




Explore the map - Climate & Economic Justice Screening Tool (geoplatform.gov)

The Climate and Economic Justice Screening Tool is the White-House sanctioned tool for identifying disadvantaged communities. Typing in an address will show whether that census tract meets at least one of the burden thresholds (categories) and the associated socioeconomic threshold.



Enter the address and click anywhere on the map that appears. Please refer to the next pages for screen shots showing whether the area is designated as disadvantaged or non-disadvantaged. The disadvantaged categories are highlighted in blue. The four categories considered for this application are: Housing, Health, Legacy Pollution, and Water and Waste Water.


For this grant, the district/child care center will use the MiEJScreen Web Map. Typing in an address will show which percentile range the district/child care center falls within. If a district falls within more than one percentile range, select the highest range/number. If a district/child care center does not meet one of the provided percentile ranges, the district/child care center does not meet the Environmental Justice Parameters.








Click on the map for the MIEJ score box to pop up.

Small Area Income and Poverty Estimates (SAIPE) Program (census.gov)


Click on the *Income and Poverty Interactive Tool*. On the top left filter by *School District,* type the District Name in the pop-up box. Click the district box and then click *OK*. Hover the mouse over the map to show the estimated district percentage. If the district/child care center has an estimate of at least 14.5%, the district will meet one of the four scoring categories for SAIPE. If the Elementary/Unified located just above the map is blue, click on the three dots with three lines icon at the bottom left of the map. This will show the percentage ranges and associated colors.




In a rural area defined by locale codes "43-Rural Remote" and "42-Rural:Distant" EDGE Home Page
