIV and viral hepatitis infections and save health care dollars.



- ✓ SSPs serve as an entry to other health services, including HIV and viral hepatitis testing, and hepatitis A and B vaccination.
- ✓ SSPs decrease the sharing of syringes and injection equipment by providing clients sterile syringes to inject drugs.
- ✓ SSPs provide education about safer injection practices.
- ✓ SSPs link clients into care and treatment.

New HIV infections have declined by

**80 percent**

among persons who inject drugs since the implementation of SSPs in the late 1980s.<sup>3</sup>

Estimated lifetime cost of treating one person living with HIV

**> \$400,000**<sup>4</sup>



Testing linked to HCV treatment can save an estimated **320,000 lives.**<sup>4</sup>

SSPs increase entry into substance use disorder treatment and reduce overdoses.



- ✓ SSPs can provide clients with referrals to treatment or local recovery programs.
- ✓ SSPs educate clients how to prevent and respond to drug overdoses.
- ✓ SSPs teach clients how to use naloxone, a medication used to reverse overdoses.



SSP clients are **5 times**

more likely to enter a drug treatment program than non-clients.<sup>5</sup>

SSPs do not increase drug use or crime.<sup>4</sup>
