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     budget. What I'm going to do is, it's a work in process, as I
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     indicated to Mr. Van de Grift, and I, I can't remember the
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     guy's name that I talked to from the state.

MR. O'NEAL: Terry Bollin, yeah. I've had conversations with him, and we're going to collaborate together on this. I don't know that he needs to come down here; I'm going to send him my budgeted figures that I have so that he can look them over in detail, to make sure that we're moving along the right way.

I will tell you that I've had meetings with both Lincoln Park and also River Rouge, relative to collaboration of services both assessing -- we've got an assessing contract coming from WCA, because we know Wayne County's no longer going to be doing assessing. So we're looking at that, and going collaboration, that will save both of our cities approximately 15 percent if we both go in together.

We're looking at any and all areas that we might be able to do collaboration of services so that we can not only reduce the costs in the short term, but also reduce the costs in the long term.

I've also had talks with Drew and all the members from the state, relative to MERS. We're going to take a look xt, talk with MERS, and asking them for some lower numbers, going forward. I know they want to accelerate the close units and the numbers there, and it's come to my attention that if you go

there and you talk with them very, very nicely, they might be able to work on some lower numbers for us. I want to look at that.

Also, we've got our assessing numbers, as you indicated, Mr. Koryzno, we're getting those. We've got some questions on our personal properties; you know that half our assessed valuation is personal properties, a hundred million dollars. So that's very, very important. And we're going to be looking at that. I will promise that I will have an approved 2015-16 budget to you. I have got to have that done, I believe our charter says that's got to be done in April.

As part and parcel to that, I'm going to have a projected five year budget. I'm going to look at as many as I can, without using fund balance, and the numbers that I had before, I wasn't using fund balance until I got out into the third fiscal year. I know that Treasury and this Board has indicated you'd like to see budgets that are balanced without using fund balance, and that's where we're headed with that. And again, we're going to look at anything and everything that we can, relative to that.

As I indicated before to this Board, that I'd to work closely with the Board so that we can both agree on the numbers that we might have and that's going to be a work in progress. So that I understand, that you react -- when you react, if you react to my numbers favorably, then what I would like to do is

take that back to my board and get approval going forward on the additional four years of the five year budget. And that, Mr. Chairman, is going to be a work in progress.

MR. KORYZNO: So do you anticipate having a five year budget completed for the April RTAB meeting?

MR. O'NEAL: I'm hoping to have that. Whether or not I've got signed agreements with anybody from anywhere else, as you know, one of the things that I've been very proactive with, as well as the emergency manager in Lincoln Park and Mr. Bolden (sp) from River Rouge, and also Ms. Folks (sp) is up there.

We realize that all of the communities within Wayne County and this immediate, are either in receivership, under consent agreement, or may, in the near future, fall into receivership. Warren Evans was on the radio this morning, they're facing a 70 million dollar deficit in Wayne County. That's going to have an effect on us.

One of the things that I do want to bring to your attention, is really of concern to me right now, one of the things I've been looking at with Mr. Penryman, and there's a charge back from the county to us for delinquent taxes. That's — that could be a very large number, and depending on how we deal with that number, that has an effect going forward. And so I want to make sure that I've got a firm handle, as best I can, on that.

I know that I've been working with our assessing

department and Terri Capra, relative to homes that we've got out there that are both owned by the city and that there's a lot of delinquent taxes owed to the county. And how we can best do away with those, and tear these homes down and get these properties back on the tax roll. And having heard that we've got a 70 million dollar deficit at Wayne County, I can see where those -- that's going to be problematic.

So, coming forward, I've got that MERS number, the tax number, the chargeback number. And of course the legacy costs. I want to get a good handle so when I come forward, and I stand here to you, I can tell you with utmost confidence the numbers that I have in there are good numbers, and that I don't have chargeback numbers of the chargeback numbers of the chargeback numbers of the chargeback numbers of the comes to fruition and it's higher.

Because I don't want fake -- I'm not going to cook these books, Mr. Chairman, is what I'm trying to say. So I will have a budget for you for '15-'16, for the April meeting. The five year budget is going to be a work in progress; I will have numbers for you. Whether or not that's approved by city council or not, that'll be another issue.

MR. KORYZNO: Thank you. Any questions for Mr. O'Neal?

Resolution 356.14, budget amendment 2014-15 DPW. 1

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This budget amendment is the first of three amendments which have been tabled until a five year budget is presented, and Treasury accountants confirm the funding source. Absent a contrary view from a board member, this matter will remain tabled. All right.

Next item is resolution 357.14, budget amendment 2015-5, body camera purchase; for the aforementioned reason, this matter will remain tabled.

Item D, Resolution 372.14, budget amendment 2015-3, master plan -- this will also remain tabled.

The next item, employment contract, excuse me. contract will be evaluated once the five year budget shows, to the Board's satisfaction, that the city can afford it. for the record that additional information concerning this contract was received from Administrator O'Neal, and absent a motion, this matter will remain tabled.

Resolution 403.1, withdrawal from the Wayne County Library system, the Board has not received any new information concerning the separation from the county library system, and this matter will be -- will remain tabled until additional action is taken.

Item G, report from UHY. When this Board approved UHY to be the city controller in January, we requested a monthly report concerning the adequacy of the part time controller

arrangement.

For a second month, we have not received such a report; moreover, last month, we requested a monthly list of issued but unapproved checks, which we have not received.

Mr. O'Neal, is the part time status of the city controller the reason the Board has not received these documents?

MR. O'NEAL: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

I did not reduce anything to writing, relative to the use of UHY as a -- as a consult, as our controller, consultant. I will tell you, as I indicated at the last meeting, that

12 they've come in with some catch up that they had to do.

They're doing fine. Can we do better? I'm looking to possibly having a full time controller on board.

This was stopgap, because of the situation with Plante Moran. I'm happy with John Pepperman, I'm happy with UHY coming in and doing it. I know we've had a trailing budget to actual, that you couldn't understand because of the catch up, but we did catch those up. At the minutes, I think your minutes show that you didn't get it, but you did get it because it was late, but we did get those to you.

We're going to have those reports timely to you. The other part, Mr. Koryzno --

MR. KORYZNO: Well, the two parts, one was whether the firm of UHY is performing in a part time capacity versus the

former controllers, the contract controller who was performing it on a full time capacity. My concern, and perhaps I'll let

Mr. Bolden speak for himself, is whether the adequacy of a part time function can fulfill the requirements necessary to stay on top of the financial issues here in the city. And secondly, the reports, particularly the checks that are issued, how are the checks being issued --

MR. O'NEAL: Okay, I would let Mr. Pepperman speak to the reports, and I will tell you that for the last couple of months, that Mr. Pepperman has been here more on a full time basis than a part time basis because of obviously, the learning curve and the catching up to that. And that will wane itself down as we move on, and we kind of expected that, going forward.

Relative to the checks and those other reports, I'll leave that for Mr. Pepperman.

Mr. Pepperman, could you please summarize this report for the Board?

MR. PEPPERMAN: I'd be happy to. Basically, we are, for the most part, on track, budget to actual. The only concern we have is in the DPW, and we think that has to do with where services are actually being performed, versus where the budgeted numbers are set up. In particular, there's an ordinance officer within the DPW that should be in the Community Development block grant area; that's where the funding's at, for him. And I believe his costs should be moved there. That would help relieve some of the issues in the DPW budget.

Also, DPW provides services to the water and sewer department. I believe part of their money should be charged to water and sewer, as opposed to DPW. Not only for past performance, but for future performance, also. I have talked with the DPW director, he believes about 20 percent of his money and time was allocated towards water and sewer.

Police department seems to be, or public safety,

excuse me, seems to be on budget, and everybody else seems to be within their budgeted line items.

MR. KORYZNO: Thank you. Any questions for Mr. Pepperman?

MR. BOVITZ: No.

MR. KORYZNO: Okay. I have a question for Administrator O'Neal. It appears that a significant amount of DPW expenses are related to the director's wages. That one time, this individual, although an administrative person, was receiving overtime, and now that you've got an HR firm on board, working for the city, has this, have they opined as to the validity of an administrator receiving overtime?

MR. O'NEAL: We've looked at that, and there's no violation of FELSA (sp) on that. We've looked at that. I know you and I had discussed this, and the Board had discussed it in the past. Again, the DPW is a work in process. There are a lot of things that the DPW superintendent can do that other people cannot do. We're trying to keep the costs down, relative to the individuals, to keep us under the AC-8 (sp) kick in, what have you, so -- again, going forward in the next year into the next year's budget, I will be discussing with you, and the DPW area, possible ways to saving funds relative to that.

And again, we only have one administrator in the DPW, and he gets called for everything; that's one of those

MS. MAJOR: My name is Rhonda Major, I'm here to represent (indiscernible) for the treasurer. And we're here, - she submitted resolution to try to hire help in her office, and we tried to meet with Wayne O'Neal, and he never got back with us to set up a meeting to go over the concerns.

Terri Capra, who's in there working in other different capacities, just trying to help out Tanisha Sellers at the new position, water department, running back and forth, and sometime her office is just shut down, lights off. And I worked in that capacity for like 17 years — recommended that I get the position, based on my experience in the operation of the treasurer's office, and the salary could be negotiable, and going over the contract, based on Tim — he said that he recommended that the treasurer's office needed help even before now, because the work is being passed to the controller's office, all over the place.

And he said it needed to come back in house. And finally, having experience over, knowing how to do everything in there, that was Tim's recommendation, so he said he was going to add more money to the budget. And I think we have money in the budget to hire myself and if they want to hire a union position, as well, based on, we wanted to come before

this Board and see what your recommendations would be.

In the clerk's office, they had a union person that left, and they hired someone outside the union. So their office is being handled, but, the treasurer's office is not being handled correctly, I think it's being -- it's just like being handicapped. And she's had major concerns regarding, that she's been the treasurer over 20 some years, and never been through nothing like this. So, I guess we'd just like insight on -- from the Board, to see how she should handle this matter.

MR. KORYZNO: All right, thank you. We'll address that during the comments.

Next item is board comment. In regards to the concerns regarding the treasurer's office, Mr. Van de Grift, can you clarify for the Board, or for the audience as well, the procedure for hiring or staffing, per the EM's orders?

MR. VAN de GRIFT: Yes, I can. Ordinarily, there was a procedure before Joyce Parker was appointed as, originally, emergency financial manager and most recently, emergency manager. She left in place a series of orders that survive after her departure. Two of those orders are on point here. They mandate that all hiring decisions be made by the city

administrator, who currently is Wayne O'Neal.

And so, any alternate method, be it in the charter or by prior use, you know, it is no longer appropriate. Wayne is the contact and the authority for all staffing. The kind of counter to that is that all contracts over \$10,000 are reviewed by the RTAB board, so that would include most employment contracts.

MR. BOVITZ: And that's the reason we denied the resolution, for the city council and not the fact that we're against the hiring, it's just that the process, if you could -- the city administrator has to do the hiring.

MR. VAN de GRIFT: That's right.

MR. KORYZNO: Thank you, Mr. Van de Grift. So consequently, this Board has no authority to intervene in this matter. It's purely at the local level, under the hand of Mr. O'Neal.

MS. MAJOR: Can I ask a question?

MR. KORYZNO: Yes?

MS. MAJOR: But when we try to discuss this matter, he never returned the call or got back to us to try to get this matter resolved.

MR. KORYZNO: I think that's a matter that you need to resolve locally, and come to some type of disagreement, agree not to agree otherwise. This Board's function is to review actions taken by the city council and requests by the city

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administrator, and that we don't delve any deeper than that,
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    unfortunately for you.
             Any comments for you, Mr. Bovitz? If not, I'll
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    entertain a motion to adjourn.
