

*Not later than March 30, the Office of School Safety shall provide a school safety report to the Legislature and the House and Senate fiscal agencies that must include the following:*

**A. The status of school safety grants, if any, issued by the Grants and Community Services Division or the Office of School Safety, including grant amounts awarded to each school district for school safety improvements.**

In an effort to create safe and secure learning environments, the Michigan Legislature has appropriated \$60 million since fiscal year (FY) 2018 for the Michigan State Police (MSP), Grants and Community Services Division (GCSD), to provide and administer competitive grants to public or nonpublic schools, school districts, and intermediate school districts (ISDs) to improve the safety and security of students, staff, and school buildings through the purchase of technology and equipment.

The Michigan Legislature appropriated \$25 million in FY 2018 and in FY 2019 to fund the Competitive School Safety Grant Program (CSSGP). Final reports for the FY 2018 and FY 2019 CSSGP were provided in the 2021 boilerplate summary.

The Michigan Legislature appropriated \$10 million for competitive grants to public schools, school districts, and ISDs for FY 2020. Due to the economic declines resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic, 2020 PA 146 eliminated the \$10 million appropriation for the FY 2020 CSSGP. Therefore, no school safety grant funds were awarded.

There was no appropriation for school safety grants in FY 2021.

The 2022 CSSGP was funded from the state FY 2022 School Aid Fund (\$7.5 million) and General Fund (\$2.5 million), as appropriated in 2021 PA 48, for a total appropriation of \$10 million for competitive grants to public or nonpublic schools, school districts, and ISDs to improve the safety and security of students, staff, and school buildings through the purchase of technology and equipment or to upgrade hardening measures. The performance period of the appropriation is May 1, 2022, through July 1, 2023.

### **FY 2022 CSSGP**

#### **Applicants**

- Requests for the FY 2022 CSSGP exceeded \$34 million for \$10 million in available funds.
- 336 eligible applications were received.
  - 174 applications were submitted by public schools.
  - 50 applications were submitted by public school academies.
  - 83 applications were submitted by nonpublic schools.
  - 29 applications were submitted by ISDs.
- Applications spanned 71 of Michigan's 83 counties.

#### **Grantee Summary**

- 150 grantees were selected to receive funding.
  - 57 public school districts were awarded \$6,383,926.
  - 14 ISD/regional education service agencies (RESAs) were awarded \$768,652.

- 40 non-public schools were awarded \$1,434,662.
- 39 public school academies were awarded \$1,412,760.
- 123 grantees were classified as Priority One because they did not have prior CSSGP awards.
  - 123 total Priority One grantees were awarded \$8,717,766.
  - 47 public schools were awarded \$5,567,370.
  - 12 ISD/RESAs were awarded \$668,652.
  - 29 non-public schools were awarded \$1,157,134.
  - 35 public school academies were awarded \$1,324,610.
- 27 grantees were classified as Priority Two because they had a prior CSSGP award *before* 2019.
  - 27 total Priority Two grantees were awarded \$1,282,234.
  - 10 public schools were awarded \$816,556.
  - 2 ISD/RESAs were awarded \$100,000.
  - 11 non-public schools were awarded \$277,528.
  - 4 public school academies were awarded \$88,150.
- 53 counties had at least one award.
  - Kent (16), Wayne (16), and Oakland (10) Counties had the most awards.

**C. Reports of OK2SAY-based incidents and activities.**

**Activities** are single tips sent into the OK2SAY tip line. Generally, when a tip is submitted, it may involve multiple communications between the individual and the OK2SAY technician. Often, these communications are counted as a single tip. An **incident** is a specific, singular event. Many individual activities can make up one incident.

For calendar year 2022, OK2SAY reported:

Activities: 7,415

Incidents: 6,068

**D. Based upon an evaluation of incidents of school safety and analysis of school safety grants, recommendations on best practices and other safety measures to ensure school safety in this state.**

Michigan has long been at the forefront of school safety efforts. However, more can be done to promote the continued safety of Michigan’s schools. In November 2018, the School Safety Task Force developed a list of recommended actions to ensure a safe and stable learning environment for students and school personnel.

## Appendix

### FY 2022 Competitive School Safety Grant Program

#### Eligible Applicants

Applications were accepted directly from individual public and nonpublic schools, school districts, and ISDs. School district and ISD applications must have been for buildings that had any combination of pre-K to 12 classrooms and students. There was a limit of one application per eligible applicant. Individual schools could submit their own application; however, if they submitted an individual application, the building could not also be included in a school district or ISD application. Applicants were required to provide proof that a school had an Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) that had been updated after August 1, 2017, and aligns with the state of Michigan EOP guidance and school safety information policy developed under MCL 380.1308.

Nonpublic schools were only eligible to receive an award from \$2.5 million appropriated from the General Fund.

#### Program Areas

Based on requirements within the funding appropriation: Applications were limited to \$50,000 for any one eligible school building, up to a maximum of \$250,000 per school district or ISD. To be eligible for the maximum award of \$250,000, school districts or ISDs must have applied for funding that will be utilized at **five or more** qualifying school buildings. If schools from the same district applied as individual applicants, the maximum award of \$50,000 per building and \$250,000 per district still applied, and the combined total for those individual schools shall not have exceeded \$250,000.

#### Priorities

Based on requirements within the funding appropriation, priority was given to the following applicants:

- a) Applicants seeking funding for projects that involve multiple agencies working in partnership.
- b) Applicants seeking funding for proposals that seek to secure exterior access points of school buildings.
- c) Applicants that did not receive a school safety grant in the past.
- d) Applicants that did not receive a grant under section 1001 of article XX of 2018 PA 207 or under section 115 of 2018 PA 618.

#### Selection Process

Applications were reviewed by a committee that included representation from the MSP, the Michigan Association of Chiefs of Police, the Michigan Sheriff's Association, the Michigan Department of Education, the Michigan Association of Non-Profit Schools, and school safety professionals and subject matter experts. Priority was given to eligible project requests from applicants that had not previously received a CSSGP award, had received a CSSGP award prior to 2019, or that requested funding to secure exterior access points. Eligible expenditures were limited to the following project categories, and include any hardware, installation, or other costs deemed necessary.

- **Access control systems** – Install new, replace, or enhance systems to schedule electronic lock/unlock of building and monitor exterior and/or interior doors.
  - Includes enhancement of current systems to include lockdown function (i.e., simultaneous locking of all exterior and/or classroom doors).
  - Except for specific locations prohibited by code, the system must be designed to be fail secure (i.e., remain/become locked in the event of a power failure while always maintaining free egress).
- **Interior/classroom doorways** – Replacement, modification, or addition of:
  - Doors, doorways, frames, locks, security devices, hardware, etc. for classrooms or other occupied areas (e.g., office, lab, etc.).
    - Includes elimination, replacement, or enhancement of sidelights.
    - Modifications to create outward opening doors are permissible.
  - The following standards must be adhered to:
    - Doors must be constructed of high-strength steel or aluminum alloy, or solid-core hardwood.
    - Replacement doors and frames must meet or exceed ASTM E2395-18, F476-14, F3038-14, AAMA 1304-18, or similar standards.
    - Replacement windows and sidelights, or the addition of window film, must meet the standards in the Interior windows/glass category (#8 c, d, e).
  - Security devices and replacement door locks must:
    - Be commercial-grade, ANSI/BHMA Grade 1 certified.
    - Not require the use of a key, tool, or special knowledge or effort for operation.
    - Be capable of single-handed locking and unlocking from the inside.
    - Clearly indicate locked/unlocked status (visible to the inside of classroom).
    - Comply with applicable fire, life-safety, and building codes, ordinances, and statutes.
    - [Comply with the approval process for security devices.](#)
- **Duress/panic alarm systems** – A system to notify authorities in the event of an emergency, critical incident, or other life threatening or dangerous situation.
  - Notification to be made to law enforcement/emergency dispatch.
  - Systems with remote or wireless activation devices must include location capabilities.
  - Activation locations should include areas such as the main office, reception desk, security desk/office, administration/teacher work room, etc.
  - To the extent possible, activation locations should be from a position of safety.
- **Intercom system with access** – Video and audio systems used to control access to the school building.
  - Allows for remote communication and unlocking of doors from master stations.
- **Exterior doorways** – Replacement of exterior doors, doorways, frames, hardware, locks, sidelights, etc.
  - Doors must be constructed of high-strength steel or aluminum alloy, or solid-core hardwood.
  - Replacement doors and frames must meet or exceed ASTM E2395-18, F476-14, F3038-14, AAMA 1304-18, or similar standards.
  - Replacement windows and sidelights must meet the standards identified in the Exterior windows/glass category.
  - Replacement door locks must be commercial-grade, ANSI/BHMA Grade 1 certified.
  - Panic bars should utilize flush push bar hardware to prevent chaining doors closed.

- **Exterior windows/glass** – Replace or enhance windows and glass doors located on the exterior of the building. Exterior windows/glass were not selected as an eligible expenditure outside of being part of an exterior doorways or vestibule project.
  - Glazing must be security-grade, composed of shatter-resistant material (e.g., laminated glass or similar synthetic material), and designed to meet or exceed ASTM F588-17, F1233-08, E2395-18, or similar standards.
  - Framing, connections, and supporting structural elements must be in such a manner as to resist separation from glazing and designed to meet or exceed ASTM F588-17, F1233-08, E2395-18, or similar standards.
  - Window film must be shatter-resistant and designed for safety/security applications and meet or exceed ANSI Z97.1-2015, EN 356, EN 12600, UL 972, ULC 332, or similar standards.
  - Window film must be installed in such a manner as to resist separation from framing through the use of high-strength adhesive caulking, or other attachment system, which must meet or exceed ASTM C1564 or similar standards. The resulting glazing system must meet or exceed ASTM F1233-08, E2395-18, or similar standards.
  - Perforated window film/vinyl is **not** permissible.
- **Classroom intercom systems/two-way radios** – Installation of new, or modification, enhancement, or addition to, intercom systems connecting classrooms/staff to administrators or other staff members.
  - Can include two-way radio projects to enhance or enable communication with law enforcement/first responders.
  - Phone-based classroom intercom systems must also provide location information for emergency dispatchers.
- **Public address/notification systems** – Installation of new, or modification, enhancement, or addition to, public addresses systems.
  - Allows for communication to all areas of the school building, including exterior areas.
  - System can be accessed from a position of safety.
  - Includes visual notification additions/enhancements (e.g., colored or strobe lights) to alert persons of dangerous situations or critical announcements.
- **Trauma supplies** – Purchase of medical supplies to treat injuries and stop bleeding until emergency responders arrive.
  - Can include tourniquets, trauma/pressure bandages, hemostatic gauze, gauze pads/rolls, occlusive dressings (e.g., chest seals), emergency blanket, personal protective equipment (e.g., medical face mask, safety glasses, latex/nitrile gloves), first aid tape, CPR masks/shields/valves, trauma shears/scissors, permanent marker, trauma reference card, and a bag/pouch to hold items.
  - Maximum of \$75/classroom trauma kit is permitted. Large mass casualty kits do not have a cost maximum.
- **Vestibules** – Modification (*not* new construction) of entryways to create a double entry door system that provides a secure area to identify and authenticate visitors before granting further access to the building.
  - Components of the vestibule shall follow the standards identified in the individual project categories (i.e., interior doorways, exterior doorways, windows/glass, and intercom systems) as applicable.
  - Intercom systems or use of a secure transaction window system to communicate with office staff must be utilized.
