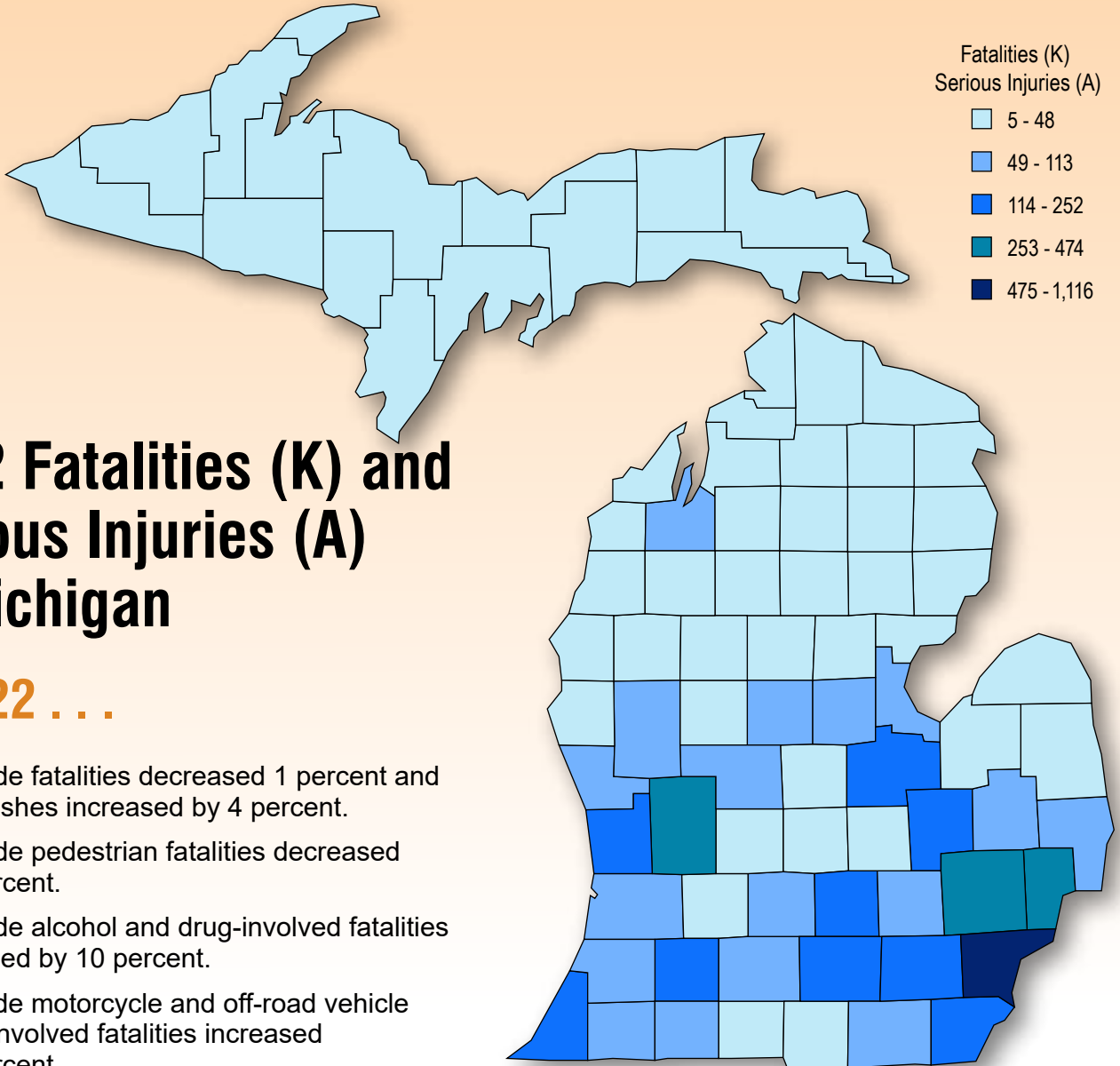

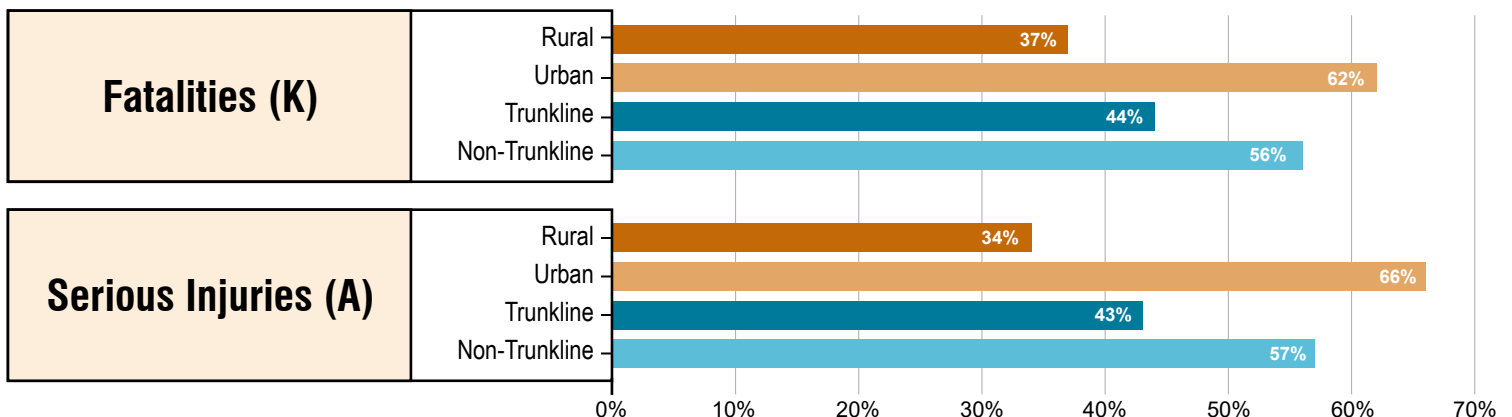

2022 Fatalities (K) and Serious Injuries (A) in Michigan

In 2022 . . .

- Statewide fatalities decreased 1 percent and total crashes increased by 4 percent.
- Statewide pedestrian fatalities decreased by 5 percent.
- Statewide alcohol and drug-involved fatalities decreased by 10 percent.
- Statewide motorcycle and off-road vehicle (ORV)-involved fatalities increased by 4 percent.



What Can You Do to Help Move Michigan Toward Zero Deaths?

2022 Michigan Facts



- 22 percent of driver/passenger fatalities did not involve the use of restraints in either the front or rear seats.
- Just 92 percent of occupants use proper restraints.
- For every 1 percent increase in the use of proper restraints, 10 fewer traffic fatalities and 100 fewer serious injuries occur.
- Buckle up, it could save your life.



- A driver was using a phone in 48 percent of rear-end crashes.
- When driving, put your phone out of reach and turn the sound off.
- In Michigan, it is illegal to manually use a cell phone while operating a vehicle.
- #JustDrive and #PhoneDown.



- 72 percent of single motor vehicle crashes were associated with speeding.
- Excessive speed was a factor in 20 percent of all fatalities.
- Slow down, speed kills.



- Alcohol was involved in 48 percent of the fatal drug-involved crashes.
- Of the total fatal crashes, 29 percent were alcohol-involved and 22 percent were drug-involved.
- 62 percent of the alcohol-involved fatal crashes involved one vehicle, a 14 percent decrease from last year.
- Drive sober or get pulled over.
