



Action Required to vote in the November 5, 2024 election



You were registered to vote today, but the election is two weeks or less away and **you need to make a plan if you want to vote in the November 5 election.**

If you're **registering for the first time** or **if your previous voter registration was in a state other than Michigan** and you want to vote in the November 5 election, you must visit your Michigan city or township clerk's office and register in-person between now and 8 p.m. on November 5.

If your previous voter registration was in Michigan you have the following three options:

- 1:** Visit your new city or township clerk's office and register in-person between now and 8 p.m. on November 5.
- 2: If you moved to your new city or township fewer than 60 days before November 5,** you may request and vote an absentee ballot from your former city or township clerk.
- 3: If you moved to your new city or township fewer than 60 days before November 5,** you may vote at your old early voting site or polling place in your old city or township one last time.



If you don't want to vote in the November 5 election, you don't need to do anything. You will be registered to vote and may vote in all future elections following the November 5 election. We'll mail you a voter information card after this election.
