WHAT IS STEP?

Thank you for your interest in the Student Tools for Emergency Planning (STEP) program. Emergencies can strike without warning. These events can be frightening for adults, but they can be traumatic for children who may not know what to do.

The STEP program teaches students strategies they can implement at home to prepare for emergencies. Equipping students with this knowledge can lessen the anxiety they feel during disasters, give them a sense of control in a disaster situation and could save their lives.

STEP has three main learning objectives:

- 1. Students will learn about the disasters, emergencies and hazards common in their community and strategies to appropriately react to those situations.
- 2. Students will learn how they and their family can assemble emergency preparedness kits.
- 3. Students will learn to create a family communications plan.

Developed by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), Michigan began to offer the STEP program in 2011. Since then, more than 40,000 Michigan fifth-graders have completed the STEP curriculum. If you choose to sponsor the STEP program, you will help to build a more resilient state by ensuring Michigan's children will receive this valuable training and a starter preparedness kit.

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Michigan STEP Program 2020-2021

Michigan is once again offering the free STEP program to fifth grade classes with the goal of teaching emergency preparedness to more than 10,000 students statewide.




- All fifth grade classes in Michigan are eligible to participate in the STEP program, with the requirement that all fifthgraders in the school must participate.
- Getting involved is as simple as submitting an application to the Michigan State Police by Friday, November 13, 2020.
- Teachers or administrators may apply to participate in the STEP program on behalf of their school, although an administrator will have to approve participation in the program.
- Participating school shall complete at least one hour of curriculum.
- Selection of school participants will be made by late November.
- Once selected, STEP materials will be shipped to schools by the end of January.
- Instruction of the STEP curriculum and completion of the evaluation must be completed by June 4, 2021.



State Police Offers Emergency Preparedness Program to Michigan's Fifth-Grade Students

FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE: November 27, 2018

LANSING, MICH. The Michigan State Police, Emergency Management and Homeland Security Division (MSP/EMHSD) in partnership with (sponsor) is offering elementary schools across Michigan the opportunity to enroll their fifth-graders in a national emergency preparedness program that teaches students how to prepare for tornadoes, storms, flooding and other emergencies.

The Student Tools for Emergency Planning (STEP) program provides teachers with a complete curriculum and emergency preparedness materials at no cost to the school. Materials include instructor guides, student handouts and starter emergency supply kits for each student.

"The STEP program equips participating fifth-graders with important and potentially lifesaving knowledge about emergency preparedness," said Capt. Emmitt McGowan, Deputy State Director of Emergency Management and Homeland Security and commander of the MSP/EMHSD. "Educating students before disaster strikes means they will be better prepared in an emergency."

The basic lesson includes one hour of instruction, but instructors have the option to expand the lessons to include eight hours of material. STEP curriculum can be taught by teachers, school officials, first responders or volunteers.

Interested schools should fill out the Application and Acceptance form at www.michigan.gov/step and submit it via mail, email or fax by Dec. 7, 2018.

Last year, teachers from 135 schools statewide signed up to participate in the STEP program and taught the curriculum to more than 8,600 students. This year, Michigan's emergency management professionals hope to educate at least 10,000 fifth-graders statewide.

STEP is sponsored by the MSP/EMHSD and the Federal Emergency Management Agency. It is funded by a grant from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security.

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The Michigan State Police, Emergency Management and Homeland Security Division is responsible for coordinating state and federal resources to assist local government in response and relief activities in the event of an emergency or disaster, as well as coordinating homeland security initiatives and various federal grants.
