State Park Madness 2021

Each April, we follow our Wildlife March Madness Tournament with a State Park Madness Tournament. Our goal is to highlight a set of parks from Michigan's 103 state parks. Some are familiar and others are less widely known – but each is a beautiful destination.

This year's competition was particularly spirited, with lots of social media action. Typically, voting is completed inside our facility and online, but for the past two years it has been restricted to online only. We hope that our friends enjoy learning about the many Michigan state parks and that our tournament inspires your travel plans. We want to applaud all the parks in this year's tournament and congratulate the 2021 State Park Madness winner: Port Crescent State Park.

Port Crescent

Just outside of the town of Port Austin, on the tip of Michigan's "thumb," lies Port Crescent State Park. With 3 miles of sandy Lake Huron shoreline, this state park is a quiet, family-friendly park situated away from the lights and noise of the city.

The park is home to a modern campground with waterfront views and a camper cabin. It also offers 5 miles of hiking and cross-country trail, breathtaking sunsets and opportunities for fishing, canoeing, birding and hunting. In addition, a wooden boardwalk parallels the shoreline, offering scenic vistas of Saginaw Bay.

When the sun sets and the stars come out, enjoy the dark sky preserve inside the park – one of only seven in Michigan – that offers exceptional stargazing. As a dark sky preserve, the park is protected against light pollution. The best viewing location is located near the day-use parking lot, where a viewing platform is available.

Congratulations to the team at Port Crescent State Park, led by Brian Dunn! You are this year's champions!

Educator's Corner

Making new memories

After reading Natalie Cypher's blog post in our January-February 2021 newsletter, I was inspired to make some new memories myself, while laughing about old ones. While I never had much interest in hunting with my dad, I did help him track and process his deer. So, we do share the memory of me finding – maybe not the easiest – path back for my dad, who was hauling the doe. Nothing like making him work for that fresh meat!

The memories that Natalie's blog did bring to mind were the many adventures that my family and I had ice fishing. I loved ice fishing when I was growing up, and was always excited to go either when Dad got home from work or on the weekends. I am the youngest of three, so when we went ice fishing Dad had quite a few holes to hand auger before he could get to fishing himself.

Sometimes we would even bring some friends, which would of course add to the hole count. Over the years, the ice fishing outings became fewer and fewer, with other interests and obligations taking precedent. I decided to change that this year and picked up a new ice shanty to replace the one my dad sold years ago. I can carry mine on my back, while his required a truck to transport and was heavy to haul. My dad picked up a new auger and power drill attachment we were eager to try out.

With my car packed up, all we needed to do was stop for bait, then we headed out to pick the perfect fishing spot. We got to the park, and with our warm layers on we walked out a bit on the ice and decided on a good spot. I unpacked the ice shanty and we worked together to get it set up and anchored down. With it being a windy day, I used the ice anchors to secure it in place while my dad held on tight to ensure my nice new ice shanty didn't turn into a nice new kite. We unzipped the door and decided on a location for the fishing holes. In the same amount of time it took us to decide, he had two holes in the ice and we were ready to fish. We laughed about the speed of his new auger and recalled the amount of time it used to take to get set up years ago. He recalled how as soon as he was done drilling holes and was about to start fishing, one of us would declare they were in a bad spot and needed a new hole drilled somewhere else. And of course, Dad would always oblige. But on this day, Dad and I stuck with our original holes, and with the wind whipping outside we couldn't imagine leaving the comfort of the ice shanty. We had a few nibbles and brought up a few small perch we ended up throwing back – it didn't matter if we caught the catch of a lifetime or caught nothing at all, the new memories were worth every second spent on the ice.

I would encourage everyone to find a new outdoor passion or revive an old one and make the time to enjoy the outdoors. Of course, the ice fishing season is over for now, but the change of season leads to different adventures and new memories to be made. It is on to kayaking and hiking for me, but you can visit the Michigan DNR website to learn about different outdoor activities to do across the state of Michigan. No matter what activity you choose to enjoy, be sure to follow all guidelines in place to keep you safe.

Michigan Predator-Prey

Meet some Michigan mammals! We'll spend some hands-on time getting up close and personal with some of Michigan's wildlife and learn what makes them specialized as a predator or a prey species. Then we'll play an active game that illustrates the importance of predator-prey relationships to wildlife populations.

Nature's Colors and Shapes

A walk in nature can reveal a variety of colors, shapes, sounds, and textures! We'll explore the surrounding area and the Riverfront with a nature "I spy" activity.

Fantastic Fish!

A great program for those looking to learn more about some of the fish found in Michigan and wanting to test their casting skills. In this program participants will be introduced to the parts of a fish and how to identify fish. Participants will also get to try a fun casting activity that will put their aiming and release skills to the test. This program does not include actual fishing.

Let's Go Fishing!

Discover the rich fish biodiversity on the Detroit river with a fun and educational Outdoor Adventure Center fishing experience! Participants will learn how to identify fish with a fun game, learn how to cast a fishing rod in a safe environment, and lastly try their hand in a fishing derby at the Milliken State Park harbor. Participants will also learn how to identify various species of fish and find out how they as anglers can help the fight against aquatic invasive species. Fishing equipment is provided, but an additional fee is charged.

Wetland Wonders!

Visit our neighborhood wetland at the Detroit Riverfront and see if you can find the creatures that reside there. Participants will conduct some simple water quality tests, and dive into why wetlands are important to wildlife and to people. Be prepared to get your hands wet!

Insect Investigations

Nets, bugs, investigations and discovery! After an introduction to insects and their important roles in our ecosystems, participants will search high and low for the different types of insects found in our local wetland/urban habitat. We will take an up-close look at their characteristics and what makes them an insect (or not!).

Birding the Riverfront

The Detroit River and Riverfront area are home to a variety of nesting and migratory bird species – come find out for yourselves! We'll spend some time learning the basics of bird ID and how to use binoculars. Then we'll take a walk through the area to identify some local species in different habitats. We'll even submit our observations to the citizen science project eBird!

The next week we hosted a series of special events. We celebrated history with Miz Rosie Chapman as Harriet Tubman and Gene Picor as a voyageur. We hosted live animal programs featuring bats, birds, amphibians and

reptiles. We were gifted an original painting, representing the national forests in Michigan, from prominent artist, Louise Phillips of Washington, D.C. by the U.S. Forest Service and held an art workshop on our front lawn. We hosted a viewing of the documentary "An American Ascent" – detailing the first all African American expedition to tackle Denali, North America's highest peak.

Since those Grand Opening Days, we have hosted over half a million guests and were on track for so much more before COVID-19 caused a temporary closure. We have hosted dozens of weddings and hundreds of birthday parties. And so many school groups, Scouts and day camps have come through our doors! We have missed our friends so much during the closure, but we have kept in touch with virtual and outdoor only programming.

Incredible Insects

Saturday, Aug. 21, 1-2:30 p.m.

Nets, bugs, exploration, and discovery! Join us to learn about some common types of insects here in Michigan and their important roles in our ecosystems during a guided bug safari in Milliken State Park. Each participant will be provided a insect net, bug box, and magnifying lens for exploration.

This program will be outside rain or shine - be sure to dress for the weather. It is often windy and colder by the river.

Hunter Safety Certification

In order to purchase a hunting license in Michigan, an individual born on or after Jan. 1, 1960, is required to successfully complete an approved hunter education course.

There are two options for completing hunter education in Michigan – the traditional course or the online course. Both options require attendance at a field day.

The main purpose of the hunter education course is to train safe, legal and responsible hunters. Topics include understanding wildlife management, wildlife identification, ethics, laws and regulations, and firearms safety and handling.

Michigan's traditional hunter education course is taught by a dedicated core of certified volunteer instructors and Michigan conservation officers.

Boater Safety Certification

Boaters born after June 30, 1996, and most personal watercraft operators who operate a vessel in Michigan must have a boater education card (boating safety certificate).

There are two options for completing your boater safety certificate – a traditional course or an online course.

The main purpose of the course is to train safe and responsible boaters. Topics include vessel basics, navigation rules, boating laws and regulations, emergencies, water sports and much more.

If you or someone you know needs to or is interested in taking a hunter safety or boater safety course, you can find more information at Michigan.gov/RecreationalSafety. Plans for traditional courses that would take place at the OAC are being worked on and will be posted at a later date.

As we prepare to reopen, we are hard at work on two new additions to the OAC.

Recreation Passport Cost/Where to Purchase/Details

PLEASE NOTE: As of March 1, 2020, the Recreation Passport vehicle entry fee increased to \$12 due to a statutory provision to adjust the fee based upon the Consumer Price Index.

- Vehicles: \$12 when purchased with your license plate registration renewal through the Secretary of State
- Vehicles: \$17 when purchased at state parks, *DNR customer service centers (cash or checks only) or at the Secretary of State outside your license plate registration renewal cycle. (Recreation Passport fee + \$5 convenience fee = \$17).
- Motorcycles: \$6 when purchased with your license plate registration renewal through the Secretary of State.
- Motorcycles: \$11 (\$6 passport fee, plus \$5 convenience fee) when purchased at state parks and *DNR customer service centers (cash or checks only) or at the Secretary of State outside your license plate registration renewal cycle.
- Moped: \$6 when purchased at state parks.
- Commercial daily pass \$17 when purchased at state parks (24k+ pounds and/or seating capacity of 16+).

- A resident Recreation Passport cannot be purchased online.
- The purchase of a separate Recreation Passport is required for any hitched or unhitched towed vehicles.

The option to purchase passports at DNR customer service centers is temporarily unavailable. You can still purchase passports in person at state parks and recreation areas.

The \$5 convenience fee will not be applied to purchases made at/for:

- Belle Isle Park.
- Non-street-legal vehicles at the Silver Lake State Park ORV area.
- Non-annual renewing vehicles (i.e., historical/authentic, street-legal moped, tribal government, dealer, temporary, manufacture, non-profit organization (Y) plates).
- Mopeds (a moped Recreation Passport is not available for purchase at the Secretary of State, so the \$5 convenience fee does not apply).
- Commercial vehicles.

OAC Refund Policy

OAC Programs

To receive a refund for a class, program or special event, you must contact the OAC by email at DNR-OAC@Michigan.gov at least three (3) business days prior to the event date. This allows us to place persons on a waiting list in your spot. Without this timely notice, a refund is not available.

Room Rentals

Fifty percent of your rental fee will be refunded up to three months prior to your event date. If you cancel within 90 days of your event, you will forfeit your payment. However, you will receive the \$500 security deposit. Fees are nontransferrable.

Contractual Programs (bookings with partner organizations)
