### **What Critter is This? Contributions of Zooarchaeology to Michigan Archaeology**

Presenter: Terrance J. Martin, Emeritus Curator of Anthropology, Illinois State Museum

Zooarchaeology is the study of animal remains from archaeological sites to learn about natural history, foodways and cuisine of the past. Zooarchaeologist Terrance Martin presents workshops for students, life-long learners and archaeological volunteers to help them identify animal bones and understand their importance to site collections and interdisciplinary research. In this presentation, his examples will draw primarily from the Fort St. Joseph Archaeological Project, which celebrated its 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 2023 and is a collaboration between Western Michigan University and the City of Niles, Michigan.

### **The Real Red Tails: National Geographic Documentary and Q&A**

What do you know about the story of Tuskegee Airman pilot Second Lieutenant Frank H. Moody? A new National Geographic documentary, *The Real Red Tails*, details the discovery of his plane in Lake Huron. This one-hour special takes viewers on a journey to uncover the mystery of how and why Lt. Moody's plane went down in 1944. Watch as teams of underwater archeologists recover parts of the airplane, hear firsthand accounts from fellow Tuskegee Airmen, and view underwater footage from the bottom of Lake Huron. This documentary will be followed by Q&A with project archaeologist Wayne Lusardi. Prepare for an immersive experience as we learn about the heroic and pathbreaking Tuskegee Airmen in Michigan.

## What is it? How old is it? Is it important? Have an artifact that you want to know more about?

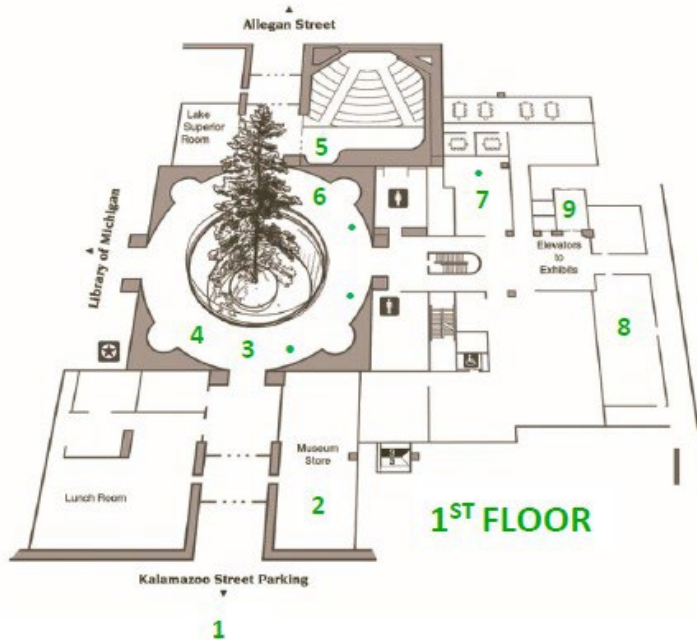

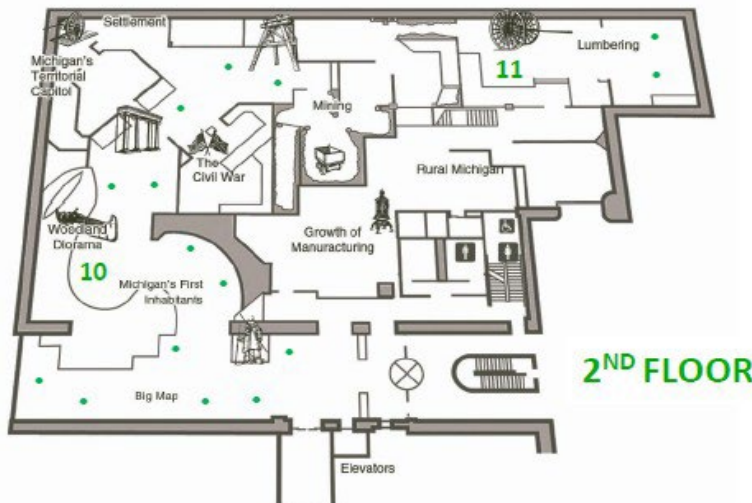
Peter Rose, DNR Office of Minerals Management Geologist, has expertise in Michigan geology and mineral resources as well as in the field of paleontology.
