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Council used when considering the approval of this particular amendment to the zoning map that proved to be inaccurate.

I have provided one bit of information to the Council and the other was provided by the developer. I was under the understanding that, after the property owner received the rezoning of the property, that he would be required to reappear before the Zoning Board of Appeals, which had postponed his request for a variance in this particular site.

The Council had wanted some restrictions added to the approval of that particular zoning map amendment and the recommendation was, well, since the property owner would be required to reappear before the

Zoning Board, that those restrictions could be added on at that time.

I since learned that the property owner would not be reappearing before the Zoning Board of Appeals and, if he chose to, his zoning variance would most likely have been denied because it would not have met the required threshold, therefore the restrictions that Council was seeking to have would not be officially added to the property.

I also obtained a copy of those proposed restrictions that the owner had informally agreed to with one of the Council Members and I have learned that one of the provisions is actually illegal. And the property owner would be in violation of State law for the business that he was proposing to operate at that particular location.

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17	With this with these two new bits of the
18	information, I have an obligation to inform City
19	Council of the recent changes and to ask them if they
20	want to continue with the approval or if they would
21	like to enter into a conditional zoning agreement with
22	the City so that the provisions that the property owner
23	is agreeing to, which are legal, can be officially
24	recorded on that particular property.
25	Otherwise, the representations that were

being made in writing that have no legal basis cannot be enforced by the City and the property owner and future property owners would not be required to comply with these particular restrictions that Council had discussed.

So, therefore, I'm requesting that the Board postpone approval of this particular ordinance. That will allow me time to address this before City Council tomorrow and also contact the property owner.

Considering that the property owner on Number 5 indicates, "I will subscribe to anything that the City Council asks for", I do not believe I will have any difficulties having the property owner agreeing to an additional zoning agreement. However, I need to be sure that this is what Council has intended and, number two, advise them that one of the representations made by the property owner to the City Council is illegal and, if that was a key factor in their determination, they need to be made aware of that as well.

9	members of the GERS system. That increase in pension
10	is going to expire in August.
11	The philosophy behind approving that
12	temporary \$400 a month increase was to help the
13	retirees offset the cost of health insurance, which
14	they would be responsible for paying if they chose to
15	continue health insurance as a result of the suspension
16	of those benefits.
17	That particular matter has been under
18	litigation and has not been settled. So, at the
19	present time, the retirees are not receiving health
20	insurance benefits from the City of Pontiac and, if the
21	temporary increase is allowed to expire, the retirees
22	will have to share shoulder 100 percent of the
23	burden without any additional financial assistance from
24	the City.
25	The proposed pension increase applies to all
	17
1	members of the GERS system, whether they are
2	receiving who are in a retirement pension status,
3	whether they were going to be receiving health
4	insurance benefits or not. This was done two years ago
5	to ensure that the increase was considered fair and
6	across the hoard and would not be challenged

Since the litigation for retiree healthcare Page 14

7-22-15 RTAB 8 has not yet been settled, the Mayor had recommended that this extension be granted for an additional year. 9 The proposed ordinance language was reviewed by the 10 11 City attorney, it was changed to include all people who would be retired as of the new date and would be 12 retiring in the future during such time that this 13 14 benefit would be granted. So the City Council, the Mayor and I are all 15 in support of approving this pension -- slight pension 16 increase extension for one additional year. There was 17 an actuarial evaluation that was conducted. I want to 18 say that the cost was about \$5.2 million. I don't have 19 the information in front of me but there are more than 20 adequate funds in the pension system to cover that cost 21 and we hope that the litigation will be settled within 22 the year so that we don't have to revisit this issue in 23 the future. 24 THE CHAIRPERSON: Thank you, Mr. Sobota. 25 18 1 Mayor Waterman, did you wish to speak? MAYOR WATERMAN: I was just here to give 2

20	Compensation Commission Recommendation. Mr. Sobota?

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21	MR. SOBOTA: One of the provisions of the
22	final order issued by Mr. Schimmel requires that this
23	Board approve any change in compensation to elected
24	officials as established by the local officer's
25	Compensation Commission. In summary, the Commission
	21

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examined the salaries of both the Mayor and the Council member -- compensation of the Mayor and the Council Members. They decided to make no change, no substantive change to the compensation of the Mayor other than adding a provision that allows the Mayor to be reimbursed for travel, in accordance with the same policy as other City employees. However, with the City Council, the Commission is recommending that the maximum compensation of Council Members be increased from \$7,000 a year to \$15,000 a year.

Currently, Council Members are paid per meeting and per committee meeting. And the recommendation is that Council Members be paid monthly, whether they attend Council meetings or -- whether or not they attend Council meetings or Committee meetings.

The Commission convened for about eight or nine meetings during the year. There were requests from the Council Members to establish compensation between 20,000 and \$25,000 per year. However, the Council Members indicated they would not be requesting any benefits.

The Commission by a three to two vote recommended to set that annual compensation at \$15,000. In addition to the requests and petitions made by the current Council Members and the elected officials, the Page 18

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1	commission was also provided information for comparable
2	communities, in terms of compensation pay to those
3	elected officials, information on the balance sheet of
4	each community and the size of their budget.
5	If you reviewed that information which was
6	provided to you, you'll see that, at the present time,
7	Pontiac City Council Members are paid appropriately
8	based on comparable communities. But the proposed
9	level of compensation will put Pontiac as the second
10	highest paid Council among comparable communities.
11	However, this was debated very thoroughly by
12	the Commission and the Commission did come to the
13	recommendation to change the compensation to \$15,000 a
14	year.
15	City Council, knowing full well that the
16	proposed compensation was proposed to be increased by
17	the LOCC before approving the City's budget, increased
18	expenditures to cover the total cost of additional
19	compensation to the City Council in the budget that was
20	finally adopted.
21	So the additional cost to the City with
22	counting FICA is about \$64,000 a year. I have reviewed
23	the information supplied by the Local Officers
24	Compensation Commission and, even though I believe that
25	the compensation level is high compared to comparable

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communities, because the Commission had the same information that I had and deliberated and because the

3	7-22-15 RTAB allocation was authorized and appropriated accordingly
4	in the City's budget, I would recommend that this Board
5	approve that level of compensation. The City does have
6	the funds to pay this for the next two years.
7	THE CHAIRPERSON: Thank you, Mr. Sobota.
8	Any questions from the Board for Mr. Sobota?.
9	If not, I'll entertain a motion.
10	MR. SAWDON: Motion to deny.
11	MR. BURGESS: Support.

MAYOR WATERMAN: I would like a chance also to remark on that. Although the comparables show that this is high for cities, comparable cities, in terms of City Council reimbursement, one of the things that makes this a little different situation is that our City Council does meet once a week, every week, and most other City Councils meet biweekly. So that brings into the extra time to do that. And also, this kind of restores our City Council to what it was prior without all the compensation packets that have been afforded to other City Councils.

I do speak to that and I speak on behalf of myself as an employee that I also believe, with giving additional compensation to our employees who had their health benefits and their pension taken away. And, as you see, I have made proposals for that in the budget that we have before you. And you're going to consider the pension today. I just think people are -- we want Page 20

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8	to to reward people, capable people, with the kind
9	of standard compensation that for other cities.
10	So I do that in support of the City Council
11	compensation package. We do have a financial situation
12	now that would allow payment for that. And I speak for
13	that, given the fact that I'm with the same Commission,
14	made me the only full-time employee that would not
15	receive any raise and, certainly, I'm not part of any
16	pension plan. But I'm still challenging it for the
1.7	others so I would just like to lend my voice to that
18	amendment.
19	THE CHAIRPERSON: Thank you, Mayor.
20	Mr. Sobota?
21	MR. SOBOTA: I do want to confirm that, prior
22	to the appointment of the first emergency manager, the
23	City Council Members were paid \$15,000 a year salary.
24	However, they did receive additional benefits on top of
25	that. So this is a restoration of the prior cash
	25
1	compensation, direct cash compensation, for Council
2	prior to emergency manager declaration and appointment.
3	THE CHAIRPERSON: But without the benefit?
4	MR. SOBOTA: But without the benefits and

5	salary that the employee is presently earning.
6	As part of the comprehensive compensation
7	package, I had recommended that this position salary be
8	set at a base of \$60,000 with the ability for some
9	potential enhancements. That was recommended based on
10	what other comparable communities are paying to
11	individuals in their Human Resources Department, not
12	necessarily a Human Resources Director.
13	This person does not have any administrative
14	managerial responsibilities, in terms of
15	decision-making, however, the skill set and knowledge
16	that the employee has is a great value to the City, Page 28

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17	especially with regards to the retiree benefit
18	situation.
19	So what has happened is that the employee has
20	actually received a job offer from another employer,
21	which obviously pays more money than what we are
22	offering at the present time, even though the benefits
23	have been added.
24	On a caveat, the employee was also involved
25	in an automobile accident several weeks ago and has
	34
1	been unable to return full time to work. The absence
2	also demonstrated the value that the employee has to
3	the City.
4	We I spoke to Mr. Nazarko and he does not
5	want to lose the employee and the employee is willing
6	to stay if the compensation package is increased.
7	However, being that the employee is not back full time,
8	I do not believe it to be fair to either side that the
9	employee be compensated at the new rate until such time
10	that the employee is able to return full time, which
11	Mr. Nazarko informs me will hopefully be by the end of
12	this month.
13	The Finance Department, where this employee
14	works, has been un-staffed for at least a year and we
15	just filled the Purchasing Agent/Fiscal Analyst
16	position.
17	We now have a department that is operating at
18	full speed. The last thing that we need to do is put
19	another hole in the department that will, again, set us
20	back. And some things will have to be sacrificed if we

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21	7-22-15 RTAB just don't have the staff to get things done or,
22	unfortunately, we may not be able to respond as quick
23	to some of the requests that are being made by the
24	Mayor and by our attorneys for assistance in the
25	retiree healthcare litigation. So this employee does
	35
1	play a very key role.
2	The salary, I've given you a bit of an idea,
3	at \$60,000 would be higher than what customer service
4	representatives make. And a customer service
5	representative is essentially a secretary. And it
6	would be lower than what the Deputy Community
7	Development Director makes and various other department
8	heads. So we see this as more of a mid-management type
9	employee rather than a secretarial employee where the
10	salary's currently set.
11	So Mayor's fully on board with this,
12	Mr. Nazarko's fully on board with this recommendation.
1.3	And if you would like to hear their comments and
14	support, that would be fine. However, I hope that I
15	have been able to make an adequate case to approve this
16	compensation with the contingency that, until the
17	employee returns to work full time, that the
18	compensation level should not be raised.

15	financial reports presented to you for the month ending
16	June 30, 2015 as well as the quarter ending June 30,
17	2014 do not have any additional items to report other
18	than what I have outlined in my memo.
19	However, just this being the end of the
20	fiscal year of financial reports, I'd like to announce
21	that the financial situation of the year we just ended
22	is strong, stronger than what we thought and puts us on
23	the path to financial stability for the next
	foreseeable future.
24	THE CHAIRPERSON: Any questions for
25	THE CHAIRPERSON. Any questions for
1	Mr. Nazarko from the Board?
2	Thank you, Mr. Nazarko.
3	MR. NAZARKO: Okay.
4	THE CHAIRPERSON: Next item is a report from
5	Mayor Waterman.
6	MAYOR WATERMAN: Gentlemen, I stand before
7	you as the Mayor of a city that has a \$10.8 million
8	fund balance. Not only that, it is 30 percent of our
9	expenditure budget. And, also, in our other funds, we
10	now have anywhere from 15 to 20 percent fund balance in
11	our other funds as well.
12	I stand before you as the Mayor of the city
1.3	that increased its property values last year
14	9.1 percent across the board. That was the highest
15	increase of any city in Oakland County, and that's
16	substantial.

I also stand before you as the Mayor of the city that has turned the corner, in terms of the narrative financial crisis. I think everybody can see we're no longer in financial crisis, the original intention for the Governor in placing us under the Emergency Manager and in receivership.

Not only that, but we've changed some other

Not only that, but we've changed some other dynamics as we turned that corner of the narrative of Pontiac. We have, according to the Sheriff's own

statistics, Oakland County Sheriff, a 37 percent decrease in crime, violent crime, in this community. So that was a narrative that we needed to overcome and that is being done. The statistics in some categories in crime now perfectly match our more notable cities in that regard in Oakland County.

At the State of the City Address, which I gave June 29th, I did outline for the attendees that we now have \$754 million of economic development projects somewhere in the pipeline, in terms of development, some which are just about near completion. And that includes M1 Concourse that broke ground about three weeks ago and they were happily able to report that their first phase of these car condos, which is a new concept, were sold out in two months, so that is done.

General Motors continues their expansion at the Metal Stamping Plant and the Power Train Plant as well as Bloomfield Park, which is 78 acres, the majority in Pontiac, a \$400 million development now has the motivated developer and they're moving along with a

now doing implementation and strategic planning and

that's the stage we're in.

Now, I do still want to report on some of the other things that are going on that have been on my agenda. Phoenix Center, as I reported, there was a dismissal of the quiet title action that the City had brought and that has caused our attorneys to ask me to give them time to kind of really think what that means, in terms of the handling of the case. But in the meantime, there are ongoing talks in several quarters and that's where I will leave that right now.

But I will also report to you that the manager and son of the owner of the Ottawa Towers, which is the litigant in the lawsuit regarding the Phoenix Center, actually purchased eight of the vacant schools that were sold off by the school board. So they are actually doubling down, in terms of even though they are locked in this litigation with the City, they're doubling down in terms of their commitment and their need to invest in the city. So I've taken that message from them and we're opening talks about what happened with their vacant schools and how that could benefit the community.

The other thing is the blight. And right now, with the loss of the one community development staff who was working with blight, I have no staff Page 36

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working on that. We're still -- we just received our CBDG allotment and for 2015 and we already have a hundred different residences in the pipeline that will be able to utilize those funds. So we're up to date. We've used up all the NSP3 and caught up to date on all the CDBG funds. So that project is well underway.

I do appreciate the fact that you allotted two additional staff for community development because, you see, with the things going, on a lot of the -- to follow the average outline, we need that community staff. So that's where our groove is; economic development. And that wasn't, of course, the financial crisis plan; that's the plan post-emergency manager, post the financial crisis as we move on to the next era of Pontiac's development.

And we are building up the City in other ways, too. But one of the things we're also doing is the Oakland University partnership and I gave for you the first newsletter that was done, one of our interns is here, Andre' Sykes. We have a number of public administration interns as well as journalism interns and they have produced that this was premiere at the state of the City because we realized there was enough good stories and news that we wanted all the citizens of Pontiac to buy into to take a share and ownership of

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and to be a part of and that we need to tell that in our own internal way. So we have this newsletter that

3	7-22-15 RTAB we'll produce quarterly and that is going.
	so, as the Mayor of all these things
4 5	happening, I did receive the RTAB evaluation proceeding
	the evaluation that was done by Treasury and there were
6	a number of comments made and I will choose another
7	time to kind of respond to that in a more literal

9	manner. But the final bottom line is, of course, that
10	we're still in receivership, even though we moved past
11 12	the benchmarks in a number of ways. And so I'm a
12	little perplexed, particularly, about some of the
13	reasoning that reached that bottom-line conclusion.
14 15	And I'll summarize it this way:
1.5	Is the fact that the greatest number of the
16	citations that were listed in that report dealt with
17	the things that have been assigned to the City
18	Administrator to do. That he has, you know, regarded

22	that we needed to grow the City that were not assigned
23	to him.
24	So I just bring that to the attention and the
25	fact that this evaluation is evaluating the format that

1	was left in place by the Governor by the Order S-334
2	so you're really evaluating your own system that was
3	left in place. And there are things we need to change
4	to move that forward in order to accommodate the
5	situation that Pontiac is at right now in further time.
6	I won't use up time right now. But in further time I

want to elaborate on that. But I just wanted to bring Page 38

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that to your attention.

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And two things -- several things that I think were related to litigation, unseen facts from the building of receivership and I just wanted to bring to your attention that we are moving ahead with mediation. I can't move any faster. We're really intently involved in that and the things that are holding it up is something that I have no control of. But it is my intent to use that mediation to the fullest extent. We have had our Human Resources Department, the key person we just didn't give the raise to, who had worked intently with the representatives from the side to make sure that we had the same documentation and the same census and the same numbers.

In looking, we had to look back through a lot of different CBAs, et cetera, et cetera, in order to make sure that we were dealing with the same facts and the same statistics going into this mediation.

So that is going to -- any change in that situation is going to handicap this whole -- I'll just tell you very bluntly, given where we are and given the amount of time we've spent working through this mediation in the last eight months or so. So that I leave to you.

And as I told the City at the State of the City, Pontiac is moving forward in a great way. We've changed the narrative and we want to be able to be given the leeway to be able to move forward in the way that we'll be productive in the City. Thank you.

13	Mr. Sobota, City Administrator report.
14	MR. SOBOTA: Today I do not believe in a
15	one-hour meeting. I have some additional information I
16	would like to share with the Board. I want to put the
17	\$10.8 million fund balance in the general fund as of
18	June 30th in a bit of perspective. The financial
19	reports that you were presented with indicate that the
20	City has a \$10.6 million fund balance.
21	After the reports were printed, we noticed
22	that there was at least another \$350,000 in unposted
23	revenue. And we do anticipate that there will be some
24	accounts payable through the end of the year. So we're
25	looking at about \$10.6 to \$10.8 million in fund
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1	balance.
2	However, if you examine that number, where
3	did that fund balance come from? At least \$3 million
4	of that money came from one-time revenue sources,
5	nearly \$1 million came from the collection of
6	delinquent income tax and \$2 million from a bunch of
7	other possibilities. \$1 million of that \$10 million is
8	considered un-spendable because it's for prepaid
9	expenses.
10	Another \$1 million is the result of an
11.	increase in income tax collections for the fiscal year
12	that just ended. We've already accounted for that on a
13	going forward basis so you can consider that another
14	one-time infusion of income.
15	There has been at least \$1.7 million less in

property tax chargebacks over the last two fiscal years $$\operatorname{\textsc{Page}}40

than we had anticipated based on prior year projections. We believe that the trend is now stabilized and we have assumed a normal chargeback in the going-forward basis. 1.7 million there, 2.7 plus 3 is \$5.7 million $\frac{4}{million}$ plus \$1 million in un-spendable is \$6.7 million. really leaves the City with about \$4 million in what I'm going to call usable fund balance in that we earned that money not based on one-time tricks.

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A couple of the other things that have occurred over the past two years is that we have seen an increase in our property tax base. We don't know how long that's going to continue. We're conservatively projecting no increase for next year.

Income tax also has seen an increase. We believe it to be as a result of greater enforcement. However, we haven't really started full enforcement yet. We may have some possibilities there but that may also be a one-time infusion of revenue. And the State Revenue Sharing payments have increased as well over the last two years. So from a revenue standpoint, things are looking good but we believe that trends will be normalizing for the next several years.

On the expense side, there are two major expenditures that we have seen a reduction in and we are finally realizing the savings as a result of actions taken by the Emergency Manager. We had budgeted last year around \$1.1 million for liability in property insurance. We ended up paying approximately

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21	half of that amount.
22	This year, once again, we were looking at
23	about \$800,000 in property and liability insurance
24	expenditures due to a refund from the MMRMA. Because
25	of the money that we have had in our loss reserve, our
	49
1	cash outflow will be a little bit over \$100,000 this
2	fiscal year.
3	The reason that the liability is going down
4	is because we no longer are engaging in high risk
5	activity, in terms of having our own police department
6	our own fire department, our own DPW. The only
7	liability risk that we have that we are getting sued on
8	is the result of sidewalks that are considered to be
9	hazardous. And we will be implementing a sidewalk
10	inspection program and hope to remedy that over the
11	course of this fiscal year.
12	when I asked our insurance agent, is there
13	anything else that we can do, from a liability
14	standpoint, to reduce our risk. He said no, we've
15	pretty much done everything that we can possibly do.
16	On the workers' compensation side, the City
17	used to be self-insured for workers' compensation.
18	Over the past two fiscal years, the City has saved
19	or not expended over \$600,000 in anticipated
20	expenditures. We have been settling workers'
21	compensation cases. We are no longer incurring new
22	self-insured workers' compensation cases. We are now
23	in a fully-insured workers' compensation program where
24	our annual premium decreased by \$8,000.
25	So these are savings that were fully Page 42

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1	anticipated when the City made the changes that we
2	needed to make several years ago that we are only
3	beginning to realize. And I am confident, as we
4	continue to settle our large lawsuits, especially
5	regarding public safety, police department in
6	particular, that our total cost for future liability
7	insurance will decrease significantly.
8	Now, on the other hand, we do have that
9	\$3.5 million judgment sitting out there for the
10	nonpayment of one of the VEBA contributions. I believe
11	that the Court does not understand governmental
12	budgeting, which is why the City did not pay a
13	particular bill and which is why the City lost the
14	particular case but we have appealed that.
15	However, that is a \$3.5 million potential
16	liability which we obviously have enough adequate
17	reserves to cover. This being said, I'd like to
18	express some concerns that I'm hearing, especially from
19	the City Council now, since we have this great
20	financial condition.
21.	At a recent Council meeting, a statement was
22	made we need to do something to re-call our laid-off
23	City employees and to start hiring Pontiac residents,
24	particularly the goal is to bring back the Department
25	of Public Works.

The first attempt will be to hire City employees and acquire equipment to perform the street Page 43

sweeping services. As you've seen in your agenda packet, the Council did reject the contracting of street sweeping services. They want me to examine what the costs are of renting vehicles and hiring City employees to do the work.

And the reason I am bringing this up is that this is not a simple exercise. The cost of providing, for example, street sweeping services is not a man and a machine but you also have to consider the liability that we are no longer incurring the workers' compensation. If you start hiring more and more City employees, your legality costs are going to increase. I do not believe that the City's department will have the administrative capacity to handle additional employees so we may have to hire additional supervisors.

With more employees, you have additional stress on Human Resources and additional stress on the accountants. If you acquire vehicles, either for lease or for purchase, where are you going to house the vehicles; what type of facility do you need to acquire? What are the expenses for those facilities, once again, utilities and the liability?

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You have vehicles. If you have vehicles, you have to maintain the vehicles. Who's going to maintain the vehicles? By bringing DPW back in-house, you're going to have additional purchasing requirements that will require more bidding. And then, overall, from an administrative oversight standpoint, the City appears right now to be properly sized for the administrative Page 44

8 structure that we have.

administrative oversight in the event that the department is expanded? And we're not only talking street sweeping. There have also been talks of hiring City employees to do road patching and to do snowplowing. Because the argument being that the cost to hire an outside contractor is too expensive or we may have had some issues with some of our contractors and, in order to eliminate those issues, if we hire City employees, they'll just simply go away.

I bring this up today because I don't want to engage in what's essentially going to be a wild goose chase. I'm going to go out and try and come up with some sort of a cost structure on all of these under-the-water costs for bringing these types of services in-house. In addition, we will have to hire employees.

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The decision to hire employees is solely at the discretion of this Board. And if this Board is in no way going to be considering increasing the size of the City workforce, I can find better and more productive uses of my time to help address some of issues that were identified in the annual report than having either myself or my staff going out and trying to quantify all of the costs I have presented to you earlier.

Now, there was something else that I think the Board needs to be made aware of. The facility

question may not be an issue very soon. I was approached by the RACER Trust who has informed me that sometime back in the 1980's or in the 1990's, the City of Pontiac sold a section of parkland to General Motors. General Motors constructed a building on that site, along with a retention pond for a storm water system.

when we sold the property to General Motors, there was a reversion clause in the deed that basically said when the facility is not being used, the property returns to the City of Pontiac. RACER has contacted me and has basically told us, "Well, according to that, we believe, Pontiac, that you own the property now.

25 However, we're willing to work with you before you

acquire formal title." And what they have offered to do is if the City agrees to accept not only that parcel, the two neighboring parcels which can be considered right-of-way on the opposite side of the street, they will remove the retention pond and return the building to the City.

Our DPW Director has inspected the building and believes that the building will adequately fulfill his needs. He has identified the building and the property as an area where contractors could potentially store equipment and supplies and, in theory, then the City would not be charged so much, in terms of the contractual amounts.

So these are some things that I wanted to advise you of. I have already contacted our City attorney and asked him to prepare some paperwork that Page 46

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could be presented so that the City rejects the receipt of that particular facility. But if there is openness to this Board to restoring a Public Works Department at some point -- and I think we're going to be starting off slower and slowly building up -- then I will proceed along that path and do all of the research and get the information.

I know that there is another community that is in a similar transition state where there is, I

believe, an effort and I don't know if it's been approved by this Board yet to once again restore the Department of Public Works and to begin hiring City employees to begin performing similar services as I've indicated over here.

So, hopefully, during your Board Comments you'll find the time to give me some feedback to this latest -- I'm going to call it a dilemma that's been posed recently. Yes, the financial situation of the City is good now. Most of it was the result of one-time fixes. And I think the Mayor's budget clearly demonstrates if we have one-time revenue, we should use it for one-time expenditures, maintain a proper fund balance.

Be keenly aware that we still have some potential litigation that could potentially harm the City and not necessarily move forward in a manner that could potentially, in the next course of years, result into a higher expense than what the anticipated expense is going to be in the short term.

1.8	it's untimely.
19	In this particular case, it was posted on the
20	25th for a meeting that was conducted on the 28th.
21	When I called or when I wrote to find out what it
22	meant to have a newspaper of general circulation in the
23	City, that Mr. Sobota told me he didn't understand that
24	because he wasn't present at the time that that was

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1	We want to be notified when these meetings
2	are being conducted. I do not subscribe to the
3	Legal News and it would be easy to post it if you want
4	us to know when these meetings are. Thank you.
5	THE CHAIRPERSON: Thank you, Mr. Hoogasian.
6	MR. WIDIGAN: Councilman Holland.
7	THE CHAIRPERSON: Good afternoon.
8	MR. HOLLAND: You know, it's sad when you get
9	elected by the people and put in hard work for the
LO	people and then they deny to fairly compensate. And I
L1	read the letter that was sent to the Governor that was
12	orchestrated by the TAB. And what's sad is that things
13	that you said that this Council is not doing are the
14	things that Joseph is in control of.
15	No one is telling you guys the meetings that
16	we attend and the compensation that we're bringing to
17	the City. I don't know what this Council or that
18	Council has done to Mr. Schimmel to make you treat the
19	Council so so horrible. They're the Compensation

21	in being involved in the compensation. I recommended
22	$\#_{12,500}$ for the City Council. I had concerns that the
23	Board was closing down for the year or two, whenever
24	they come back next before you made your decision.
25	What does this Council have, their options
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now, to go back to that Board that has not been -because it was not brought to you until July. The decision was made, I believe, in May and I said at the meeting I want it brought to you sooner. So that, while they are inconvenienced, they are -- they can go back to the Board and try to come up with a different dollar amount that -- you know, that is a Board that is page 50

8	mandated by the State of Michigan, just like the
9	Planning Commission Board.
10	And so I'm asking you to reconvene, possibly
11	take your decision back because of the fact that they
12	cannot they have no Board to go back to now. This
13	should have been filed in a timely manner with you so
14	that they had ample opportunity to go back to that
15	local Compensation Board. That right has been taken
16	away from them.
17	And secondly, I would like to also I'm
18	trying to understand how our pension fund can be a
19	single employer now that we have GERS employees, that's
20	their employer. So I was trying to also maybe
21	Mr. Schimmel can expand on this. How we can be filing
22	as a single employer with the IRS if we have other
23	people's employees under our plan?
24	But I really do I think that this is one
25	of those things where people's rights have been
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1	infringed on. This decision for the Council should
2	have been made while that Board was still there, it
3	should have been brought to you sooner. It is not
4	right. I don't agree with everything they do but this
5	is not right.
6	THE CHAIRPERSON: Thank you, Ms. Hasson.
7	MR. WIDIGAN: Linda Watson.
8	MS. WATSON: I'm just not understanding why
9	you do not give a reason when you reject something.
10	I'm talking about a compensation for that HR person.
11	What's your reasoning for denying her? I think you

14	MR. WIDIGAN: Andre' Sykes.
15	MR. SYKES: Good afternoon.

18	Andre' Sykes. I'm the internist the Mayor pointed out
19	from Oakland University. And I just wanted to say I
20	was born and raised in Detroit and but every
21	morning, you know, I take the two-hour bus ride
22	because, unfortunately, I don't have a car, and I come
23	here. And I see the dedication of the Mayor, the
24	dedication of the City Administrator, City Council.

5	I go out to Rochester and I go out there and
6	try to clean out their streets like I do mine, go out
7	and clean not only my sidewalk and my driveway but I
8	have to clean out the street and the plowing and they
9	come by and laugh at me like, "Hey, we got somebody
10	that's going to come plow our streets. We're going to
11	make sure we plow by the thing and get it paid."
12	Now the little bit of money we're paying the
13	Council, this is where we have enough money in the
14	budget, we should go ahead and make sure we pay them.
15	If you're not going to pay them, we're not going to
16	have our City service. Tell us, what is the path that
17	we're getting back to having a City again? Because
18	this is not a City, this is a shadow of what we were
19	formally. Thank you.
20	THE CHAIRPERSON: Thank you, Ms. Swazer.
21	MR. WIDIGAN: That's it for public comment.

23	comment. Next item is Board Comment. Any comments
24	from the Board?

13	I'd at least like to give my side of the story. And my
14	side of the story is and my philosophy has always been
15	that it's the opposite of Ms is it Swazey?
16	MS. SWAZER: Swazer.
17	MR. SCHIMMEL: Swazer?
18	MS. SWAZER: Swazer.
19	MR. SCHIMMEL: It's the opposite of yours.
20	And, again, it's a friendly disagreement, I'd hope.

And I guess I have to bring up the question, where is Pontiac headed with its Council people? Do they want their Council people to be full-time employees or are they part-time employees? 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8	other week and I think they ought to set policy.
9	But I don't think those are the people that
10	you should be calling to get the streets sweeped and
11	all these other things. And then my third thing that
12	I'd like to point out is really along the lines of what
13	Mr. Sobota brought up. I believe the surplus
14	conversation which I've been very quiet about, but I
15	guess I need to comment on it today, are along the same
16	lines that Mr. Sobota brought up. I believe the
17	surplus is made up of a lot of one-time items.
18	I think the one-time items have misled the
19	City Council, especially, into thinking there's a lot
20	of money that's now disposable by them and it gets us
21	into conversation like, "Well, gee, let's make us be
22	the second highest paid Council", you know, and

4	and everybody has to realize that, if we go away, I
5	don't think the surplus you're counting on is there.

7	THE CHAIRPERSON: Thank you, Mr. Schimmel.
8	Mr. Sawdon, do you have any comment?
9	MR. SAWDON: No.
10	THE CHAIRPERSON: All right. Comments I have
11	are that, in terms of your question to the Board,

7	bring this forward. And I can recap my statements in
8	writing with a follow-up statement as well.
9	THE CHAIRPERSON: All right. Thank you.
10	MR. SCHIMMEL: Could I make one more comment?
11	THE CHAIRPERSON: Yes.
12	MR. SCHIMMEL: I would just like to because
13	you brought hit so heavily on the street sweeper
14	issue. I would just I'm talking about just me as
15	myself now.
16	I mean, Joe, you and I have been through
	Page 58

17	this. This is why I'm bringing this up. But I guess
18	it's a caution I try to send out there to the Mayor and
19	to the Council. Costs on contracted services, most
20	people don't consider all of the costs of doing it
21	in-house. And I just want to reemphasize, if you had a
22	street sweeper, you go back into insurance liability
23	problems, workers' comp problems, legal problems, admin
24	problems, humanity Human Resource problems, as you
25	pointed out, you're going to buy fuel, you're going to
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1	have housing. That's what worries me about the TAB
2	Board going away is, if you go headlong into the Public
3	Works' business and start reestablishing all of these
4	things, it's the road back to another Emergency Manager
5	in the future. That's my opinion.
6	Thanks for allowing me to talk so long.
7	THE CHAIRPERSON: Any other comments?
8	MR. SAWDON: No.
9	THE CHAIRPERSON: If not, I'll entertain a
10	motion to adjourn.
11	MR. SAWDON: So move.
12	MR. BURGESS: Support.
13	THE CHAIRPERSON: Moved by Sawdon, support by
