Executive Summary:

Public Act 166 of 2022 section 1090 requires the following:

Sec. 1090. *The Office of Global Michigan is to coordinate with the Michigan Asian Pacific American Affairs commission (MAPAAC), the Commission on Middle Eastern American Affairs (CMEAA), and the Hispanic/Latino Commission of Michigan (HLCOM) to produce a report by January 31 that is to be transmitted to the senate and house subcommittee chairpersons, the senate and house fiscal agencies, and the state budget director. The report shall include, but is not limited to, the following:*

- (a) Total number of people with whom each commission directly interacts through programming.*
- (b) Total number of public events that each commission conducted.*
- (c) Description of the activities that the commissions initiated to promote cooperation between the commissions.*
- (d) Total number of meetings that each commission held with foreign diplomats.*
- (e) Programmatic costs of each commission.*

Required Information:

- (a) Total number of people with whom each commission directly interacts through programing.*
 - a. HLCOM – Approximately 16,575
 - b. MAPAAC – Approximately 3,370
 - c. CMEAA – Approximately 3,056

- (b) Total number of public events that each commission conducted*
 - a. HLCOM – 22 public events (which includes 12 sponsored events)
 - b. MAPAAC – 18 public events (which includes 9 sponsored events)
 - c. CMEAA – 7 public events

(c) Description of the activities that the commission initiated to promote cooperation between the commissions.

- a. All three commissions participate in the following:
 - i. Weekly staff meetings with all three commission staff
 - ii. Collaborated on a year-long initiative for strategic alignment between the commissions in the areas of operations, legislative advocacy and community engagement. This initiative included all ethnic commission staff and the commissioners from all 3 ethnic commissions.
 - iii. Collaborative meetings regarding the Drive Safe Bills
 - iv. Joint statement between HLCOM and CMEAA regarding the overturning of Roe v Wade.
 - v. Commissioners from all 3 ethnic commissions participated in meetings with MSHDA.

(d) Total number of meetings each commission held with foreign diplomats.

- a. HLCOM – 5
- b. MAPAAC – 2
- c. CMEAA – 0

(e) Programmatic costs of each commission (GF/GP funds)

- a. HLCOM - \$130,191
- b. MAPAAC - \$49,558
- c. CMEAA – \$36,500
