



## Filing for Office: U.S. Representative in Congress

Michigan Election Law governs the ballot access procedures for candidates seeking the office of U.S. Representative in Congress. As these procedures are subject to change by the state Legislature, candidates interested in participating in Michigan's August Primary Election or November General Election are encouraged to consult our website, [Michigan.gov/Elections](https://Michigan.gov/Elections), for updates.

### General requirements

Certain requirements of Michigan Election Law and federal law are applicable to all candidates seeking the office of U.S. Representative in Congress regardless of political party affiliation.

**Office qualifications:** To be eligible for the office of U.S. Representative in Congress, a person must be a citizen of the United States for seven years, at least 25 years of age, and an inhabitant of the state of Michigan when elected (US Const, art I, § 2).

**Affidavit of Identity:** Except for write-in candidates, all candidates for U.S. Representative in Congress must submit an [Affidavit of Identity](#) in duplicate when filing for office (MCL 168.558). Affidavit of Identity forms can be obtained through any county clerk's office or from the Bureau of Elections (BOE). The Affidavit of Identity form is also available on BOE's website under "[Ballot Access](#)."

Candidates who fail to comply with the Affidavit of Identity filing requirement are ineligible to appear on the ballot.

**Campaign finance reports:** Representative in Congress candidates are required to comply with the financial disclosure requirements provided under federal law. Additionally, Michigan Election Law requires any candidate running for U.S. Representative in Congress and filing an Affidavit of Identity to state on the form that on the date the affidavit was executed, all statements, reports, late filing fees, and fines required of the candidate, or any candidate committee organized under the Campaign Finance Act to support the candidate's election have been paid or filed. **Candidates that have any outstanding notices of Failure to File or outstanding late filing fees with any filing official in the State are ineligible to appear on the ballot (MCL 168.558).**

## Major party candidates

Michigan's August Primary is limited to eligible candidates who affiliate with the Democratic Party or the Republican Party. (In order for a party to be eligible to participate in the August Primary, the party's principal candidate must have received at least 5% of the total number of votes cast for the office of Secretary of State in the last preceding state election. A party's principal candidate is the candidate whose name appears nearest the top of the party column. See MCL 168.532).

**Filing requirements:** A candidate seeking the Democratic Party or Republican Party nomination to the office of U.S. Representative in Congress must file an [Affidavit of Identity](#) in duplicate and partisan nominating petitions no later than 4 p.m. on the 15th Tuesday before the August Primary (MCL 168.133). **Please see the chart at the end of the document for the current election cycle filing deadlines.**

Such candidates will appear on the August Primary Election ballot; the winning nominees will appear on the November General Election ballot.

**Withdrawal:** The deadline to withdraw a candidate filing for party nomination is 4 p.m. of the third day after the filing deadline (MCL 168.134). The withdrawal must be in writing and must be filed with the proper filing official.

**Petition requirements:** All petitions used by candidates must be in the form required under Michigan Election Law. Sample petition forms can be obtained through BOE or any county clerk's office. Petition sheets may be purchased from commercial suppliers that produce election materials.

Candidates seeking the Democratic Party or Republican Party nomination must use the **Partisan Nominating Petition form**. Candidates seeking the office of U.S. Representative in Congress are strongly encouraged to use the **Partisan Nominating Petition (Countywide) form**. A candidate must submit at least **1,000** valid signatures and may submit up to **2,000** signatures. Access to the ballot via filing fee is **not** available (MCL 168.133; MCL 168.544f).

## Minor party candidates

In addition to the Democratic and Republican parties, other political parties are qualified<sup>1</sup> to appear on Michigan's November General Election ballot. (In order for a party to be qualified to appear on the General Election ballot, *any one* of the party's candidates whose names appeared in the party's column on the last preceding General Election ballot in which a Secretary of State was elected had to have

received at least 1% of the total number of votes cast for the winning candidate for the office of Secretary of State in the previous election at which a Secretary of State was elected. See MCL 168.560a.

**Convention deadline:** A candidate seeking the office of U.S. Representative in Congress as a minor party candidate must receive nomination to the office at the party's nominating convention. The party's convention must be held no later than the August Primary (MCL 168.686a).

Within one business day after the conclusion of the nominating convention, party officials must submit a Certificate of Nomination to document the individual's nomination to the office, an [Affidavit of Identity](#) in duplicate completed by the candidate and a [Certificate of Acceptance](#) completed by the candidate. The Certificate of Acceptance form is available on BOE's website under "Ballot Access."

**Withdrawal:** Candidates nominated and certified via convention are not permitted to withdraw (MCL 168.686a(4)).

## Candidates without political party affiliation

Candidates seeking the office of U.S. Representative in Congress may do so without political party affiliation. These candidates are only eligible to appear on the November General Election ballot and will be listed as "No Party Affiliation."

**Filing requirements:** A candidate without political party affiliation seeking the office of U.S. Representative in Congress must file an [Affidavit of Identity](#) in duplicate and qualifying petitions no later than 4 p.m. on the 110th day before the General Election (MCL 168.590c(2)). **Please see the chart at the end of the document for the current election cycle filing deadlines.**

**Withdrawal:** The deadline to withdraw for a candidate without party affiliation is 4 p.m. of the third day after the filing deadline. The withdrawal must be in writing and must be filed with the appropriate filing official (MCL 168.590c(3)).

**Petition requirements:** All petitions used by candidates must be in the form required under Michigan Election Law. Sample petition forms can be obtained through BOE or any county clerk's office. Forms may be purchased from commercial suppliers that produce election materials.

Candidates seeking nomination without political party affiliation must use the **Countywide Qualifying Petition form**. A candidate must submit at least **3,000** valid signatures and may submit up to **6,000** signatures (MCL 168.544f).

All signatures submitted on a qualifying petition must have been collected within the preceding 180-day period; signatures which are dated more than 180 days prior to the date the petition is filed are invalid (MCL 168.590b(3)).



## Write-in candidates

**Filing requirements:** A candidate seeking election to the office of U.S. Representative in Congress with write-in votes must file a [Declaration of Intent](#) with BOE no later than 4 p.m. on the second Friday immediately before Election Day (MCL 168.737a). **Please see the chart at the end of the document for the current election cycle filing deadlines.**
