HISTORY OF THE MICRC



- In 2018, Michigan voters passed Proposal 2, a ballot initiative, for voters and not legislators to take responsibility for nonpartisan redistricting and created the Michigan Independent Citizens Redistricting Commission (MICRC).
- Comprised of 13 randomly selected Michigan residents that includes four Democrats, five Independents, and four Republicans.
- The MICRC is responsible for redistricting the U.S.
 Congressional, Michigan House, and Michigan Senate districts.

- West Michigan—23.8 percent
 - Commissioners Lange and Orton

KEY ELEMENTS OF PROP 2018-2



- Placed responsibility for citizens and not legislators to draw the maps.
- Changed from Apol Standards to the Seven Ranked Redistricting Criteria.
- Openness—All meetings live streamed and online
- Transparency—Subsection 11
- Public Engagement—Public Hearings and Outreach

KEY FINDINGS



- The two strongest testing facts emphasized map fairness and public feedback
- No unfair advantage, citizen input, and transparency are key messages that resonate with voters
- News stories and website most likely avenues for engagement
- 48.2 percent believe participation will have an impact

STRATEGIC PLAN



Mission: Lead Michigan's redistricting process to assure Michigan's Congressional, State Senate, and State House district lines are drawn fairly in a citizen-led, transparent process, meeting Constitutional mandates.

Vision: Chart a positive course for elections based on fair maps for Michigan today and for the future.

Core Values: Integrity—Respect—Transparency—Purposeful

FAIRNESS



- Ensure fairness in the redistricting process.
 - Share the process for adopting maps.
 - Mapping Policies and Procedures
 - Redistricting 201
 - Reference how public comments influenced the mapping process.
 - Took Commission meetings on the road to Benton Harbor,
 Traverse City, and University communities

AWARENESS



- Heighten awareness in the redistricting process.
 - Distributed 145,788 informational postcards in predominantly rural areas and the Downriver Community.
 - Ran television ads in Northern Michigan, Upper Peninsula, and Michiganders whose media market includes Indiana, Ohio, and Wisconsin.
 - Paid for statewide radio ads and newspaper ads

TRANSPARENCY



- Model transparency in the redistricting process.
 - Continue to show how public comments, maps, and Communities of interest are incorporated into the mapping process.
 - Enable residents to comment directly on the mapping portal.
 - Ensure the website is user-friendly.

ENGAGEMENT

- MICHIGAN INDEPENDENT CITIZENS REDISTRICTING COMMISSION
- Increase engagement in the redistricting process.
 - Created promotional materials and videos.
 - Provided more than 200 outreach presentations across the state.
 - Obtained 21,753 public comments.
 - In-Person—1950 public comments
 - Mail/Email—872 public comments
 - Remote—1107 public comments
 - Public Comment Portal—7028 public comments
 - Mapping Portal—10,796 public comments
