Assault Offenses: Non-Aggravated, Aggravated, Non-Fatal Shooting

An assault is defined as an unlawful physical attack by one person upon another. The differences between Non-Aggravated, Aggravated, and Non-Fatal Shooting offenses in MICR, are as follows:

13001 – Non-Aggravated

- The offender does not display a weapon AND
- The victim has no injury OR an apparent minor injury

13002 – Aggravated

- The offender uses a dangerous weapon OR
- The offender displays a dangerous weapon in a threatening manner OR
- The victim suffers obvious severe or aggravated bodily injury

13004 – Non-Fatal Shooting

- The offender discharges a firearm AND
- The victim suffers an injury due to the bullet penetrating the body

13004	11 /11A (Firearm, unknown/Automatic) 12 /12A (Handgun/Automatic) 13 /13A (Rifle/Automatic) 14 /14A (Shotgun/Automatic) 15 /15A (Other Firearm/Automatic)	All except F (Fatal) and N (None)

Law Enforcement Officers Killed or Assaulted (LEOKA)

If a police officer is the Victim of an Assault, the following is REQUIRED:

- Hour cannot be unknown
- Victim Type must be “Police”
- Age (cannot be less than 18 or greater than 80), Race, and Sex
- LEOKA fields Type of Activity, Type of Assignment, and Originating Reporting Identifier Other Jurisdiction (if applicable)
