Spring Brings Change: My Study of Lepidoptera By Katie Gillies

In the weeks approaching March, I've enjoyed hearing the songs of birds in the morning. I've enjoyed the extra slivers of sunlight and have been keeping a countdown until we get our extra hour back! I am looking forward to spring bird migration – one of my absolute favorite times of year! And I've been looking forward mostly to my favorite summer friends – caterpillars. For the past few springs and summers, I have had the pleasure of learning to raise caterpillars. They are the larvae of my favorite group of insects, Lepidoptera (butterflies and moths).

Right now, in my refrigerator, sits a container filled with about 30 giant silk moth cocoons, which were spun in late summer by the caterpillars I raised last year. Inside of those cocoons are the pupa of the moths. But let's back up a little bit and talk about giant silk moths and their life cycle in the wild. Adult moths will emerge from their cocoons (where they spend the entire winter) in late spring and early summer. As adults, giant silk moths do not eat, they live for just a few days, and in those few days they have just one mission – find a mate. Once they have found a mate, the female of the pair will find a leaf on the species of plant that is just right for her offspring to eat, and she will lay eggs there.

From those eggs will hatch some very small, very hungry caterpillars in their first instar. An instar is basically the first stage of being a caterpillar (most silk moths will go through five different instars). They will instantly begin munching on the leaves of their host plant, and they will grow rapidly. As they get larger, caterpillars will shed their skin. Each time they shed, they will enter another instar. For some caterpillars, every time they shed into a new instar, they look totally different from the instar before! It takes a few weeks for giant silk moth caterpillars to grow to full size, and once they reach their largest size (sometimes as large and wide as the average person's index finger) and they feel they have had enough to eat, they will begin the process of spinning a silk cocoon. This is where they spend the whole winter, as a pupa, waiting to emerge in the warm spring air as an adult moth – looking for a mate to start the whole process over again!

The cocoons in my refrigerator are there because the pupa need to remember that it is currently winter outside. Once we are closer to having leaves on the trees again (a food source for caterpillars) and having other moths out and about (potential mates), I will take the cocoons out of the refrigerator. With a few weeks of warmth, adult moths should emerge, which I will then release outside. And if I am lucky, I will be able to acquire some eggs to start this spring and summer hobby all over again!

I find raising caterpillars, whether butterflies or moths, to be a fascinating and educational summer hobby. So, how could you get started raising caterpillars of your own? You can certainly search through tree leaves in the spring and summer for eggs or caterpillars! But often you can find other folks who partake in this ongoing hobby, and they might just be willing to share some of their friends with you! For example, <u>Nature Discovery</u> often has programs in the spring you can attend to learn more about these fascinating friends and take a few home with you. Happy spring!

Groups can choose from staggered check-in times and are limited to 10 people from no more than two households.

The Detroit River Coalition is made up of several river-facing organizations from Michigan and Ontario that work together to promote the appreciation and conservation of the diverse natural heritage of the Detroit River from a binational and watershed perspective.

Attention Teachers: Register Now for One of Our Virtual School Programs!

Allow us to visit you virtually! Choose from our list of virtual school program offerings to help keep your students engaged with Michigan's natural resources and the outdoors this school year. See our current offerings below, which include programs for grades pre-K through 12. The experience will be live with one of our educators and will be approximately 45 minutes in length. Programs are NGSS-aligned, and additional pre-and post-lesson resources will be included.

Each program session of no more than 40 students costs \$40, paid in advance by check or charge (preferred). An educator will contact the teacher to discuss delivery details for the virtual experience prior to confirmation.

Animal ABC's (pre-K)

Practice letters and spelling virtually with Michigan wildlife! Learn about Michigan species and the differences between mammals, birds and reptiles through stories, rhymes and virtual exploration of their characteristics featuring a few of the OAC's live animals. We'll also discuss differences between wild and domestic animals.

Wild in Michigan (grades K-2)

All animals have the same basic survival needs – food, water, shelter and space – the components that make up a habitat. In this virtual program we'll take a closer look at several Michigan wildlife species, from mammals to birds to reptiles, and compare and contrast some of their specific habitat needs.

Trapper and Traders (grades 3-5)

Detroit was founded in 1701 as a fur-trading post in the wilderness. Join us for a virtual exploration of the abundant natural resources and the lives of both Native Americans and settlers during that time, featuring footage of some historical locations and land features that we can observe in the area today.

Great Lakes Invaders (grades 3-5)

What does it mean to be invasive? How are invasive species in the Great Lakes different from our native species? We'll answer these questions and more while we introduce several of our Great Lakes invaders in our virtual program. We will also have the chance to meet one of our most destructive invaders – the sea lamprey.

Migration Science – Featuring Southeast Michigan Osprey (grades 6-8)

Bird migration is an absolutely incredible feat, but to make the journey, migratory birds still require the basic needs – food, water, shelter, and space – as they migrate. How do birds know where to fly? How do they know where to stop for food and rest? How have humans impacted bird migration over the last several decades? We'll answer these questions and more in our virtual program, as we take a closer look at one local migratory species – the osprey. We'll track the migratory journeys of actual osprey and see how local biologists have used technology to track their migration.

White-tailed Deer – Coming to a Neighborhood Near You! (grades 9-12)

Have you been seeing more of Michigan's state mammal in your community? You're not alone! Numbers of white-tailed deer have gone up significantly in recent years – especially in our cities and suburbs! Join us to take a look at the reasons behind this increase, its ecological impact and the unique challenges this mammal has created for citizens, municipalities and wildlife managers in Michigan's urban areas.

Scout Offerings: This Season We Will Move Our Scout Badge Workshops Outdoors!

Since the OAC is still closed, we will use the outdoor spaces surrounding the building to present the scout badge workshops listed below. Each scout needs to register individually, and only one adult will be able to attend with each scout due to COVID restrictions. Other family members are free to explore the Dequindre Cut or Riverwalk during the workshop, but one adult does need to stay with the scout throughout the program. A minimum registration of eight scouts will be required for each program to take place.

This program will run rain or shine; be sure to dress for the weather. Everyone must wear a mask and maintain 6-foot social distance from non-family members.

The cost of the program is \$3 for each scout; adults do not need to register. Registration includes an OAC patch for participation.

Some badges may require additional activities to be completed on your own or with your troop.

2021 Lumberjack Virtual 5K

The Outdoor Adventure Center is committed to providing a safe and enjoyable experience for everyone who enters our doors. In accordance with Gov. Whitmer and the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services' recommendations to help prevent the spread of COVID-19, we will be hosting the March 27 Lumberjack Run (5K and .5K) as a virtual race.

The maple syrup is running, and so are our lumberjack runners. Join the only race that strongly encourages running in your best lumberjack attire.

Pick any course you like for a walk, run or roll. Wear your flannel and send us photos of your race.

Each runner will receive:

- Custom 4-inch pancake medal with ribbon.
- Red and black, checked face mask.
- Maple syrup runner's gel pack
- Family four-pack admission to the Outdoor Adventure Center (to be used when we reopen).

Registration will be available through March 30, and participant packets will be available during the last week of the month, with the option for curbside pickup or to have it mailed right to your home.

Curbside pickup will be available from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. March 27 at the DNR Outdoor Adventure Center, 1801 Atwater St. in Detroit.

Just drive down Atwater – we'll be curbside with your packets. Participants also can choose to have their packets mailed for an additional fee.

Recreation Passport: Cost/Where to Purchase/Details

PLEASE NOTE: As of March 1, 2020, the Recreation Passport vehicle entry fee increased to \$12 due to a statutory provision to adjust the fee based upon the Consumer Price Index.

- Vehicles: \$12 when purchased with your license plate registration renewal through the Secretary of State.
- Vehicles: \$17 (\$12 Recreation Passport fee plus \$5 convenience fee) when purchased at state parks or *DNR customer service centers (cash or checks only) or at the Secretary of State outside your license plate registration renewal cycle.
- Motorcycles: \$6 when purchased with your license plate registration renewal through the Secretary of State.
- Motorcycles: \$11 (\$6 passport fee, plus \$5 convenience fee) when purchased at state parks and *DNR customer service centers (cash or checks only) or at the Secretary of State outside your license plate registration renewal cycle
- Moped: \$6 when purchased at state parks.
- Commercial daily pass: \$17 when purchased at state parks (24,000-plus pounds and/or seating capacity of 16-plus).
- A resident Recreation Passport cannot be purchased online.
- The purchase of a separate Recreation Passport is required for any hitched or unhitched towed vehicles.

The option to purchase passports at DNR customer service centers is temporarily unavailable. You can still purchase passports in person at state parks and recreation areas.

The \$5 convenience fee will not be applied to purchases made at/for:

- Belle Isle Park.
- Non-street-legal vehicles at the Silver Lake State Park ORV area.
- Non-annual renewing vehicles (i.e., historical/authentic, street-legal moped, tribal government, dealer, temporary, manufacturer, non-profit organization (Y) plates).
- Mopeds (a moped Recreation Passport is not available for purchase at the Secretary of State, so the \$5 convenience fee does not apply).
- Commercial vehicles.
