



Information for Michigan voters

Voter registration timeline and deadlines

No proof of residency required

..... **15+ days before Election Day**

Register to vote at your city or township clerk's office, online, by mail, or at designated voter registration agencies.

Proof of residency required

..... **Within 14 days of Election Day**

In-person registration only, at your city or township clerk's office. *Voters cannot register to vote online for the upcoming election at this time.*

Proof of residency required

..... **On Election Day**

In-person registration only, at your city or township clerk's office. *Voters cannot register to vote online for the current election or at a polling place to vote on Election Day.*

Proof of residency

Official documents, print or digital, displaying a voter's current name and address. Examples:

- Driver's license or state ID card
- Tribal ID card
- Current utility bill
- Bank or credit card statement
- Government check
- Lease or mortgage

Vote your way: Options for voting in Michigan

Vote absentee

Vote by mail or at your local clerk's office. Apply online, by mail, or in person at your local clerk's office. Return your completed and signed ballot by mail, by ballot drop box, or in person at your local clerk's office by 8 p.m. on Election Day.

- The permanent absentee ballot mailing list allows voters to receive a mailed ballot for every upcoming election.
- Every community now offers at least one ballot drop box.
- Prepaid return envelopes are now provided for absentee ballots and applications mailed by your clerk.
- Absentee ballot-tracking features are available for status updates.

Vote early

Vote at an early voting site to submit your ballot directly for all statewide elections (local election availability varies). Early voting is available for 9+ days, for 8 hours each day, ending the Sunday before Election Day. (Early voting may also be offered on the Monday before Election Day until 4 p.m.)

Vote on Election Day

Registered voters can vote at their polling place on Election Day. Unregistered voters can visit their local clerk's office to register and vote.
