Welcome

Mr. Kevin Collins called the meeting to order. Board members and public attendees introduced themselves.

Last Meeting Minutes Approval

Motion: To approve previous meeting minutes (Mr. David Russell).

Support: Lt. Col. Kelenske.

Motion passed unanimously. Last meeting minutes approved.

Approval of Agenda

Legislative Update (Trooper Droste)

Based on notes provided by Trooper Droste after the meeting.

HB 4705 – Open Meetings; Requires sound recordings of public meetings of state public bodies.

- 4/19/2022: Presented to Governor

Package: HB 5274 – 5280 - Child Abuse, Child Protection Law

- 8/18/2021: Introduced
 - 4/28/2022: Presented to Governor
- HB 5274 – Modifies procedure to amend or expunge inaccurate report of child abuse or neglect.
HB 5275 – Creates and maintains statewide electronic case management system for child abuse and child neglect cases.
HB 5276 – Provides identification of certain child abuse and neglect claims that require listing in the central registry.
HB 5277 – Modifies definitions for certain child abuse or neglect claims that require listing in the central registry.
HB 5278 – Modifies release of certain information regarding child abuse or neglect claims that require listing in the central registry.
HB 5279 – Updates citation to the child protection law.
HB 5280 – Defines “severe physical injury.”

House Bill 5368 – Court Records: Requires that defendants name and date of birth not be redacted from a court record.

- 11/4/2021: Referred to Senate Judiciary and Public Safety

House Bill 4701 – Oral Fluid: Permits the use of “other bodily fluid” as preliminary chemical test for operating while intoxicated.

- 1/25/2022: HB received hearing in House Judiciary

Package: HB 5912 – 5920 – Criminal Procedure; Records; Expunction

- 3/16/2022: Introduced, referred to Judiciary Committee
- HB 5912 – Modifies time period after certain events applicant must wait to petition to set aside a conviction **just clarifies calculation
HB 5913 – Amends reference to arrest records on internet criminal history access tool to reflect prohibition on publication.
HB 5914 – Prohibits employers and labor organizations from requesting or maintaining a record of certain criminal history information about a job applicant or employee (no convictions, set asides, HYTA trainee status).
HB 5915 – Requires information regarding crimes eligible for expungement to be given at sentencing.
HB 5916 – Requires AG to provide notice of automatic expungement to individual.
HB 5917 – Prohibits publication of arrest records on internet criminal history access tool before conviction.
HB 5918 – Requires private background check agencies and employers that prepare background check reports to use current information.
HB 5919 – Amends biometric data collection act to reflect prohibition on publication reference to arrest records on internet criminal history access tool.
HB 5920 – Prohibits request for information from prospective tenants regarding certain juvenile records.

CJI Access Criteria

Mr. Collins updated the Board on recent efforts to formalize and provide more clarity to the CJI access appeals process. Mr. Wilson stated that legislation passed in 2018 allows the MDOC to hire individuals with a felony conviction. MDOC currently has 19 appeals pending to send to MSP but would like criteria, guidelines etc. Members of CJIC have reached out to other states to compare criteria, guidelines, etc. and have found that each state handles them differently. Undersheriff Dewitt agreed the criteria should consider the type of crime. Lt. Col. Kelenske expressed his concerns about the pattern of crimes committed by an individual and ensuring someone does not misuse the systems/data.

Motion: CJIC to put together a committee to gather input and formalize the appeals criteria (Lt. Col. Kelenske).

Support: Undersheriff Chuck Dewitt

Motion passed unanimously.

Biometrics and Identification Division

Mr. Scott Blanchard, Manager, Automated Print Identification Section, gave a presentation on AFIS, Mobile ID, IRIS and other systems used in BID.

Board Round Table

Ms. Peggy Hines: The Michigan Automobile Dealers Association advised the MDOS about legislation requiring law enforcement agencies to provide a 48-hour notice before for dealership inspections. MDOS does not support and will continue to monitor.

Lt. Col. Kelenske: MSP has been receiving a lot of calls about electronic license plates. Ms. Hines advised the MDOS and the vendor are going through the process of developing a MOU/MOA. Once finalized, MDOS will make proper notifications.

Ms. Bobbi Morrow: The SCAO is concerned about the set-aside process for courts. The process will require manual entry by court staff, causing a delay in processing. Courts are concerned they may not be able to keep up with demand.
