## Voting in Person

If you are registered, you can vote in person with an absentee ballot **at your city or township clerk's office** up to 45 days prior to an election. Another option (in all statewide and federal elections) is to vote in person **at an early voting site**, which is offered for at least 9 days in advance of Election Day. The last option to vote in person is **at your designated polling place** on Election Day.

Polls are open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. local time and you have the right to vote as long as you are in line by 8 p.m. on Election Day.

### Finding your voting location

You easily can find your early voting site, your Election Day polling place or your city or township clerk information by visiting **Michigan.gov/Vote**.

### What to expect:

When you arrive at your voting location, you will be asked to show a form of photo ID. Accepted ID types include:

- Driver's license or state ID issued in Michigan or another state
- Federal, state, county, local or military government-issued photo identification
- U.S. passport
- Student identification with photo from a high school or accredited institution of higher learning
- Tribal identification card with photo

If you don't have a photo ID, you can still vote. A poll worker will ask you to sign a form before you vote that explains you didn't have an ID.

You will then be checked in by a poll worker, checked against the active voter roster list and be handed a ballot and a sleeve to protect the secrecy of your vote.

After entering the booth, you will mark your ballot and then return the ballot into the sleeve.

Once you insert your ballot into the tabulator, you have officially cast your ballot. Make sure to take an "I voted" sticker if one is available.
