

State Infrastructure Bank

Annual Report - Fiscal Year 2022

The SIB was created under the National Highway System Designation Act of 1995 to provide loans to public and private entities for eligible transportation improvements. Administered by the Office of Economic Development (OED), the SIB complements traditional funding techniques and serves as a useful tool to meet urgent project financing demands, stretching federal, state, and local dollars. These loans allow eligible applicants to close financing gaps, expand project scopes, improve safety, avoid cost increases, and reduce construction period disruptions through project acceleration.

PA 166 of 2022 Section 313(3)

(1) From funds appropriated in part 1, the department may increase a state infrastructure bank program and grant or loan funds in accordance with regulations of the state infrastructure bank program of the United States Department of Transportation. The state infrastructure bank is to be administered by the department for the purpose of providing a revolving, self-sustaining resource for financing transportation infrastructure projects.

(2) In addition to funds provided in subsection (1), money received by the state as federal grants, repayment of state infrastructure bank loans, or other reimbursement or revenue received by the state as a result of projects funded by the program and interest earned on that money shall be deposited in the revolving state infrastructure bank fund and shall be available for transportation infrastructure projects. At the close of the fiscal year, any unencumbered funds remaining in the state infrastructure bank fund shall remain in the fund and be carried forward into the succeeding fiscal year. The department must obtain approval of both the house of representatives and the senate prior to increasing a state infrastructure bank program.

(3) The department shall submit a report to the state budget director, the house and senate appropriations

subcommittees on transportation, and the house and senate fiscal agencies on the status of the state infrastructure bank. The report shall be submitted on or before December 1, 2022. The report shall include all of the following:

- (a) The balance in the state infrastructure bank at September 30, 2022, including a breakdown of the balance by cash and cash equivalents, outstanding loans, and balance available for loan to local agencies.
- (b) A breakdown of the state infrastructure loan balance by amounts designated

as originating from federal sources and the amounts originating from nonfederal sources.

(c) A list of outstanding loans by agency, original loan amount, project description, loan term, and amount outstanding.
