COVID safety

The OAC is committed to providing visitors with a safe environment. We have implemented the following changes to our building procedures and environment*:

- Floors are washed or vacuumed daily.
- Private field trip: On days that the OAC is closed to the public, we will schedule private field trips with your school to reduce COVID exposure. Email DNR-OAC@Michigan.gov for more information.
- An electrostatic disinfectant unit is used daily in spaces with irregular surfaces.
- Restroom doors are propped open to alleviate the need to touch door handles.
- Drinking fountains are disabled.
- Staff members must wear a mask and maintain 6-foot social distancing.
- Hand sanitizer stations have been placed throughout our exhibit areas.
- The interactive toys we usually have out are kept secured for the time being.
- Sneeze guards are in place at the front desk.
- When crafts are offered each child gets their own supplies no sharing.
- Masks and social distancing are encouraged for guests.
- Private appointment-only and virtual field trips are offered for school groups.

Educator's Corner

Trying something new

This past year I had some extra time on my hands, like many people did, so I decided to try out some new hobbies. I experimented with bread baking, but I could never get the dough to rise properly. I gave embroidery a shot, but I could never sit still long enough to finish anything. I found that my favorite new activity was done in the great outdoors: snowshoeing. The previous spring, I had been browsing the aisles of a discount sporting goods store when I saw two pairs of beautiful blue snowshoes, and they were on sale! I knew I had to get them, even though warmer weather had just arrived. When winter finally came back around, I had somewhat forgotten about the snowshoes. I was busy unpacking from our recent move, the holidays came and went, and then all of a sudden it was February! Late in the month there was a heavy snowfall, and I decided it was probably our last chance to try out the snowshoes.

We bundled up, hopped in the car, and headed to our local metropark. We had planned on walking a 3-mile loop trail to enjoy the scenery and do some winter birding. We were on a rarely used trail, so the snow had not been packed down yet. Walking through the fresh powder was more difficult than I thought it would be, as I started working up a sweat. It was quite chilly that day, but it certainly didn't feel cold once we got moving with all those layers on. We got about halfway around the trail when we realized we were advancing at a much slower pace than we normally would. It takes much longer to walk three miles when there are several inches of snow on the ground, even with snowshoes on. We decided to take a shortcut back to the parking lot, rather than finish the loop. Next time we would be better prepared.

Even though we turned in early, the experience was very enjoyable. We were the only two people on that trail, so it felt like we were exploring some secluded faraway land. In actuality, we were still within Wayne County.

One of the beauties of snowshoeing is that you can do it anywhere. You don't have to take a long drive up to northern Michigan. You can snowshoe in a neighborhood park, or even in your own backyard. You also don't even have to purchase snowshoes to enjoy the sport. Many sporting goods or outdoor gear stores have them available for rent, as well as some parks. If the weather allows, the Outdoor Adventure Center offers snowshoeing for all ages at our outdoor winter activity programs. Michiganders are lucky to experience all four seasons in our great state, and there are plenty of things to enjoy outside no matter what time of year it is. I encourage everyone to try something new while exploring the outdoors. Even if you don't find your favorite new hobby, you will make memories along the way.

I normally prefer the sun and waves over the cold and snow, but winter can actually be one of the best times to enjoy the outdoors. The cold keeps many people inside, so outdoor spaces are less crowded.

The snow acts as a beautiful blanket on the ground and trees, and there are no pesky mosquitoes! Just the sound of your crunching footsteps and the occasional song of a bird that might stick around through the cold. Keep your ears open for the quintessential chickadee-dee-dee call of the black-capped chickadee, or the chipping sound of a northern cardinal. As long as you are dressed properly, winter in Michigan can be just as fun as soaking up the sun on one of our Great Lakes.

You should visit ... Maybury State Park

Maybury State Park features almost 1,000 acres of gently rolling terrain, open meadow, mature forest, a variety of wildlife, abundant wildflowers and a variety of outdoor recreation opportunities.

Maybury State Park is a busy day-use park, one of the few state parks serving the Detroit metro area. An oasis of lush, green forest amidst developed land, the park is a place for visitors to connect with nature on its miles of varied trails. The state acquired the land in 1971 from the City of Detroit following the closure of the Maybury Sanatorium that once occupied the site.

Containing almost 1,000 acres of gently rolling terrain, open meadow and mature forest, the park offers a variety of outdoor recreation opportunities including an extensive trail system for hiking, biking, horseback riding and cross-country skiing, youth organizational camping, fishing, educational programming, a riding stable and a working farm. Maybury Riding Stable operates the park's riding stable April through November (as weather permits) and offers guided and group horseback rides, lessons and summer camps. Contact the stable at 734-260-8314.

The park's track chair is available for visitors with mobility challenges to explore the park. These off-road, electronic chairs are available first come, first reserved at no cost.

Drone use is prohibited over equestrian facilities and trails, including the Maybury Equestrian Trail, Maybury Riding Stable, Horseman's Staging Area and portions of Maybury Farm.

Archery at the OAC

Welcome to the Outdoor Adventure Center's archery range!

We have different archery experiences you can choose from, ranging in price from free to \$12 an hour. To enhance your target practice, we offer National Archery in the Schools targets by Morrell, 3D animal targets, paper targets and much more!

Archers will have the opportunity to practice shooting distances of both 6 meters and 10 meters, in the advanced programs.

For all archery programs:

- Participants must be 8 years of age or older.
- Closed toed shoes are required on the range.
- A signed waiver for all participants must be on file before accessing the range.
- Children under the age of 18 must have a waiver signed by a parent or guardian.
- All equipment is provided. We recommend participants use provided equipment.

For paid archery programs (excludes Try-It programs):

- Admission to the OAC is included for each archery participant and one accompanying spectator.
- Outside equipment with a draw weight over 30 pounds is prohibited.
- Crossbows and broadhead arrows are prohibited. Only target-grade arrows are permitted.
- The OAC does not secure outside equipment. Equipment must be stored outside of the building by participants who wish to visit the exhibit area after an archery program.
- The OAC does not provide assembly or maintenance support for outside equipment.

Try-It!

This is your opportunity to give archery a try. This 30-minute program is designed as a brief introduction to archery. Participants will learn to safely handle a bow and shoot several arrows. Participants must be 8 years of age or older. All equipment is provided. Limited to eight participants per half-hour session. Preregistration is not available for this program. Participants must sign up on-site at the Outdoor Adventure Center on the day the program is offered. Sign-up will begin at 3 p.m. and is on a first-come, first-served basis.

Safety first: Hunter Safety Course
Hunter Safety Course Field Day

Saturday, Oct. 2, 9 a.m. - 5 p.m. OR Saturday, Oct. 9, 9 a.m. - 5 p.m.

This event is being hosted by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources Law Enforcement Division. Portions of the field day will be outdoors, so please dress for the weather. No meals will be provided. We recommend bringing a bag lunch. All other course materials and supplies will be provided. All participants must have successfully completed the online Hunter Education Course prior to registering for the field day.

The main purpose of the hunter education field day course is to provide an alternative to the traditional course. This course is the same as the traditional hunter education course; however, the classroom portion is completed by enrolling in the online training session. In order to purchase a hunting license in Michigan, an individual born on or after January 1, 1960, is required to successfully complete an approved hunter education course. The online course is fee-based and can be taken at Hunter-Ed.com/Michigan.

About the field day:

- Written test (80% or better to pass) and practice assessment (pass/fail).
- No minimum age requirement; however, students under 10 years of age shall be accompanied by a parent, legal guardian or other adult approved by parent or legal guardian.

Intro to Hawkwatching

As a naturalist, educator and all-around wildlife enthusiast, I feel beyond fortunate on a regular basis that my work allows me to combine several passions – my love of nature, teaching and sharing. I have worked for many years in interpretation and environmental education in the Metro Detroit area, and currently, I work as an educator for the Michigan DNR Outdoor Adventure Center in Detroit. The OAC opened in July 2015 and is located near the heart of downtown Detroit. One of our many goals as a natural resource education institution located in an urban area is to introduce new audiences to the outdoors – perhaps even introduce a new favorite hobby. While I certainly enjoy introducing camping, fishing, nature observation and birding to new audiences ... what is my favorite hobby to introduce? HAWKWATCHING!

Lucky for me, I live and work in the perfect location – on the Detroit River and the site of the Detroit River Hawkwatch. DRHW is managed by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and is supported by the Detroit River International Wildlife Refuge Alliance. The actual count site is located at Lake Erie Metropark in Brownstown, Michigan, where the Detroit River meets the western edge of Lake Erie. Hawks migrating south from their northern breeding grounds may follow one of several routes around the Great Lakes, and one of those routes funnels them right over the boat launch at Lake Erie Metropark. You can learn more about the migration over DRHW at DetroitRiverHawkwatch.org. I've visited the count site for several years and "oohed" and "ahhed" at the sights of the thousands of kettling broad-winged hawks in September and the coveted golden eagles in November.

I was even fortunate enough to be an official counter in the fall of 2016 (best job ever!). While counting hawks was a spectacular job, teaching about hawks is particularly rewarding.

When I learned about the Hawk Migration Association of North America Junior Hawkwatcher program that was started at the Allegheny Front Hawk Watch, I thought, "Okay, we need that here, and I want to do it!" It was a no- brainer. The Outdoor Adventure Center supports several forms of raptor education through our school programming and public programming. Some of our favorite public education programs to host are live bird of prey programs – who doesn't love to look into the round, black eyes of a barred owl or feel the wind from the wing flapping of a bald eagle? These

programs are fascinating and entertaining. They draw large crowds, folks ask many questions, and they are a fantastic opportunity to light a spark in learners of all ages and inspire a conservation ethic for our birds of prey. But I feel that one of our most impactful programs was our version of the Junior Hawkwatcher program.

Thanks to DRHW's rockstar volunteer and photographer Jerry Jourdan, we have a Junior Hawkwatcher activity booklet specific to DRHW. The Junior Hawkwatcher program drew a dedicated crowd – kids who love birds and especially hawks. A kid who could tell me all about peregrine falcons – before attending the program. A kid who drew the migrant turkey vultures in flight over the "stacks" – the smokestacks of the Trenton DTE Power Plant, one of the important landmarks within the count site – in his nature journal that he brought with him. I was on cloud nine. These kids were engaged. After an initial introductory indoor program at the OAC, part two of our Junior Hawkwatcher program convened at the DRHW site, and our dedicated participants were awarded a certificate of completion for the program. It was a beautiful mid-October day, and our migrant turkey vultures put on a great show for special young guests. This I was grateful for, because all hawkwatchers know that the opportunity to marvel at big, low-altitude kettling birds is not a given; it often must be earned with hours spent staring at an empty sky. You know what I mean. But that day the stars aligned. As a perfect bonus to the program, hawk bander and raptor rehabilitator extraordinaire Dave Hogan managed to lure in and band a juvenile female Cooper's hawk that morning, which I could not pass up the opportunity to share. This particularly ornery Cooper's hawk was not so excited about the whole thing, but what she didn't know is that she was a fantastic ambassador for her species and provided an opportunity that our participants will never forget (and I left puncture-wound-free – otherwise it would have been memorable for the wrong reason!).

After a brief talk about Cooper's hawks and their migration, we snapped some photos for memories, and released her on her way! Hawkwatching may not be for everyone – it does require a strong interest, patience and dedication. But these kids had it, and I was so happy to work with them and their families. We do hope to continue our partnership with Detroit River Hawkwatch and HMANA for this valuable program. Valuable for the partners involved, fun for the kids and families, and beneficial for the hawks. A win, win, win. This program is in the books as one of my most rewarding, and I can't wait to do it again. The 2021 Junior Hawkwatcher program will take place 3-4:30 p.m. Sunday, Oct. 3, at the Outdoor Adventure Center and Sunday, Oct. 17 at the Detroit River Hawkwatch site at Lake Erie Metropark. We hope you'll join us for both dates, but attendance at both is not required for the program.

Recreation Passport: Cost/Where to Purchase/Details

PLEASE NOTE: As of March 1, 2020, the Recreation Passport vehicle entry fee increased to \$12 due to a statutory provision to adjust the fee based upon the Consumer Price Index.

- Vehicles: \$12 when purchased with your license plate registration renewal through the Secretary of State.
- Vehicles: \$17 when purchased at state parks, *DNR customer service centers (cash or checks only) or at the Secretary of State outside your license plate registration renewal cycle. (Recreation Passport fee + \$5 convenience fee = \$17).
- Motorcycles: \$6 when purchased with your license plate registration renewal through the Secretary of State.
- Motorcycles: \$11 (\$6 passport fee, plus \$5 convenience fee) when purchased at state parks and *DNR customer service centers (cash or checks only) or at the Secretary of State outside your license plate registration renewal cycle.
- Moped: \$6 when purchased at state parks.
- Commercial daily pass \$17 when purchased at state parks (24k+ pounds and/or seating capacity of 16+).
- A resident Recreation Passport cannot be purchased online.
- The purchase of a separate Recreation Passport is required for any hitched or unhitched towed vehicles.

The \$5 convenience fee will not be applied to purchases made at/for:

- Belle Isle Park.
- Non-street-legal vehicles at the Silver Lake State Park ORV area.
- Non-annual renewing vehicles (i.e., historical/authentic, street-legal moped, tribal government, dealer, temporary, manufacturer, nonprofit organization (Y) plates).

^{*}The option to purchase passports at DNR customer service centers is temporarily unavailable. You can still purchase passports in person at state parks and recreation areas.

- Mopeds (a moped Recreation Passport is not available for purchase at the Secretary of State, so the \$5 convenience fee does not apply).
- Commercial vehicles.

Thank you for supporting your state parks by purchasing your Recreation Passport and by visiting our beautiful state parks.

OAC Refund Policy

OAC Programs

To receive a refund for a class, program or special event, you must contact the OAC by email at DNR-<u>OAC@Michigan.gov</u> at least three business days prior to the event date. This allows us to place persons on a waiting list in your spot. Without this timely notice, a refund is not available.

Room Rentals

Fifty percent of your rental fee will be refunded up to three months prior to your event date. If you cancel within 90 days of your event, you will forfeit your payment. However, you will receive the \$500 security deposit. Fees are nontransferable.
