Dear Mr. Osieczonek:

The Department of State (Department) received a formal complaint filed against you by Jeanne Pearl-Wright, alleging that you violated the Michigan Campaign Finance Act (MCFA or Act), 1976 PA 388, MCL 169.201 et seq. The investigation and resolution of these complaints is governed by section 15 of the Act and the corresponding administrative rules, R 169.51 et seq. Copies of the complaint and supporting documentation are enclosed with this letter.

The MCFA requires a committee that receives or expends more than \$1,000.00 during any reporting period to file periodic campaign finance reports in compliance with the Act. MCL 169.233(6). The failure to file a single campaign statement may trigger the assessment of late filing fees, while the failure to file two or more campaign statements is a misdemeanor offense. MCL 169.233(7)-(8).

Ms. Pearl-Wright alleges that you failed to file "the required 2011 Annual Campaign Finance Statement[,]" and "failed to report funds used by [your] Campaign Committee [.]"

In support of her complaint, Ms. Pearl-Wright provided newsletters, a screen shot of a website, and copies of newsletters printed from a website.

The purpose of this letter is to inform you of the Department's examination of these matters and your right to respond to the allegations before the Department proceeds further. <u>It is important to understand that the Department is neither making this complaint nor accepting the allegations as true.</u>

If you wish to file a written response to this complaint, you are required to do so within 15 business days of the date of this letter. Your response may include any written statement or additional documentary evidence you wish to submit. All materials must be sent to the Department of State, Bureau of Elections, Richard H. Austin Building, 1st Floor, 430 West Allegan Street, Lansing, Michigan 48918. If you fail to submit a response, the Department will render a decision based on the evidence furnished by the complainant.

A copy of your reply will be provided to Ms. Pearl-Wright, who will have an opportunity to submit a rebuttal statement to the Department. After reviewing all of the statements and materials provided by the parties, the Department will determine whether "there may be reason to believe that a violation of [the MCFA] has occurred [.]" MCL 169.215(10). Note that the

Department's enforcement powers include the possibility of entering a conciliation agreement, conducting an administrative hearing, or referring this matter to the Attorney General for enforcement of the criminal penalty provided in sections 33(7)-(8) of the Act.

I am writing to file a formal complaint against Commissionar Jim Osieczonek for failure to meet campaign finance reporting deadlines for the 2011 Annual, 2012 Annual, August 7th Primary Pre-Election, and August 7th Primary Post Election cycles.

Commissioner Osieczonek's Campaign Committee was under obligation to provide these reports having made expenditures in excess of the Reporting Waiver of \$1,000. Mr. Osieczonek, elected in the November 2010 General Election posted a post-election finance report in excess of the Reporting Waiver amount, yet per the records of the Eaton County Clerk's office did not follow through with the required 2011 Annual Campaign Finance Statement. Additionally it is alleged that Mr. Osieczonek has failed to report funds used by his Campaign Committee to routinely mail, via first class post, approximately 2,000 newsletters every other month beginning in February of 2011 as is supported with copies of those mailings attached with this complaint. Mr. Osieczonek has failed to disclose any expenditures in 2012 as well despite exceeding the reporting threshold for the election cycle for which his name appears on the ballot and he seeks election.

Michigan's Campaign Finance Act 388 of 1976 Section 169.233 provides the filing deadlines, contribution and expenditure limits regarding reporting waivers, and late fees to be assessed for the disclosure violations.

We believe that Commissioner Osieczonek has been purposefully complacent in his failure to make the necessary campaign finance disclosures as is evident by his lack of reporting throughout his entire term in office. We respectfully request that you act upon these issues quickly as Commissioner Osieczonek should not be able to benefit from this opacity into the finances of his campaign while all other Commissioner candidates are diligent in their campaign finance reporting for the sake of transparency with the voters.



Electoral districts are realigned every 10 years in response to population changes determined by the result of the Census. The realignment is now complete. I mentioned in the past newsletter that the Park Commission is considering asking County Commissioners to approve a request to have a .25 park millage placed on the ballot for citizens to vote on. Based on my re-quest for feedback, I heard from 3 constituents and 1 was for it and 2 opposed it. The request now under consideration is a .5 park millage. At the bottom of this page is the reason for the increase. Let me know your thoughts.

The County Board approved the 2011-12 Budget. This was not an easy process and all departments had to make sacrifices. Due to declining property values, the expected revenues will be almost a million dollars lower than last year and will be around the 2007-08 levels. To balance the budget, we had to make some tough decisions. I have provided additional information about our budget in this newsletter.

Many people are unhappy with the road quality. I will discuss the financial challenge of maintaining roads in this newsletter.

There is a lot going on in the County right now that affects us as citizens. County Commissioners are working closely with the County Controller and County Departments to develop a balanced budget for fiscal year 2011-12. As with most budgets, there are many challenges. We anticipate lower revenues this year so cuts will be necessary.

The redistricting committee, which consists of the chairperson of the two county political parties, the county clerk, the county treasurer, and the county prosecutor, are working on a plan to redistrict county. commission districts. The committee is evaluating three separate plans. To date, we do not have an approved plan, but all of the plans change county commissioner districts.

I will provide you with a budget and redistrict update in the next newsletter.

Michigan Avenue

The last newsletter mentioned the environmental study. The study indicates traffic noise levels will be beyond acceptable standards. As a result, a sound wall on the northwest portion of the extension is required to protect citizens.

The cost of the wall is an unanticipated expense so the road commission and township petitioned Tri-County Regional Planning Commission (TCRPC) to transfer \$600,000 from a Saint Joseph Road project to help pay for the wall. This affects a the section between Canal and Broadbent roads.

As a member of TCRPC I voted against moving the money, but the motion passed on a split vote.

The extension is in the final funding year and the funds must be obligated by August 1st or the federal funding, as I understand it, will be placed in a separate fund that all states can apply for. We would have to reapply for the funding.

Since there is no guarantee we would receive the funding, and no one wants to risk losing funding, a Plan B of secondary projects is under consideration. At this time, however, the road commission believes the environmental study will be complete and the funds obligated by August 1st.

I reviewed the preliminary list of projects on the Plan B list and was disappointed none of the projects were in Delta Township, and returning the \$600,000 to the Saint Joseph project wasn't on the list either. I questioned this and argued that if the road money is not obligated by August, our first priority should be returning funding to the Saint Joseph project.

I will keep you informed.

Michigan Avenue Feedback

Many people contacted me about the Michigan Avenue articles in the past newsletter. The majority informed me that they were not in favor of the extension and believe the money can be better utilized elsewhere in the community.

Not everyone agreed with me though. I heard from two constituents that favor the extension.

I mention this because while we shared our views with each other in more detail, we did not change each other's opinion, but agreed to disagree in a cordial and professional manner.

I would be foolish if I thought everyone was going to agree with me on all issues, but hopefully we can respectfully agree to disagree.

Equally important, I hope you always feel comfortable contacting me about an issue, even if you disagree.

Gettysburg Drain Assessment

The Gettysburg drain assessments were published May 24th and the cost of the project and homeowner assessments are quite alarming. The estimated project cost is 2.8 million dollars.

The special assessment affects over 250 homes in our district. The properties affected are located on Gettysburg, Harpers Way, Shiloh, Round Top, Mandel, Williamsburg, Charleston, Roanoke, Meade, Vicksburg, Harpers Way, Pickets, and other roads.

Most assessments are between \$7,000 and \$9,000, but several are over \$10,000 and the highest is around \$20,000. The assessments are applied to the tax bill, and will cover multiple years.


This is the 20th drain assessment in Delta Township and some homeowners are assessed for more than one drain upgrade.

We all recognize the need for sound drainage systems, but it is my opinion that we need to find a better way to achieve this goal than passing the burden directly onto the homeowner. We need to evaluate alternative options to building expensive systems and look for other funding sources.

Drain Failure

I received a call from a resident Saturday evening of the Memorial Day holiday weekend and was informed there was a drain compromise on Winlfred Street just south of Saginaw Highway. The water flooded the road and several homes. It was extensive. Emergency and BWL personnel were called to the scene.

I was out of town, but called Drain Commissioner Atayatan. He went out and surveyed the site and worked until 3 A.M. to clear the water and blockage. It turns out the lowest drain was blocked by three large cinder blocks.



Drains are like a toilet. They rely on water force to circulate and flush, and when this does not occur they overflow.


The cinder blocks alone are not the sole cause, but these are older drains that are stressed already and one or more blocked drains can cause major problems.

As your commissioner I have made this drain system one of my top priorities. I am working with the township, road commission, drain commission, and citizens to develop a long term solution.

I believe part of the problem is the lack of drain maintenance. There are 16 townships in Eaton County, but we only have 5 people employed in the drain office including a clerical position. It is impossible for them to patrol all streets and clean drains so I am asking for your help.

There are several ways you can help keep our drains functioning. Be sure to clear yard waste and leaves from your yard, and mow the lawn with the discharge facing the opposite of the road.

You can also help by removing debris on or around drain covers. Only a few weeks after the compromise, Commissioner Atayatan called me and asked me to look at a drain on Harriet. It was covered.



Clearing covers like this one will help the drain work properly and reduce the likelihood of road and basement flooding.

BARBECUED RIBS

1 cup brown sugar 5 cup onions, diced
1 teaspoon liquid smoke 3 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
3 tablespoons + 4 cup water 4 cup prepared mustard
1 cup catsup 4 teaspoon salt

Place ribs in glass baking dish. Add 3 tablespoon water to brown sugar, mix well and cover tops of ribs with sugar. Next, sprinkle liquid smoke across tops of ribs. Marinate ribs overnight. Next day, combine remaining ingredients (except salt) and bring to a boil. Set aside. Scrape sugar mixture from ribs, sprinkle ribs with salt. Cover ribs with sauce and bake for 1½ hours in 325 degree oven. Serves four to six.

RHUBARD UPSIDE-DOWN CAKE

Virginia Toomey

In a greased 9 X 13-inch pan put 5 cups finely diced rhubard. Sprinkle with 1 cup sugar, sprinkle 1 3-ounce package strawberry jello then spread 2 cups miniature marshallows.

1 box yellow cake mix--mix according to directions and spread on top of the rhubard mixture. Bake at 350° until cake is done.

My first newsletter featured an article about the many drain projects and the high costs passed on to homeowners, businesses, and local units of government in the form of special assessments. The article generated positive discussion from citizens, the drain office, and Delta Township officials. I am still working to identify projects and ensure future projects occur in a manner that is sensitive to the cost and impact on homeowners

Drain Commissioner Mike Atayan is onboard with me. He inherited these projects when he took office after the 2008 election. He has been a great help and has made himself available for questions and constituent problems. Thank vou Mike.

For example, the ink on my last newsletter was barely dry when I got a call from a resident on Harriet near Hoover informing me the drains were clogged and the intersection was flooded. I visited the resident and took several photos that I emailed to the township and drain commissioner. The drain was cleared within 24 hours.

We cannot solve all problems that quickly, and there are other issues with the drains in this area we must address, so I do not look at this as a permanent fix. We are working to get a better handle on all the issues as a whole, and I plan to hold a future meeting with residents, drain commission, road commission, and township officials to discuss the problems in detail.

The main topic in this newsletter is the Michigan Avenue expansion project. I offered a full page of the newsletter to Doug Kosinski. Doug lives on Glen Terra and is the unofficial leader of a group named Citizens Against Michigan Avenue Extension. Doug shares the groups perspective on the road expansion. I also included a follow-up article so you know my perspective as well.

This newsletter also contains information about upcoming events, another yummy recipe, a puzzle, and a charity in the spotlight.

Michigan Avenue Expansion - By the Citizens Against Michigan Avenue Extension

Delta Township and the Eaton County Road Commission are moving ahead with the extension of Michigan Avenue from Creyts Road to Canal Road. The new road will have a huge negative impact on homes close to it, but the costs go way beyond and will affect ALL Delta Township residents. Here are a few facts to consider.

- \$1.3 million has been budgeted for this road. In fact, a senior manager at MDOT put the cost of one mile of new road at well over \$3 million. That doesn't count costs to protect homes near the road, estimated at \$1.25 million. The additional \$3 MILLION will need to come from the Township or by taking funds from other worthwhile road projects.
- It has been claimed that the Michigan Avenue Extension will help with traffic on Saginaw. However, a traffic study conducted by a firm specializing in such work found that Michigan Avenue will have little, if any, positive impact on traffic on Saginaw.
- It has been claimed that Michigan Avenue is needed for public safety. The truth is that the new road will save only a little over ONE MINUTE on police and fire runs compared to existing routes.
- Supporters of Michigan Avenue claim that it is needed to support development. The only area available for significant new development is at the Creyts Road end of the proposed road. That area already has access to both Saginaw and Creyts and could be served by a short extension of Michigan to the West of Creyts AT A MUCH LOWER COST.
- A "compromise" plan that would do the short extension of Michigan Avenue and build a mixed use path for pedestrians, bike riders, roller bladers', etc. the rest of the way to Canal Road was rejected by the by the Township, even though it would avoid most of the negatives of the full extension and create a significant parkland asset for ALL Township residents.
- Other worthwhile projects are being sacrificed to pay for increasing costs of Michigan Avenue. It has been proposed to remove funding for improving St. Joe Hwy west of Canal to pay for Michigan Avenue

despite the fact that St. Joe is where most new development is occurring. Also, St. Joe is a primary alternative to Saginaw, running East/West all the way to M100, while the extension is a ONE MILE "road to nowhere", permanently dead ended at Canal Road.

 As everyone knows, roads in the Township are in TER-RIBLE shape. Building Michigan Avenue will use money that could go towards fixing roads we already have and create another road to take care of.

Thus, Michigan Avenue will accomplish almost nothing, destroy potential parkland and habitat, ruin property values, siphon money away from more worthwhile projects and be a poor long term use of Township funds. This affects EVERYONE. If this sounds like a bad use of YOUR tax dollars, PLEASE call or e-mail the Delta Township Board of Trustees and tell them!

Michigan Avenue - In My View

The Michigan Avenue expansion was planned in the early 1970s and that is one of the basic arguments for building it today. However, it is my belief the plan should have been abandoned when the Glen Terra subdivision was approved and built in the early 1990s. Review the small map below and I will explain why.

Several homes in the subdivision are built in direct line or proximately to the road, making it impossible to build the extension without curving the road southward and travel close to homes. It is estimated the road will travel just 30 feet form the back of master bedrooms.

The environmental study estimates excessive noise levels to the north and south side of the western portion of the extension. Current building standards require a sound barrier if the cost is about \$40,000 per residence or less. The north side of the road, the Glen Terra subdivision, meets this guideline, but it was determined it is too expensive for the south side.

The cost estimates for building the proposed sound wall on the north side to protect Glen Terra residents is \$700,000 and it is anticipated the wall will be as close as 15 feet to the back decks of some homes.

There are numerous other issues and this is a very complex problem. The debates have included traffic flow, public safety, and protecting neighborhoods. Both sides have presented arguments for and against.

I am against the expansion because of the threat and damage to surrounding neighborhoods.

I am also against the expansion because I am not convinced there is a need for it. The strongest argument I have heard is to allow access to the undeveloped property behind Mount Hope Church and the land north and west of Holloway Road, but the citizens against the extension put together an alternate plan to create an access road from Creyts Road westward about halfway inward. While this is not a perfect solution for residents, this would prevent the high traffic volume, significantly reduce the noise pollution, and stop cutthrough traffic on Williamsburg Road, and then to Sherman, Yorktown, and Charleston.

It is important for me to point out that in fairness to our township officials, whom I have great respect for, they inherited this problem. They were not involved in approving the road in the early 1970s or approving the Glen Terra subdivision in the 1990s.

I also understand it isn't easy to stop projects this far along. Time, money, and resources have been spent. Despite this challenge, I hope our local officials are able to get all parties together including homeowners, businesses, and landowners to discuss this issue and find a better solution than building the road as planned.

Electoral districts are realigned every 10 years in response to population changes determined by the result of the Census. The realignment is now complete. There are significant changes to County Commissioner districts that take effect for the 2012 election. I will discuss the changes in this newsletter.

The Eaton County Park Department is considering asking the Commissioners to approve a vote for a new millage. I asked the Park Department to provide me with information about the millage, and I am asking you to review it and let me know your thoughts. I will share all responses with the Park Department.

The Gettysburg Drain construction project has begun and the Michigan Avenue extension project is moving forward. I will provide you with an update on both of these projects.

We are still working on the 2011-12 Budget. The harsh reality is that we need to make cuts because county revenues are expected to be 2007-08 levels due to declining property values. To balance the budget we are asking all departments to make sacrifices.

New Districts

The new district maps will take affect for the 2012 election and representation beginning 2013.

The eastern boundary of our district will move westward from Harriet Rd to Stone Ridge Rd. Stone Ridge Rd is located just west of Mall Rd. If you live east of Stone Ridge Rd you will be in District 6. If you live south of Saint Joseph Hwy between Creyts Rd and Canal Rd you will be in District 7.

Additionally, I placed expanded versions of our current district and new district map on my website under the "Miscellaneous" tab.

Gettysburg Drain Construction

The Gettysburg project is underway and residents are seeing heavy construction in their neighborhoods. I am monitoring this project, but I need your help.

Let me know if you have any concerns about the project or if you experience property or road damage. The drain commission filmed the roads prior to the project and the contractor is required to repair damage they cause.

It should be noted though that the contractor is not required to repair roads that are already deteriorated. It can be difficult determining what was already deteriorated and what damage is caused by the construction, so I am glad the drain commission took the time to film the roads prior to construction beginning.

Gettysburg Drain Assessment Amounts

Several Residents have contacted me about their assessment amount, and how it was calculated.

I obtained information from the drain commission and placed 3 documents on my website. They are under the "Miscellaneous" tab. You need to locate your address on the "Proof of Mailing" report and write down your parcel number, then search the "Benefit Summary" report for your parcel number.

Feel free to call me if you do not use a computer or require assistance.

I encourage you to review the reports whether you are in the drain district or not. You might understand why I am frustrated with these projects. If you recall, I mentioned before there are 20 drain projects in Delta Township alone.

I cannot reemphasize enough that our current drain commissioner, Mike Atayatan, inherited these projects and he is working hard to control the projects and their associated costs. He is actively challenging new petitions, questioning existing ones, and seeking other funding sources.

Possible County Park Millage

The Eaton County Park Department notified us that they are considering asking the Board of Commissioners to approve a .25 millage vote for a future election. If they submit this request, and we approve it, it will place the request on the ballot for citizens to decide.

I asked the Park Department to provide me with information about the possible millage request so I can share it with you. I am asking you to send me an email, or call or write if you do not use email, and let me know your opinion. I will share all responses with the Park Department.

Please note, there is no millage planned at this time and no one is campaigning for one. I simply want to get your opinion in advance.

The first article on the next page is from input provided by the Park Department. I used smaller print so I can fit it all in this newsletter.

Input From the Park Department

The County Parks consist of 9 of the finest and most diverse parks in Michigan. The current budget of \$434,352 is less than \$50,000 per park including personnel costs, improvements, and maintenance. The estimated park operation is less than \$2.50 per person in Eaton County, while national averages are more than \$44 per person.

Vehicle passes generate approximately \$62,000 annually.

The Park Department, like other departments, is under pressure to reduce costs so the County can balance the budget. This year alone, the Park Department is being asked to reduce another \$47,000 from the County Budget.

The Park Department has reduced budgets several times in recent years, and the 2007-8 budget operations totaled over \$525,000.

Due to expected shortages, the Park Department is looking for other alternatives. One proposed alternative is to ask the voters for a millage of .25 per year to move Parks to self-dependence and relieve the County budget of nearly \$500,000 per year.

The estimated amount of revenue from a .25 millage is \$800,000, and Parks will share approximately \$200,000 of the revenue with local units of government for their park operations. It is estimated that Delta Township Parks, for example, will receive around \$30,000.

The remaining \$600,000 would fund full-time, seasonal and part-time operations staffing, as well as setting aside funds to participate with local matching funds that would enable participation in the Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund (3-1 match) and Land and Water Conservation Fund (50/50) matching grant programs.

This model has been used successfully by other counties, most recently St. Clair, and it will provide financial assistance to all 27 units of government for local projects, state/federal matching and joint collaboration for parks and recreation purposes.

Public information sessions are being considered and input from all constituents is encouraged. We feel it is important that County taxpayers are well informed on any and all proposals. The park millage proposal would cost the average taxpayer \$1.14 per month or \$13.75 per year based on a \$100,000 home with a taxable value of \$50,000.

What do you think? Please let County Commission Jim Osieczonek know your thoughts.

It is my understanding that there is a small delay period, likely for bids, final public input, etc... but construction can begin after that, probably around November. This is generally a poor time to begin construction so it could be delayed.

So unless there is an unforeseen delay, construction will likely begin soon.

I mentioned in the past newsletter that the Park Commission is considering asking County Commissioners to approve a request to have a .25 park millage placed on the ballot for citizens to vote on. Based on my request for feedback, I heard from 3 constituents and 1 was for it and 2 opposed it. The request now under consideration is a .5 park millage. At the bottom of this page is the reason for the increase. Let me know your thoughts.

The County Board approved the 2011-12 Budget. This was not an easy process and all departments had to make sacrifices. Due to declining property values, the expected revenues will be almost a million dollars lower than last year and will be around the 2007-08 levels. To balance the budget, we had to make some tough decisions. I have provided additional information about our budget in this newsletter.

My previous newsletters contained topics involving drains, flooding, and special assessments. I receive many calls regarding these issues. I also receive calls about our roads. Many people are unhappy with the road quality. I will discuss the financial challenge of me² in groads in this newsletter.

From the Park Commission — Possible .5 Park Millage

The Parks Commission increased the proposed millage during a discussion to consider a long term solutions to operate the nine site system, and provide matching funds for future projects. The increase would also permit the 27 governmental units to participate in single or collaborative projects that require matching funds. The Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund has a minimum of 25 percent matching funds, while the Land and Water Conservation Fund Act is a 50/50 match. The new DNR local unit Passport sharing program has matching fund requirements, but it could be cash or in-kind.

Over a period of 5-10 years, we could acquire a variety of trails, lake front, natural preserves, Grand River access points and address a 25-50 year old infrastructure of existing facilities at our nine sites.

County Budget

What is the annual County Budget?

The answer to that question depends on what you consider the budget to be.

When Administrators talk about "balancing the budget" they typically mean balancing the budget for the General Fund.

The General Fund covers all county appropriation, expenditure and receipt transactions, except those for which statutory requirements demand separate fund accounting. Most of the traditional county services are included in the General Fund, and it provides the resources necessary to sustain the day-to-day activities and thus pays for all administrative and operating expenses.

On September 23, 2011, the County Commissioners approved the 2011-12 Budget. This includes the General Fund of \$31,530,168, which is almost one million dollars less than last year's fund of \$32,505,935. This difference represents a 3.09 percent decrease.

As a result of the declining revenue, it was necessary that we cut positions, primarily through employee attrition and departmental cuts. The decisions we made were not easy, but we were able to develop a balanced budget without increasing fees or raising taxes - a goal of mine.

There are two other funds that are part of the budget. We adopted a Special Revenue fund of \$20,422,660 and a Debt Service fund of \$8,997,247 by line-items, for a total 2011-2012 budget of \$60,950,075.

The Special Revenue fund is an account established to collect money that must be used for a specific project. Special Revenue funds provide an extra level of accountability and transparency to taxpayers that their tax dollars will go toward an intended purpose.

Special Revenue line items include the Jail Millage, Juvenile Millage, and Veterans' Trust Fund.

The Debt Service Fund provides for the annual repayment of bonded debt principal and interest.

Debt Service line items include the Building Authority Jail, Dental Clinic, and Health Clinic.

Administrators have limited authority to transfer funds in the General Fund in order to balance the budget, and there are statutory restrictions on the other funds.

In addition to these three funds, the budget also contains personnel counts by department and other useful information.

For your convenience, I placed a copy of the budget on my website and I have asked the County to do so as well. If you are interested in knowing the anticipated revenue and expenditure in detail, take time to review the budget and do not hesitate to provide me feedback or suggestions.

Roads Conditions

A few months ago I attended a presentation by the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) and they provided an overview of the Michigan's Roads and Bridges 2010 Annual Report. The report was eye-opening.

The percentage of roads rated in "good" pavement conditions has steadily dropped from 24 percent of the roads having a good rood rating in 2004 to 18 percent having the same rating in 2010. The percentage of roads with a "fair" rating has steadily dropped from 62 percent in 2004 to 47 percent with the same rating in 2010.

Based on these numbers it should be no surprise that the percentage of roads in "poor" condition increased during this same period. Roughly 12 percent of the roads were in poor condition in 2004, and it increased to 33 percent in 2010.

I placed a copy of the entire 2010 Annual Report on my website for you to review. You can find it under the "Miscellaneous" tab.

Road Conditions — (continued)

While the MDOT 2010 Annual Report provides quantitative data showing our roads are in poor condition, we don't need a report to tell us this. All we need to do is drive on our roads. It is even more apparent once we cross the state line and travel through other states.

The main problem is a lack of funding. Monies for the state's transportation system comes from state, local, and federal sources. State-generated revenue supplies the majority of the income and is collected primarily through Michigan's fuel taxes (19 cents per gallon on gasoline and 15 cents per gallon on diesel fuel), motor-vehicle registration fees, and sales tax collected on vehicles.

Michigan has been in the bottom 10 of all states for local transportation funding since 1960. In addition, fuel tax revenues have dropped in recent years because cars are more fuel efficient and people are driving less, which has caused transportation funding to decline even further while asphalt and other construction costs have risen.

County Road Commissions are struggling to maintain local roads, and have focused efforts on the primary roads.

There are high-level state discussions to address this problem.

EATRAN is Hiring Part-Time Drivers

EATRAN is currently accepting applications for part-time bus drivers. You must have a good driving record and no criminal history. Holding a Commercial Driver License (CDL) is a plus, but not a requirement because you can earn one as part of your training process.

These are part-time jobs, but those that do well receive strong consideration when a full-time position becomes available.

The Eaton County Veterans Services office helps veterans and their families obtain and maintain all veterans related benefits from federal, state and local government agencies.

Veteran Services is dedicated to ensuring that the sacrifices of our nation's veterans are recognized and that they and their families receive all veterans benefits to which they are entitled.

Eaton County Dental Clinic

I want to remind everyone that we have an Eaton County Dental Clinic in Charlotte.

The target populations served by the clinic are adults and children on Medicaid (including Health Kids Dental and MIChild), as well as low income, uninsured individuals whose income is below 200% of the Federal poverty level.

There is a \$50 non-refundable application fee for the non-insured that will be credited to the first visit.

This newsletter contains information about a bond refunding we recently authorized that will save the County Medical Care Facility an impressive \$651,494 over the remaining life of the bonds.

It also contains a follow-up article on the Road Commission. We recently held a public hearing to seek citizen input on whether or not we should reduce the size of the board from five to three. You may recall the size of the board was increased in 2007.

I tried to eliminate the excessive Road Commission healthcare benefits for good, but was unable to muster enough votes to do so and they will have to sunset out in a few years. I discuss this in more detail.

Finally, I have served as your County Commission for a year and I again want to express my appreciation to everyone that voted for me. I am truly honored to be your representative. I strive to listen to your concerns and to make decisions that are in the best interest of the citizens. I recognize the tough economic conditions and the struggles everyday citizens have just to get by financially, and I take that into consideration when making all decisions.

What's Coming Up

There are three millages coming up for renewal that will be on the August or November ballot this year. They are the Juvenile Millage at a rate of .35, the 911 Millage at .95, and EATRAN at .25 of a mill.

The Parks Commission is also seeking a millage. They asked the Public Works and Planning Commission, which I am a member of, to move a .5 parks millage to the full Board of Commissioners for consideration. It was clear to all that there was not enough support for this request and the motion was tabled. The Parks Commission will reconsider their request.

EATRAN has done a lot of work developing a new business model and transportation plan that will include fixed routes. I will provide you with an update in the next newsletter.

Saving Money Through Refinancing

I have some great news to share with you.

County Commissioners recently approved the refinancing of bonds that were used to fund the original 100-bed medical care facility. The refunding results in an impressive savings of \$651,494 over the remaining life of the bonds.

I am very proud of this and commend everyone for working together to ensure we take advantage of this opportunity.

Road Commission

In my pas't newsletter I discussed the lack of road funding and how it presented challenges for the Road Commission to properly maintain our roads.

Some responded and said they agreed that we need to find a better way to fund our roads, and others responded saying they were satisfied with our roads and we should not expect perfect roads.

I concur that we should not expect perfect roads, but we should expect them to be safe and maintained properly. Many of our primary roads are in poor condition, and some of the side roads and subdivisions are in even worse condition.

While the core problem is lack of funding, there are steps we can take to ensure we are spending our dollars as efficiently as possible.

The 2007-08 County Commissioners Board held a public hearing October 17, 2007 on whether or not to increase the number of Road Commissioners from three to five. Many people attended this hearing and everyone that addressed the Board stated they were against increasing the number of Road Commissioners. Their main argument against increasing the size is that it was an unnecessary expansion of government and a poor use of monies intended for road maintenance.

Despite the strong unanimous public opposition, the County Commissioners at that time increased the size of the Road Commission. At the time the resolution was approved, the Road Commissioners received full healthcare benefits. The cost of the healthcare benefits cost approximately \$20,000 for each commissioner. This cost is in addition to their salary and Per Diem of approximately \$4,000 annually.

Thus, the cost of increasing the Road Commission by 2 members was about \$48,000 annually.

In my opinion, paying for Road Commissioners health insurance with money intended for maintaining roads is a poor use of taxpayer dollars.

I am not alone. Largely due to public pressure and criticism, the County Commissioners passed a resolution on December 16, 2009 requiring all Road Commissioners to pay 25 percent of their healthcare costs, and required any new or reappointed commissioner to pay 100 percent of the cost if they choose to participate in the program.

While this was a big improvement, it is my belief that this resolution did not go far enough. Three of the Road Commissioners were eligible for the 75 percent matching costs last year, and all three took advantage of this benefit by participating in the program. The Road Commission's share was approximately \$45,000 last year for the three.

Two of the Road Commissioners are eligible for the 75 percent healthcare coverage this year, and one of them in 2013. Assuming they continue to take advantage of the program, the Road Commission's cost will be approximately \$45,000 until the healthcare benefit sunsets on January 1, 2014.

Recognizing this, I introduced a resolution to end the 75 percent matching for Road Commissioner healthcare benefits effective January 1, 2012 so the money could be used for road repairs, but unfortunately the resolution failed to achieve enough votes to pass at the November 16, 2011 County Commissioner Board Meeting.

While I wish the resolution would have passed, I am satisfied with my effort to eliminate these excessive benefits.

Road Conditions — (continued)

As I mentioned, everyone that spoke out at the 2007 public hearing was against increasing the size of the board, but the County Commissioners voted to increase it anyway.

The current County Commissioners held a public hearing on December 21, 2011 to seek public input on reducing the size of the Road Commission Board to three, where it had always been up until the 2007 increase.

While it was not unanimous, the majority of people that spoke at the hearing wanted us to reduced the size of the road commission. Many of them stated they attended the first public hearing in 2007 and were upset the Commissioners did not listen to them at that time.

We listened to the public and took other factors into consideration. For example, almost 75 percent of the counties with a road commission only have 3 commissioners, and Larry Adams who is one of the current commissioners stated that he saw no reason for having 5 road commissioners, and felt having 5 was not using money efficiently.

We passed the resolution to reduce the number of Road Commissioners from 5 to 3 on a split vote. I voted in favor of reducing the size of the Road Commission Board.

Because County Commissioners do not have the authority to remove Road Commissioners, the board will be reduced by not filling appointments in 2012 and 2013. We will have four Road Commissioners in 2012 and in 2013 the board will be officially reduced to three.

Is the Road Commission Needed

The State Legislature is deliberating a Bill that will allow County Commissioners the authority to eliminate Road Commission Boards and to take over the responsibly of the Road Commission.

This is a bi-partisan Bill. I will provide you with an update if the legislation moves forward.

This newsletter contains many updates that I hope you find helpful.

There are 3 millages up for reconsideration and the millage dates have been set. I will provide you with information about the millages and the ballot schedule.

The newsletter provides you with a brief update on the Michigan Avenue Extension from Creyts Road to Canal Road.

County Commissioners recently completed a 2 day long-range strategic planning session. This is just the beginning of our formalized planning. I will provide an update in this newsletter.

Finally, it is election season and door knocking will begin soon. If you do not want candidates knocking on your door to talk to you then I suggest placing a "NO SOLICITING" sign on your door. I have included one in this newsletter for your convenience. All you have to do in out and tape it on your door.

What's Happening in Delta Township

Independence Day Fireworks is on Tuesday, July 3rd at Sharp Park. A live concert by PowerLight (Motown) will be held from 6:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. at the amphitheater. Limited parking is available at the park. A concession stand will be open for purchasing refreshments or you may bring your own picnic lunch, grill, or cooler. A permit is required for alcoholic beverages and one can be obtained at the Parks and Recreation Department at no charge. Fireworks begin at 10:00 p.m.

Touch-A-Truck is a great event for kids to see, climb on, and learn about many different types of trucks. It is Saturday, August 11th from 9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at Sharp Park.

FREE Concert at Sharp Park—Bring your lawn chair or blanket as the Capital City Grove (Rock, POP, Motown) are scheduled to perform Tuesday, August 21st from 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m.

Strategic Planning

County Commissioners recently participated in 2 full days of strategic planning. The primary objective of the formalized planning session was to formulate a vision of where we want the County to be, ensure the County is fiscally strong even during hard times, and develop a plan to help us get there.

I am happy to report that all 15 Commissioners and representatives from county departments attended the planning sessions. The group demonstrated great teamwork in order to identify the many challenges we face.

We are working on the final document, but as you can image, it contains an in-depth list of issues. The topics include the budget, public safety, roads, drains, parks, economic development, senior services, as well as health and human services.

The plan is fluid. We will review and update it often. As your Commissioner, I seek your input. What is your vision of the County? What areas do you think we should focus on the most?

Feel free to call or email me with your input and I will share it with the County Board and leadership so we can review your suggestions.

Strategic Planning—Committee Level

As the Chairperson of the Information Technology and Communications Committee I plan to take the strategic planning to the committee level. I have many ideas to help us operate more efficiently, save money, increase citizen involvement, and improve communication. I will keep you informed as we move forward.

Parks Millage Request

The Park's Commission asked the Public Works and Planning Committee, which I am a member of, to approve a .5 mill increase to help maintain services and future expansion.

I am a past board member and a lifetime member of Woldumar Nature Center. I have a passion for

nature and our parks, but we must look at the whole picture.

Some asked the Public Works Committee to forward the request to the full Board, so the full Board could approve the request and let the citizens decide, but I believe that this approach shirks my responsibilities of representing you.

I walked door-to-door and met many of you and listened to your concerns. I hear those that are struggling to make ends meet and fighting to keep their home. Therefore, I am not voting to approve a ballot request for a non-essential tax increase, especially during hard economic times.

Most politicians list home foreclosures at the top when asked what are their primary concerns. We are not helping people keep their homes if we authorize a millage ballot request that ultimately increases property taxes and rent if approved.

The request to place this millage on the ballot failed in the Public Works Committee and the Parks Commission instead applied for a grant through the Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund. The royalties in this fund are derived from the sale and lease of state-owned mineral rights and is intended for this purpose.

The County Board supported this application on the condition no that public funds were used, and any matching funds come from private sources.

EATRAN Planning Changes

EATRAN is working on a plan to adjust routes so they can provide service to more people.

This plan involves offering direct routes from the large communities such as Delta Township, Grand Ledge, and Charlotte.

A separate plan is also being discussed for CATA to extend their service from the Lansing Mall to Market Place, where Wal-Mart and the other big box stores are located.

Both plans are in early the stages of development and are independent of each other.

Upcoming Millage Renewals

There are three County Millages that will be on the August or November ballots this year. All three are for a continuation of services and there is no property tax increase if they pass.

Here is a list of the millages:

911 Millage is for .95 mills and is scheduled for the August primary election. The purpose is to provide continued funding for a comprehensive countywide 911 service.

Juvenile Justice Millage is for .35 mills and is scheduled for the August primary election. The purpose is to provide continued funding for preventive and treatment programs for abused, neglected, delinquent, and at-risk Juveniles.

EATRAN Millage is for a .25 mills and is scheduled for the November general election. The purpose is to provide continuous support for the countywide bus transportation.

The millage vote is critical for EATRAN because they will run out of operating funding and cease operations if the millage fails. This is because EATRAN relies on State and Federal grant dollars and these grants require local matching funds. The millage is used for operations and meets the requirement for matching funds.

There is not enough time to place the millage back on the ballot if it fails, and the county budget, which has its own challenges, cannot afford the annual matching funds of approximately \$800,000.

Michigan Avenue Update

The Michigan Avenue Extension from Creyts Road to Canal Road is underway.

The road commission has informed me that they expect the project to be completed by October.

Residents have complained about the large amount of dust so I have been working with Delta Township and the road commission to try to control it and keep the as area clean as possible.

Budget Process Begins

County Commissioners are working with the comptroller and other departments to create a sound balanced budget for the upcoming fiscal year of 2012-13.

I provided you an overview of the current year budget in the Volume 5, October 2011 newsletter and discussed the challenges of creating a balance budget without increasing taxes or cutting core services. This update is available on my website at www.jim4c.com - click on the newsletter tab.

The budget challenges are even greater this year. Overall assessment amounts are estimated to drop by 3.41 percent this year. This is the fourth year in a row of declining assessment values, and that means less money for county operations.

Campaign Season

There are many elections this year and the door knocking will likely be heavier than normal.

It my experience that most people appreciate candidates taking time to visit them to introduce themselves and discuss the issues, but others prefer not to be bothered.

Therefore, I included a "NO SOLITICTING" sign in this newsletter for those that prefer privacy.

If you tape the sign on your door I will not knock. If you want to see me, but not candidates, write "Except Jim O" on it.

Thank you for your timely delivery of the rebuttal letter sent by Jim Osieczonek regarding his campaign finance violations. I strongly believe that the information Mr. Osieczonek provided further clarifies how he did indeed violation the Michigan Campaign Finance Act (MCFA), 1976 P.A. 366, MCL 169.201 regarding his failures to report.

In regards to Mr. Osieczonek's response of "Item 1 – The website cost is listed under the 10/20/2008 Pre-election – General" it is important to note that per domain registrar whois search results the website in question (<u>www.Jim4C.com</u>) has the following domain registration data:

Please note the Creation Date listed as July 8, 2006 meaning that a domain registration and hosting fee would have been paid on that date in 2006 yet Mr. Osieczonek does not list any domain registration, web hosting fees, or website design expenses until the 2008 Pre-Election report and there is no additional filing of website expenditures after 2008. But we can tell by this domain whois that there has been activity in domain renewals given the "Updated Date" information. And with most domain registrations and hostings payment is typically monthly, yearly, or every other year. The only listing that can be found for this is in his 2008 Pre-Election report.

Turning to the matter of newsletters, by his own admission his campaign did spend significant dollars on newsletters beginning on 3/8/2011 and failed to adhere to campaign finance law in doing so. By all accords the expenses should have been filed in a 2011 Annual Report due in

January of 2012 after he exceeding the \$1,000 reporting waiver threshold. No filing was made by his campaign for that report. He likewise acknowledges by default that he failed to submit a Pre-Primary 2012 campaign finance report despite having expenses as late as 8/27/2012. Again, no Pre-Primary 2012 report was filed by his campaign despite exceeding the reporting waiver expenditure exemption. Further he acknowledges that he was six days delinquent in posting a Post-Primary 2012 campaign finance report by providing his filing date of 9/12/2012 when the report was due on 9/6/2012.

Using the data Mr. Osieczonek provides in his belated Post Primary 2012 report we find the following expenditures in 2011:

- 1. March 8, 2011 a Newsletter via Gladstone Printing for \$559.15
- 2. May 9, 2011 a Newsletter via Gladstone Printing for \$400.00
- 3. May 9, 2011 a repeated Newsletter expenditure via Gladstone Printing for \$400.00
- 4. May 12, 2011 a Newsletter via Gladstone Printing for \$170.93
- 5. July 18, 2011 a Newsletter via Gladstone Printing for \$450.00
- 6. July 21, 2011 a Newsletter via Gladstone Printing for \$520.72
- 7. September 2, 2011 a Newsletter via Gladstone Printing for \$900.00
- 8. November 17, 2011 a Newsletter via Gladstone Printing for \$1,052.66

By his own account then, Mr. Osieczonek's campaign reporting waiver (spend of under \$1,000) was exceeded by May of 2011. This would have required Mr. Osieczonek to report all of his contributions and expenditures in the 2011 Annual Report due at the end of January 2012. He failed to meet this requirement as he did not file that report.

Likewise, Mr. Osieczonek further offers that an additional \$1971.34 was paid on newsletters in the first half of 2012, yet he did not file a 2012 Pre-Primary Election campaign finance report.

Mr. Osieczonek advises in his rebuttal letter that "all are listed on the 9/12/2012 Post Primary Statements." Enclosed you will find print outs of that report with highlights for the newsletter expenses. In essense by making such a response he is actually clearly articulating that he failed to correctly file either the 2011 Annual Report, 2012 Pre-Primary report, and was six days late in filing his 2012 Post-Primary report.

Finally, while the expenditures are clearly over \$6,000 in total, Mr. Osieczonek's report gives no indication of who paid the expenses. The sole report he did file makes no mention of contributions, loans, or in-kind contributions to the campaign committee. Mr. Osieczonek is not publically disclosing the very information that is required by the Michigan Campaign Finance Act of 1976. Currently he is showing a negative balance for his candidate committee of more than \$8,000 and there is absolutely no indication of who made contributions to his campaign that allowed him to acquire over \$8,000 worth of goods and services. Even the single \$500 donation received on 8/15/2008 shown in his 2008 Pre-General Election report is improper as by date it should have been disclosed in the 2008 Pre-Primary report where he shows zero contributions.

With those specific details, I do hope that you will take further action investigating and making appropriate sanctions for his omissions of the following:

- 1. 2011 Annual Report as his reporting waiver was exceeded in May, 2011
- 2. 2012 Pre-Primary Report as his reporting waiver was exceeded in July, 2012
- 3. Six days late on filing a 2012 Post-Primary Report
- 4. Failure to report campaign loans or contributions (in-kind or otherwise) for expenditures of over \$6,000 in 2011 / 2012.
- 5. Showing a negative balance of \$8,299.84 on his latest campaign finance report

Additionally, given the erratic reporting of the website expense and delayed reporting of contribution in the 2006 and 2008 cycles, I would ask that further inquiry be made into his adherence to Michigan Campaign Finance law.

Thank you for your attention to this matter. Enclosed please find a printed copy of his delayed 2012 Post-Primary report which has the evidence to back this complaint.





Dear Ms. Bourbonais,

Ms. Pearl-Wright has introduced new allegations in her follow-up complaint. Out of respect for all parties and to properly manage this complaint, I am requesting that your office freeze this complaint and limit it to the items currently submitted.

My response to the original complaint by former County Commissioner Pearl-Wright adequately addressed the following allegations:

- 1. The August 7 2012 Post Primary dated 03/08/11 to 08/27/12 was filed and is online.
- 2. The Newsletters are accounted for in the August 7 2012 Post Primary.
- 3. The website is listed under the 10/20/2008 Pre-election General

However, Ms. Pearl-Wright is also questioning the domain registration cost related to item 3. The domain name was registered 9/15/2006 for multiple years and is listed on my 2006 Pre General Election form. The highlighted date (26-Sep-2012) on the printout is the date that I changed the domain network settings (DNS) to point to my new website that is hosted by Discount ASP and has nothing to do with payment. It is a simple account update similar to updating one's address. The new website hosting company is listed on my 2012 Pre General and is now online.

All campaign contributions are listed on my reports. All expenses made in excess of the contributions were made by me. If my expenditures should be listed on the forms a contribution or loan then I can amend the statements.

Initially, I did not believe I would spend or receive more than \$1,000 for my 2008 and 2010 campaigns, but it soon became apparent that I would so I submitted a modification. However, now that I review the statements, it appears that I did the opposite. In other words, I thought I requested the waiver on the original campaign registration when I did not and I later submitted an amended statement which inadvertently stated I am requesting a waiver. This is a simple administrative mistake and can be easily fixed with an amended form.

What is most important is that all expenses and donations to my campaign are listed. Again, the expenditures beyond donations were paid for by me.

Contrary to the complaint, the newsletters, website, web-hosting and other expenses are listed on my reports and each individual or PAC contribution is listed as well. I am happy to work with your office to Cross the T's and Dot I's to ensure the statements meet expectations.

I wish to restate my point in the prior letter that I believe in handling issues at the lowest level. As a former county commissioner Ms. Wright should know frivolous complaints are costly and exhaust valuable government resources. While she states on her LinkedIn account she is a "problem solver" and "bridge builder" her actions do not support these claims.

I believe Ms. Pearl-Wrights' motive for making this a big issue is to use your office and the press to make this a campaign issue.

Ms. Pearl-Wright contacted Mr. Alan Miller, a reporter from the Lansing State Journal, and provided him with details of the complaint. Mr. Miller contacted me prior to your office contacting me and that is how I first learned about the complaint. Mr. Miller quickly determined there was no story here.

Additionally, Ms. Pearl-Wright in a desperate attempt to win her seat back mailed negative literature that attacked me with numerous false claims under the heading of "Failures of Jim Osieczonek" and the first one on the list is "Faces investigation for campaign Finance Reporting violations." I have included a portion of this postcard that shows this.

I am confident your office will recognize this as a politically charged complaint and take this into consideration whenever Ms. Pearl-Wright submits a complaint of any nature.

I look forward to working with your office to correct any discrepancies.

Dear Mr. Osieczonek:

The Department of State (Department) has completed its initial investigation of a complaint filed against you by Jeanne Pearl-Wright, which alleged that you violated the Michigan Campaign Finance Act (MCFA or Act), 1976 PA 388, MCL 169.201 et seq. This letter concerns the disposition of Ms. Pearl-Wright's complaint.

The MCFA requires a committee that receives or expends more than \$1,000.00 during any reporting period to file periodic campaign finance reports in compliance with the Act. MCL 169.233(6). The failure to file a single campaign statement may trigger the assessment of late filing fees, while the failure to file two or more campaign statements is a misdemeanor offense. MCL 169.233(7)-(8).

The Act also requires the Department to "endeavor to correct the violation or prevent a further violation by using informal methods[,]" if it finds that "there may be reason to believe that a violation ... has occurred[.]" MCL 169.215(10). The objective of an informal resolution is "to correct the violation or prevent a further violation[.]" *Id*. If the Department is unable to correct or prevent additional violations, it may convene an administrative hearing or ask the Attorney General to prosecute if a crime has been committed. *Id*.

The complaint was filed by Ms. Pearl-Wright on September 25, 2012. You filed a written response on October 11, 2012, and Ms. Pearl-Wright filed a rebuttal statement on October 25, 2012. You provided additional information to the Department on November 15, 2012 and received guidance from the Department on January 23, 2013 regarding your committee and your filed statements.

Ms. Pearl-Wright alleged that you failed to file your 2011 Annual campaign finance statement, your 2012 pre-election primary campaign finance statement, and your 2012 post-election primary campaign finance statement. Ms. Pearl-Wright further alleged that you failed to report funds used to maintain a website and to produce and distribute newsletters. In support of her complaint, Ms. Pearl-Wright provided newsletters, a screen shot of a website, and copies of newsletters printed from a website.

In response, you stated that the website cost is listed on your October 28, 2008 pre-election general campaign finance statement and that your costs for newsletters from March 8, 2011 through August 27, 2012 are listed on your September 12, 2012 post-election primary statement.

After reviewing your filed campaign finance statements, the Department contacted the Eaton County Clerk on January 15, 2013. The Eaton County Clerk is the appropriate filing official for your statements. MCL 169.236(6).

After carefully reviewing all of the evidence provided by both parties, conferring with the Eaton County Clerk, and reviewing your filed statements, the Department finds that the evidence supports a reason to believe that a violation of the MCFA has occurred. The Department is advising that you owe an Annual 2011 campaign finance statement and a 2012 pre-election primary campaign finance statement. Additionally, the Department notes that you have met with a campaign finance specialist in the Department to correct any errors in reporting that may have occurred in statements that have already been filed.

The Act requires the Department to use informal methods correct the violations or prevent further violations. MCL 169.215(10). At this time, the Department is engaging in this informal process and you are endeavoring to correct the violations. You have advised the Department that you expect to file the outstanding reports and make any amendments necessary by January 30, 2013.

The Department notes that a late-filing fee may be assessed by the Eaton County Clerk for any statement that is not timely filed. MCL 169.233(7). Late-filing fees are assessed and collected by the filing official with whom the statements are filed. MCL 169.217(1). Any questions regarding these late-filing fees should be directed to the Eaton County Clerk.

Once the Department reviews your outstanding statements and any amendments necessary, the Department will determine whether proper disclosure has been made and the violations corrected.
