

# Constitutional Revenue Sharing Update

### **Census Adjustments**

- After a decennial census is certified and published, constitutional revenue sharing payments are required to be adjusted.
- For the 2020 census, adjustments are required to correct for overpayments or underpayments since October 1, 2020.
- Due to the pandemic, the results of the 2020 census were certified and published later than in previous years.
- Payments issued in April 2022 will include these adjustments

# Constitutional Revenue Sharing Update

#### Senate Bill 565, Public Act 53 of 2022

- Supplemental appropriation signed by the Governor on March 30, 2022, included a \$46 million appropriation for the "2020 census city, village, and township hold harmless"
- Goal of the program
  - This program will avoid claw backs because of the later than normal Census adjustment.
  - This funding will be used to offset the decrease in payments from October 2020 to February 2022.
- What the program does <u>not</u> accomplish
  - Offset future losses from population changes.

# Distributions from the Marihuana Regulation Fund (MRF)

### **Distributions Update**

- Michigan Department of Treasury distributed MRF revenues to municipalities and counties that had licensed adult-use facilities in their jurisdiction as of September 30, 2021.
  - Cities, villages, townships and counties received over \$42.2 million under the Act.
- Sources—all revenue in the fund, including excise taxes, fees, and interest earned during state fiscal year 2021
- Distributions for FY 2021 were slightly over \$56,450 per licensed retail store and microbusiness.


#### FY 2021 MRF Revenue Sources: \$172.9 million

- Current Year Excise Tax: \$111.6 million
- Fees, Penalties, Interest Earnings, and Carryforward: \$61.3 million

#### FY 2021 MRF Distributions: \$172.9 million

- Administration, General Fund Repayment: \$12.1 million
- Clinical Trial Research Funding: \$20.0 million
- Cities, Villages, Townships: \$21.1 million
- Counties: \$21.1 million
- School Aid: \$49.3 million
- Michigan Transportation Fund: \$49.3 million

- Lead for the State Data Center (SDC)


## Functions of the Demography Team at LMISI








# Patterns of population change are uneven within Michigan.

- Growth is concentrated in Southeastern Michigan, Grand Rapids, and Traverse City.
- Decline is concentrated in the Thumb, Northeastern Lower and much of the Upper Peninsula.





## Slow Growth and Population Decline in Michigan

Michigan's population grew by 2.0 percent from 2010 to 2020.

- The United States population increased by 7.5 percent in this period.
- Michigan had the 46th slowest population growth rate among the 47 states that experienced population growth from 2010 to 2020.

From 2020 to 2021, Michigan was among 25 states to experience natural decrease (more deaths than births) and among 18 states to experience population decline.


# What are the demographic components that contribute to population change?

There are only three components to population change:


- Births
- Deaths
- Migration

Migration includes international and domestic components.

# Natural Change in Michigan (Births and Deaths)




# Net Migration in Michigan (In-Migration – Out-migration)

Pop<sub>2</sub> = Pop<sub>1</sub> + (Births – Deaths) + (In-Migration – Out-Migration)


Natural Change Net Migration



## Summary of Demographic Trends in Michigan

- Michigan has experienced slow rates of population growth and population decline from 2000 to 2021.
- Patterns of population growth and decline are uneven within Michigan.
- Michigan has experienced net out-migration over the past several decades. Most of the state's growth has been due to natural increase rather than in-migration from a different state.
- Historically low fertility rates and fewer births paired with high mortality during COVID-19
  resulted in natural decrease (more deaths than births) from 2020 to 2021.
- As a result of persistent out-migration and natural decrease, Michigan's population declined from 2020 to 2021.





# What is MI Water Navigator?

MI Water Navigator is a resource for navigating Michigan drinking water infrastructure funding opportunities. Whether you are a public municipal water system or a private water utility, the **MI Water Navigator Helpdesk** and toolkit will provide direction in your search for state and federal funding.

## What We Do

Our Helpdesk technical assistance team provides free individual advising across a range of state and federal funding applications including: the **Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (DWSRF)**; **USDA Rural Development Water and Environmental Programs (WEP)**, **American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)**, and **MI Clean Water Plan**.

For those applying for 2023 Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (DWSRF) loans and grants which meet the criteria for "disadvantaged community" as defined by the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy (EGLE) the helpdesk will have an option to request technical assistance for navigating and submitting a DWSRF application from start to finish. Requests for DWSRF technical assistance will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis, space is limited.

- Free technical assistance to help communities and utilities:
  - Assess available assets and drinking water infrastructure needs
  - Identify applicable state and federal funding sources
  - Apply for relevant funding

- Additional free resources roll out in July 2022 including:
  - Downloadable toolkits covering drinking water policies/mandates, walkthroughs of popular funding applications, and frequently submitted inquiries
  - Webinars
  - Resource Library

#### **How to Get Started**

Start navigating state and federal drinking water infrastructure funding by submitting an inquiry to the MI Water Navigator Helpdesk today.

#### STEP ONE

#### **SEND REQUEST**

#### STEP TWO

A technical advisor from the **MI Water Navigator Helpdesk** will reach out to you to discuss drinking water affordability in your community, water infrastructure needs, and your community's funding opportunities.

#### STEP THREE

Depending on your inquiry, the Helpdesk team will help you navigate a funding application, give advice, or connect you with resources.

#### STEP FOUR

Our team will assess if further assistance is needed and will follow up accordingly.



# Eligible Items:

- Project Planning Costs
- Design and construction engineering
- Legal and financial services
- Construction costs (Davis Bacon wage rates and American Iron and Steel required)
- Administration costs
- Land acquisition/easements
- Up to \$2 million loan to develop or expand an asset management or fiscal sustainability plan when done with an eligible SRF project

# Ineligible Items:

- "Oversized" project components beyond 20-year needs
- Site restoration beyond a return to pre-existing conditions
- Privately owned service lines that are not a public health threat
- Other work not related to a specific goal of the eligible project
- Primary project purpose is expansion or fire protection

#### Strategic Water Quality Initiatives Fund

The Strategic Water Quality Initiatives Fund (SWQIF) is a low interest revolving loan program that allows qualified municipalities to access financing for the construction of needed water pollution control facilities that cannot qualify for SRF assistance. Two types of projects can be financed under the SWQIF, the on site upgrade-replacement of septic systems and the removal of ground water or storm water from sewer leads.

Intent-to-Apply (ITA) form for the CWSRF, and SWQIF loan programs - Due January 31, 2022 for year 2023 consideration

#### The submittal deadline for final project plans in CWSRF fiscal year 2022 is June 1, 2021.

A community interested in applying for a loan must fill this form out and submit it to EGLE-WIFS@Michigan.gov. Submittal of this form will allow the applicant to receive an indication of the funding/financing outlook as well as the next steps in the process. To help better serve our customers and improve our programs please do not begin work on a project plan prior to submitting the ITA form. Following submittal of the ITA, a Water Infrastructure Financing Section (WIFS) project manager will follow-up with the community to set up a discussion.






#### Reporting Data - Fiscal Years 2017 - 2020




## Unfunded Liabilities 2017-2020




### Unfunded Liabilities 2017-2020




## Unfunded (\$0 Assets) OPEB Systems 2017-2020




### Total Assets & Total Liabilities 2017-2020: OPEB




## Median Funded Ratio 2017-2020




## Total ADC 2017-2020
