

MAKE SURE YOUR TEEN DRIVER IS PREPARED...



...WITH A PROPERLY MAINTAINED VEHICLE

Check to make sure tires have enough tread for good traction, that wiper blades are in good condition, that all fluid levels are sufficient (gas, oil, antifreeze, wiper fluid), and that headlights and brake lights are functional and cleared of ice and/or snow.



...WITH AN EMERGENCY KIT
