

## Evaluation Objectives & Questions

- ✓ To examine how transitions for MIHP enrolled families take place.
- ✓ To describe how MIHP programs support families through transitions, to what extent these hand-offs meet the needs of families, and how MIHP and the early childhood system could better support families through this transition.

## Evaluation Objectives & Questions

- Objective 1: Identify existing statewide and local guidance and preparation intended to shape the process of successful transition of families out of MIHP.
- Objective 2: Explore existing statewide, local, and home visitorlevel connections to other home visiting programs and other supports/services; and the extent to which these promote successful transition of families out of MIHP.
- Objective 3: Explore the various process(es) through which families are currently transitioned out of the MIHP program.

## Evaluation Objectives & Questions

- Objective 4: Identify what works well and what does not work well in transitions out of the MIHP program.
- Objective 5: Identify other state and local barriers and supports that influence transitions out of the program.
- Objective 6: Identify opportunities through which MIHP programs could better support families through transition processes.

# Stakeholder Engagement & Data Collection Plans

#### Ten MIHP local programs act as "case study" sites for this initiative.

- operate in different regions of the state, where there are differing numbers and types of other home visiting and early childhood programs.
- with differing levels of connection and collaboration with their local early childhood systems, as well as culturally specific organizations.

Method 1: Key Informant Interviews with MDHHS

Method 3: Focus Groups with MIHP Home Visitors

Early June 2021

Method 4: Focus Groups with MIHP Families

Mid – June 2021

Method 5: Survey with MIHP Families

July 2021
