Democracy is a form of government where people have a say in how the government is run.




#### How are elections in MI administered?



**1,520 city and township clerks** across the state carry out Michigan's elections at a local level.

- 83 county clerks work with local clerks, helping with election materials, programming election equipment, and providing information to voters.
- The Michigan Bureau of Elections is a nonpartisan office within the Michigan Department of State and provides guidance to ensure elections are carried out in accordance with state and federal law.
- The Secretary of State is the state's chief election officer and has broad authority over elections.



Young voters have the power to shape the world around them by registering and voting.


### Millennials and Gen-Z will be a majority of potential voters by 2028
