17	MR. BOVITZ: Support.
18	MR. SYKES: All those in favor say aye.
19	MR. BOVITZ: Aye.
20	MS. BROPHY: Aye.
21	MR. SYKES: Aye.
22	Those opposed the same?
23	(No response.)
24	MR. SYKES: The agenda is approved.
25	I'd like to remind the audience that if you

1 intend to speak during the public comment portion of the 2 meeting, it will be necessary for you to sign in at the sheet that's located at the podium. 3 4 Okay, so with that, we'll move on to the 5 approval of the RTAB minutes of the March 14th, 2017 6 meeting. I'll entertain a motion to approve the March 7 14th -- Patrick, is this the appropriate time to talk about the budget or? 8 9 MR. DOSTINE: We can do it, Mr. Chair, under the 10 March 14th resolution. 11 MR. SYKES: Okay. So I'll entertain a motion to 12 approve the March 14th, 2017 RTAB minutes as presented. 13 MR. BOVITZ: So moved. 14 MS. BROPHY: Support. 15 MR. SYKES: All those in favor say aye. 16 MR. BOVITZ: Aye. 17 MR. SYKES: Aye. 18 MS. BROPHY: Aye. 19 Those opposed the same. MR. SYKES: 20 (No response.) MR. SYKES: The minutes are approved. 21 2.2 We'll move on to old business, which there is 23 So we'll move onto new business. And this is the none. 24 approval of resolutions and ordinances of city council 25 meetings.

1 The first item is a resolution from the regular 2 city council meeting of February 28th, 2017. I'll note that Resolution 402, 408, and 409 were approved at our 3 4 last board meeting. Those were pulled forward. So with 5 that, I'll entertain a motion to approve the resolutions 6 from the regular city council meeting of February 28th, 7 2017. MS. BROPHY: Move approval. 8 9 MR. BOVITZ: Support. 10 MR. SYKES: All those in favor say aye. MR. BOVITZ: Aye. 11 12 MS. BROPHY: Aye. 13 MR. SYKES: Aye. 14 Those opposed the same. 15 (No response.) 16 MR. SYKES: These resolutions have been 17 approved. 18 Next we have resolutions from the regular city 19 council meeting of March 14, 2017. At this point I'd just 20 like to pull the budget from this portion just to get a 21 little bit of a discussion about the budget. Tim? 22 MR. SADOWSKI: Oh. I'm up. 23 MR. SYKES: There you go. Mr. Sadowski 24 Okay, the budget. I prepared the MS. BROPHY: 25 budget. I basically used the incremental approach for

expenditures and basically kept revenues flat. For a community that's distressed, it makes financial sense to do so, so we know that we will absolutely hit our revenue target. And then if inflation or other -- some incremental increases for our expenses, we know we have the funds available. And if it's a lot more than the 3 percent that we budget throughout the funds, I can maneuver between line item budgets to cover an expense more than 3 percent on one item.

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So, the city's been using that approach for the last, what, this will be our third year, and we've always had a net income every year, so, or a balanced budget.

The millages are all the same except for one. The only millage that increased was for the MERS pension debts. All the other millages are either maxed out or -pretty much they're all maxed out. So that's the only one that can be increased because it's based on debt.

18 We did eliminate the Environmental Protection 19 Agency levy, that goes back to over 20 years, because the 20 city has collected enough funds to have a reserve, paid 21 remaining obligations. So actually even though that one 2.2 millage went up about a mill-and-a-half, we lost three 23 overall, so actually the millage rate went down. And we 24 also lost about 3 percent in taxable value. So the city 25 will, residents will not only see a millage decrease on

their tax bill, they'll also see an assessment decrease on their tax bill. So overall taxes are going down. Not to say that's for every single resident, but overall on the city-wide tax base tax revenues, their tax bills, revenues are going down just because of the millage and taxable values.

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7 Every fund has a balanced budget. I had talked about the rubbish fund being maxed out last time. 8 We are 9 using our fund balance to balance that because we had no 10 other option other than general operating, and we have 11 such a large fund balance from the local community 12 stabilization share from last year. We'll just use that 13 fund balance up. Which will probably last us another six 14 or seven years before we have to start transferring 15 operational revenues from the general fund.

Our library has been operating pretty well for a small library. They went down to 2, from 3 down to 2; that's why their budget's so well. And they have been using a program that they get an additional clerical staff for free through one of the state programs.

21 Community development block keeps going down
22 every year. I don't know if anybody's read the news.
23 It's always on the agenda to be cut or eliminated.
24 MR. SYKES: Right.
25 MR. SADOWSKI: And we just go year by year. So

that has been set a \$122,000. Not very much. But we usually always spend our -- we're one of the few communities in Wayne County that spend all of our money. So we use that for sidewalks, housing, fire trucks; pretty much basic services.

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As I said, our stabilization bond will be paid off November 1st, 2017. That is from the 2002 emergency -- even though we were not in receivership at that time, we did issue stabilization bonds to cover the shortfall. That will finally be paid off. That's a long time; fifteen years later.

Our judgment bond, that is from the 2011 emergency. We have over 20 years left on that debt. That's one of the things, but we do have a tax millage to cover that debt.

16 The water and sewer fund, I incrementally 17 increased that by 5 percent like I did in previous years. 18 We have discussions with DUWA in Wayne County on 19 consolidation or takeover and merging, and there's a lot 20 of unknowns. The rate did increase substantially since 21 I've been here. As it is right now, the only thing that 2.2 is underperforming is sewer revenues, and like I said, we 23 lose the water and sewer millage in July, so those monies 24 are gone. So that will be interesting to see where water 25 and sewer -- water should be fine, sewer projections are

1 the only things that is not exactly where it needs to be. 2 It's about -- it's less than 10 percentage points from operating where it should be, and I've been thinking about 3 4 that because, so sewer is based on water operations, so to 5 me it's kind of interesting why they should not be right 6 at the meeting. So maybe something I'll have to look at 7 if it doesn't pick up by year end. So that's pretty much for the budget overall. 8 9 MR. SYKES: Okay. Thanks for the presentation. 10 Are there any questions? 11 Any questions? 12 MS. BROPHY: Just assuming -- assuming community 13 development block grant does disappear, which I don't know 14 that it will, I mean what are the plans for the fire truck 15 payment? I think there's a couple more payments. 16 MR. SADOWSKI: Yeah, we have a couple more 17 payments. Those will have to come out of the general 18 fund. And then, but yeah, it's almost \$50,000. 19 MS. BROPHY: Right. 20 MR. SADOWSKI: And actually we used a program 21 income because we had liens that were paid off this year, 2.2 to pay that, and we released the loans from the general 23 fund. So that's a big one. Fire truck will have to come 24 out of operating revenues. And then the ordinance 25 officer will also have to come out of operating revenues.

1 MR. SYKES: How many years of payments on the 2 fire truck? MR. SADOWSKI: I believe there's two more. 3 4 MS. BROPHY: Two more. 5 MR. SADOWSKI: I have one here. The fire truck, 6 last payment, March 2019. So two more. So that would be 7 an additional \$100,000 the city would have to make up over the years if it was completely eliminated. 8 9 MR. BOVITZ: And the ose public safety budget, 10 it's sad that the MERS retirement is almost as much as the 11 full staff salary budget, 1.2 million and 1.4 million. 12 MR. SADOWSKI: Yeah. 13 MR. BOVITZ: You know, it's like public safety 14 is very important to the City of Ecorse, and I just wish 15 that we could do something else with how to fund the 16 retirement. And then the other one was, that I noticed, the 17 18 audit fees were expected to go down by \$8,000. Do you 19 expect less work to be done this year? 20 MR. SADOWSKI: The reason why we do that is we have the audit for our financial statements and then we 21 2.2 have the audit for retiree healthcare. Retiree healthcare 23 is every other year, so it goes up and down. It's just a 24 biannual expense. So we're not really saving any money. 25 It's just we don't do the healthcare audit every year.

1 MR. BOVITZ: And the proposed consolidation of 2 your position as administrator/controller, what does that do to the budget for --3 4 MR. SADOWSKI: It's a \$77,000 savings for next 5 fiscal year starting July 1st. 6 MR. BOVITZ: Because you're both considered 7 part-time at this point and it's going to be --MR. SADOWSKI: Well, the city already pays for 8 9 my benefits, which is a substantial savings, and it would 10 be an over \$40,000 saving on salaries alone. So when you 11 add salaries and benefits together, it's a \$77,000 12 savings. To adjust the city administrator budget that's 13 already budgeted, that's already proposed in here, so that would, you know, that would -- what am I at right now? 14 15 So right now we're at \$3,000, so another \$77,000 is, you know, \$80,000 surplus; not only that, by, as you 16 17 were speaking earlier, that instead of contracting out the 18 controller's position, that saves the city another \$30,000 19 by having an employee rather than a CPA contractor. So 20 together that's a \$107,000 savings every year. 21 MR. BOVITZ: Okay. 2.2 MR. SYKES: Okay. All right, no further 23 questions? 24 (No response.) 25 MR. SYKES: All right, so with that I'll

1 entertain a motion to approve all of the resolutions from 2 the regular city council meeting of March 14, 2017. 3 MS. BROPHY: So moved. 4 MR. BOVITZ: Support. 5 MR. SYKES: All those in favor say aye. 6 MS. BROPHY: Aye. 7 MR. BOVITZ: Aye. 8 Those opposed the same. MR. SYKES: 9 (No response.) 10 MR. SYKES: The motion to approve is -- or the 11 motion for these resolutions have been approved. 12 We'll move on to Number 3, claims and accounts 13 of regular city council meeting draft minutes, March 28th, 2017. 14 15 MR. BOVITZ: Motion to approve the claims and 16 accounts from the regular city council meeting of March 28, 2017. 17 18 MS. BROPHY: Support. 19 MR. SYKES: All those in favor say aye. 20 MS. BROPHY: Aye. 21 MR. BOVITZ: Aye. 22 MR. SYKES: Aye. 23 Those opposed the same. 24 (No response.) 25 MR. SYKES: This motion is passed.

1 We'll move on to the city administrator items. 2 First is the approval of city council minutes. This was addressed in new business. 3 4 Next is the approval of the budget to actual, 5 February 2017. So I'll entertain a motion to approve the 6 budget to actual report for February 2017. 7 MS. BROPHY: Move to approve. MR. BOVITZ: Support. 8 9 MR. SYKES: All those in favor say aye. 10 MR. BOVITZ: Aye. 11 MS. BROPHY: Ave. 12 MR. SYKES: Aye. 13 Those opposed the same. 14 (No response.) 15 MR. SYKES: This motion has been approved. 16 Next we'll move to the approval of Resolution 17 427. This is the 2017/18 Budget and Millage General 18 Appropriations Act. This was addressed in new business. 19 Next we have the approval of Resolution 428. 20 This is the 2017/18 police and fire special assessment. 21 And again, this has been addressed in new business. 2.2 Number 5, we have the approval of Resolution 23 429, 2017/18 street lighting special assessment, and this also was addressed in new business. 24 25 Next we'll move to the approval of Resolution

450, award restoration of the Dingell Park bid. While this action on this item occurred during a city council meeting outside of normal review of today's board meeting, the city manager is requesting to bring this item forward for early review.

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6 Mr. Flaten, could you give comment on this item? 7 This went out. We had eight MR. FLATEN: bidders. It's came back. The eligible bidder was Elgin 8 9 Builders. And their bid was a hundred and -- no --10 sixteen -- fourteen thousand dollars less than what we had received from Detroit Edison. 11 It's all there in the 12 neighborhood of \$170,000 and what we received from Edison 13 was \$184,000. So we accepted their bid. We're not 14 anticipating any changes to that unless, until 15 construction starts. The main thing being that the 16 foundation to the structure itself will have to be 17 checked; see if there's any cracks or anything that was 18 created in the sewer lines or water lines because of the 19 And at that point we will go back to Edison explosion. 20 for additional funds if they are needed. 21 MR. BOVITZ: I just noticed, Hennessey was asked 2.2

to review, and there were 7 bids. There's a big range, a hundred and fifty-eight-seven being the Elgin low bid, up to \$360,000 the high bid. What --

MR. FLATEN: Yeah, we couldn't figure out the

\$360,000 unless they were planning on doing extensions or additions to what we had asked for. That seems unreasonable.

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MR. BOVITZ: In Hennessey the recommended that you interview the two lowest, Elgin and Pizzo. Did Pizzo have a say-so? Because they were only, on a \$158,000 bid they were only \$180 more?

MR. FLATEN: They were \$180 more, and yes, 8 9 Hennessey talked to both of them. They interviewed former 10 clients of theirs or, you know, the contractor and that. 11 The one contractor I will tell you kind of said that they 12 weren't happy with Elgin, but we found out that other 13 contractors working for that community received the same 14 type of notification that they weren't happy with 15 anybody's work, so.

MR. BOVITZ: Yeah. I just want to make sure
we're going with best value as opposed to low bid.

MR. FLATEN: Yeah

MR. BOVITZ: So if Elgin can perform.

20 MR. FLATEN: Yeah. And they're both local, 21 Pizzo as well as Elgin, are both local bidders, but you 22 know, and it seems awful close, but Elgin weighed out. 23 MR. SYKES: Any further questions? 24 MS. BROPHY: No. 25 MR. SYKES: Okay. I'll entertain a motion to

1 approve Resolution 450, that's the award of the 2 restoration for the Dingell Park bid. 3 MR. BOVITZ: So moved. 4 MS. BROPHY: Support. 5 MR. SYKES: All those in favor say aye. 6 MR. BOVITZ: Aye. 7 MS. BROPHY: Aye. 8 MR. SYKES: Aye. 9 Those opposed the same. 10 (No response.) MR. SYKES: 11 This resolution has been approved. 12 Next we have approval of Resolution 453. This 13 is a budget amendment. And again, while this action on 14 this item occurred during a council meeting outside of 15 normal review of today's meeting, the city manager has 16 requested that we bring this item forward for early review. 17 18 Could you please comment on that as well? 19 MR. FLATEN: I'll let Tim. 20 MR. SYKES: Tim. MR. FLATEN: Let Tim explain that one. 21 2.2 MR. SADOWSKI: This is just a standard quarterly 23 budget amendment. You can see that as the city operates 24 through the year that our net income keeps increasing 25 across all funds, which is positive for the City of

Ecorse, which means we can do more projects this spring, which is on the agenda for tonight at 7:30. So based on that, you can see our general fund is going up to \$41,000 net income, and that's if the city spent every single dollar on every single line item and completed every single project on tonight's agenda, so we will definitely have a positive net income.

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The only thing that would ever throw that off would be a substantial claim to a lawsuit that we would have to come up with a substantial expense. Even though those are -- yeah, so that's pretty much it. Operationalwise the city is good to go on the general fund.

Our major and local street funds have projects budgeted for engineering. We're hoping to have a summer project based on engineering cost, so that looks good.

You can see the rubbish fund, as I discussed before, is doing well with that surplus extra funds.

The library is doing well.

19All our funds are doing well. Even though the20water and sewer fund has a \$223,000 surplus budgeted, it's21going to be contingent upon sewer actual revenues. So22there's some leeway there. Like I said, it'll just be23based on where the actual numbers for sewer come in.24The city's going the right direction for the25third quarter. There's only one quarter left, so.

1 MR. SYKES: There was a discussion in there 2 about surplus at the end of the year and what's to be done with that. 3 4 MR. SADOWSKI: Yeah, that's -- the city has to 5 invest all surpluses over working capital into bonds. Uh-huh. 6 MR. SYKES: 7 MR. SADOWSKI: Municipal bonds with the state of Michigan. 8 9 MR. SYKES: Okay. 10 MR. SADOWSKI: That's kind of a non-incentive to 11 have a surplus if you look at it from a certain way. 12 Should the city maximize its expenditures and have a 13 balanced budget and do as many projects or do they want the money to sit in a bond for the next 20 years. 14 15 MR. SYKES: So now is there any sort of a 16 restriction on what type of municipal bonds to be 17 purchased or? 18 MR. SADOWSKI: According to our policy they have 19 to be A or higher; AA or higher. 20 MR. SYKES: Okay. MR. SADOWSKI: The state of Michigan, I did a 21 2.2 presentation to the council. They could either buy mutual 23 funds, which is a collaboration of municipal bonds of the 24 state of Michigan. There's currently three indexes that 25 have those Michigan bonds. Or we could buy bonds directly

1 straight from the municipality itself. Because of the 2 fees, the fees are \$2,500 per million annually to have a mutual fund. The city council said they were not worried 3 4 about the liquidity of a four day return for cash. 5 Instead they would rather have a guaranteed investment 6 bond, so they're guaranteed interest income and they're 7 guaranteed their money back. The whole guestion becomes what is our legal counsel going to say the working capital 8 9 is, and I don't know that. I don't know that answer. 10 MR. SYKES: Okay. Now the bonds going forward 11 that would be purchased, these wouldn't, like the last 12 time we put ourselves in a situation where we couldn't 13 liquidate, the bonds being purchased going forward wouldn't have the same sort of restriction? 14 15 MR. SADOWSKI: We -- no, we can liquidate those 16 bonds now. 17 MR. SYKES: Okay. 18 MR. SADOWSKI: Before we could not liquidate 19 those bonds because the IRS were in the middle of coming 20 up with regulations as to what was going to be taxes on 21 bonds and how you could use the money. 2.2 MR. SYKES: Okay. 23 MR. SADOWSKI: So we purchased those bonds in 24 I think we had a March deadline according to March. 25 Plante Moran. So in July the IRS came out with the

1 official regulations. Now the official regulations say if 2 there is an emergency or a municipal expense, within 90 days the city can liquidate that money and spend that 3 4 money in 90 days. So pretty much then the only thing that 5 comes to play is it is no longer a hold to investment 6 bond. You will then have to find a seller and then sell 7 at the rate. MR. SYKES: Right. 8 9 MR. SADOWSKI: So then you kind of have 10 investment interest rate loss or gain. 11 MR. SYKES: Right. 12 MR. SADOWSKI: Could be either way. But that's 13 So if the city needed the money, we could the only risk. find a seller, usually takes a week or two to find a 14 15 buyer. We are the seller. A week or two to find a buyer 16 for the municipal bonds, have that money in our bank 17 account, and then spent it within 90 days, that is 18 perfectly legitimate now. 19 MR. SYKES: Okay. 20 MR. SADOWSKI: So really it's just an investment 21 risk. 2.2 MR. SYKES: Okay. 23 MS. BROPHY: For the future. 24 MR. SYKES: All right, that's good. Do you guys have any further questions? 25

1 Okay, I'll entertain a motion to approve 2 Resolution 453, the budget amendment, or budget amendment number four. 3 4 MR. BOVITZ: So moved. 5 MS. BROPHY: Support. 6 MR. SYKES: All those in favor say aye. 7 MR. BOVITZ: Aye. 8 MR. SYKES: Ave. 9 MS. BROPHY: Aye. 10 MR. SYKES: Those opposed the same. 11 (No response.) 12 MR. SYKES: The Resolution 453 has been 13 approved. 14 Next we'll move on to approval of Resolution 15 454. This one is the appointment of Timothy Sadowski as 16 the city administrator/controller. Again, while this action -- the action on this item occurred during a city 17 18 council meeting that's outside the normal period for 19 today's board meeting, the city manager has requested to 20 bring this item forward for early review. 21 Mr. Flaten. 22 MR. FLATEN: Yes, sir. 23 It is the recommendation, my recommendation as 24 well as the approval of city council, to appoint Tim 25 Sadowski as your city administrator and controller. Ι

1 think you all know just from the presentation he just gave 2 he's got a keen knowledge of all the finance issues that take place in this city, and he has, in my estimation, 3 4 grasped the daily process of being city administrator to, 5 when the things have come up on a daily basis involving 6 that position. So it's all been explained at council. We 7 have a contract that's been prepared for him. We put an addendum or an attachment to that contract to outline his 8 9 job description as well -- as city administrator as well as the controller's position. On the controller's 10 11 position I did go through and eliminate from that position 12 that's currently the one we've been using for controller, 13 we've taken out several items and we'll be transferring 14 that to another individual to handle those items in order 15 to prevent any internal control issues that may arise 16 during audit.

17 I think every audit, Bob, you know this 18 yourself, every audit's got recommendations in it. On our 19 last we had recommendations, they were forwarded -- or 20 deficiencies were forwarded to the state of Michigan. Tim 21 answered those deficiencies as well as myself, and we have 2.2 not heard back from the state on it, but I think they're 23 well aware too that we can only move so much around 24 between positions here in the city because we are short 25 staffed, but that does not preclude us from having good

internal control measures. And by creating this position with Tim occupying both administrator and controller, we will still maintain the internal control integrity that is desired.

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MR. SYKES: Well, you hit upon exactly what my concern was, is that by combining these two positions, it's not a Tim thing; it's a whoever were to sit in this position, it would be to make sure that there is enough separation of duties so that we wouldn't run into any kind of a conflict or any kind of an issue.

One of the things that I've been thinking about on this is, not to say that we can't go ahead and vote on this today, but if there are -- you know, within a certain period of time, maybe by our next meeting or the following meeting, if the audit group, you know, who does the financial audit, if they could take a look and if, not an opinion, but maybe a comfort letter or something along those lines that says that they have looked at the --

MR. FLATEN: Job descriptions of both positions -MR. SYKES: -- job duties and the separation -MR. FLATEN: Sure.
MR. SYKES: -- to see if it's something they're
comfortable with, so we could get that sort of third party
comfort, and it also kind of brings that issue to the

1 forefront for them as well. If we could do something 2 along those lines. MR. FLATEN: We can do that. Our auditors 3 4 currently are Raymond Robson. Personally, and this is not 5 shared opinion of anybody in this room I don't believe, 6 but my personal opinion, wasn't real happy with the way 7 they presented their recommendations regarding our deficiencies because none of us were brought to the table 8 9 to discuss those deficiencies. They were just printed up. 10 MR. SYKES: And that's awkward. 11 MS. BROPHY: Yeah. 12 MR. FLATEN: That is their --13 MR. SYKES: That's not typical. 14 MR. FLATEN: That is very awkward. 15 MR. SYKES: Yeah. 16 MR. FLATEN: Normally that doesn't happen. I am 17 a former auditor --18 MR. SYKES: Right. 19 MR. FLATEN: -- so I know how that works, and we 20 would have appreciated some conversation with them. The 21 one notably was the fact that they said that we did not 2.2 approve the 2015/16 budget until July. Now the minutes 23 will show that the budget for that particular period was 24 approved in February, but there was an adjustment to the 25 budget in July. That adjustment was necessitated by some

1 changes that we had made in terms of wages and benefits. 2 MR. SYKES: Who manages that contract? MR. FLATEN: I don't -- can't remember the 3 4 manager's name. 5 MR. SYKES: No, from the city standpoint. Is 6 that something that the city handles, hiring the 7 accounting firm? MR. FLATEN: The auditor? 8 9 MR. SYKES: Yeah. 10 MS. BROPHY: Yeah. 11 MR. FLATEN: Yeah. 12 MR. SYKES: I would say during that process you 13 should have that discussion with them. It seems to me it's atypical that you don't get an opportunity to respond 14 15 to those findings. Oftentimes you even see the auditees' responses and how they plan to resolve --16 17 MR. SYKES: Yeah, we --18 MR. SYKES: -- those issues as a part of the 19 report. 20 MR. FLATEN: Yeah, like I said, we responded to Kerry Cary Vaughn (phonetic) at local audit. 21 MR. SYKES: Uh-huh. 2.2 23 MR. FLATEN: We haven't heard anything back yet 24 as to whether they accept our discussion on the 25 deficiencies or not, but we're proceeding ahead. We've

already met the deficiencies and corrected them. We're just moving on. We're not going to wait for an opinion from them and move forward. And I can pretty much assure you that those deficiencies will not show in the next audit.

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MR. SYKES: Okay. Well, from my standpoint, you know, this is that I -- I'm ready to vote and move forward on this. I think what I would say is that if the audit comfort letter, you know, if you will, comes back and they have recommendations on further separation of duties or something along those lines, you know, I would hope that folks would take that very seriously.

MR. FLATEN: We will.

MR. BOVITZ: Well, I'm more concerned about what started this action. Is it because your temporary position when you were phasing out normally or?

MR. FLATEN: Yeah, I'll be done at the end of April.

MR. BOVITZ: So when council voted on this back at the March 28th meeting, so how has that affected the day-to-day operations since that point?

22 MR. FLATEN: Things have been well. I mean I'm 23 working on a fire fighter's contract, Tim has been working 24 on different issues, notably this redemption issue with 25 the new tax laws and so forth; he's worked on that. He's

very familiar with the contracts as they stand right now. There's been no loss of continuity in terms of operation in any way, shape, or form. I'll stick around and work on this 'til the end of the month because I would really like to finish that fire fighter contract and get that done. We've got another contract coming up with the AFSCME personnel, of which there's only three that are in that bargaining unit, but that has to be addressed, so. But there's no loss of continuity whatsoever.

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MR. BOVITZ: And my other concern is our city attorney, Wycoff, he represented the city at these meetings in the past, and there was concern with the previous city administrator with the contract done and maybe a little too generous, so I'm assuming that the correct contract was reviewed by Mr. Wycoff or his assistant?

MR. FLATEN: The contract was reviewed by Wycoff. He had some concerns; those concerns have been addressed both at his level and at the council level --

MR. BOVITZ: So --

21 MR. FLATEN: -- and their council was very much 22 satisfied with the decision they've made to hire Tim as 23 your city administrator and controller.

MR. BOVITZ: So the fact that we don't have a representative at this meeting is no indication that the

city attorney's position has been phased out or limited or?

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MR. FLATEN: Well, I -- the city attorney's position will never be phased out; I mean you'll always need to have a city attorney.

MR. BOVITZ: But for the purposes of the RTAB. I mean, I would like to see something official from the city attorney regarding this contract and also his approval of the consolidation because of the audit standpoint, the one thing, but also from a legal standpoint I want to make sure that we have, you know, a blessing going forward.

13 MR. FLATEN: Okay, we can get you that. He's 14 reviewed the contract. He did have some concerns, and 15 like I say, they were addressed. Truthfully, some of 16 those concerns are not warranted, and the reason why I say 17 that is because I've worked with this gentleman for a 18 year, and I've seen what he can do, what he does on a day-19 to-day basis. We've had discussions on things where he 20 took one opinion and I took another, but through conversation with both of us, we were able to come to 21 2.2 common ground on anything that was ever presented to this 23 TAB board or even to the city council. 24

MR. BOVITZ: No, I'm more concerned about the city attorney representing the city in its best interests,

1 and in years past we've had some conflict between the 2 mayor and the council and the city administrator and the department heads. I want to make sure everybody's on the 3 4 same page because, Mr. Sadowski, remember, I voted to 5 approve him on the first hire, and I was outvoted by my 6 fellow two, who are not on this current TAB board, by 7 bringing him in the first place, and so I'm glad I voted and stuck to our guns, so-to-speak, to bring him in 8 9 because I'm happy with the results. I just want to make 10 sure that the mayor, the council, the city attorney, and 11 the people of the City of Ecorse are all served in the 12 best interest, so. 13 Well, we can get you that, but like MR. FLATEN: 14 I say, we are aware of what caused concerns, and they --

16 percent, that this is the gentleman you need in this job. 17 MR. BOVITZ: Yeah, and the mayor and council's 18 concern too is the previous city administrator would act

the council has decided, and I would go support that 100

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20 MR. FLATEN: That's -- no --21 MR. BOVITZ: Okay. 2.2 MR. FLATEN: That's not going to happen. 23 All right. MR. BOVITZ: 24 That is not going to happen. MR. FLATEN: 25 That's part of his job description is that he will work

without the consent of the mayor --

1 with the council and the mayor and the TAB board and his 2 department heads in the best interests of the city. This is not where a guy is going to come in and misinterpret 3 4 perhaps 90 percent of your Order 94 or whatever else it 5 was that, "I'm boss and you guys don't mean diddly," so-That's not the case here. He's well aware that 6 to-speak. 7 he has to work with council. And I think truthfully his opinions in a prior administration were -- were forced, 8 9 let's say, and would not -- had he not had an 10 administrator that didn't try to rule with an iron fist, 11 you would have got a more well-informed decision or a 12 request for a decision and a well-informed opinion. And I 13 don't want to say too much about that previous 14 administration because there is a lawsuit against the 15 city. 16 MR. SYKES: That's probably best. 17 So with that, do you -- would you be more 18 comfortable waiting 'til the next meeting and you have 19 that information? 20 MR. BOVITZ: No, I think we should -- because the council approved it on March 28th. 21 2.2 MR. SYKES: Okay. 23 MR. BOVITZ: And the operation of the city, Mr. 24 Flaten is going to be out basically at the end of April, 25 and I think if the city is comfortable with the transition

1 this, then let's approve it. 2 MR. SYKES: Okay, so we'll do that with the caveat that we'll get something from the auditors and 3 4 we'll hear from the city attorney. 5 MR. BOVITZ: Yeah, I'd like to see it on 6 Wycoff's letterhead because right now this is a contract 7 with -- it's a stand alone contract. MR. FLATEN: That's, yes, but I want you 8 9 definitely to keep in mind that some of the opinions that 10 are formed here are without real foundation because 11 there's not a definite day-to-day working relationship 12 that has taken place. It's -- I'm going to tell you, the 13 way I deal with it, I really don't listen to somebody's 14 outside opinion on things. I formulate my concerns about 15 an individual taking a position on the basis of what I 16 know from a working, every day situation. That's how I 17 look at it, and that's what I did here. 18 MR. BOVITZ: Okay. 19 MR. SYKES: All right, with that I will 20 entertain a motion to approve Resolution 454, the appointment of Timothy Sadowski as city administrator and 21 2.2 controller. 23 MR. BOVITZ: So moved. 24 MS. BROPHY: Support. 25 MR. SYKES: All those in favor say aye.

1 MS. BROPHY: Aye. 2 MR. BOVITZ: Aye. 3 MR. SYKES: Aye. 4 Those opposed the same. 5 (No response.) 6 MR. SYKES: Congratulations, Tim. 7 MS. BROPHY: Congratulations, Tim. MR. SADOWSKI: Thank you. 8 9 MR. SYKES: I think. 10 MR. BOVITZ: Does that mean you have to move 11 from Imlay City now? 12 MR. SADOWSKI: I know; it's a drive. 13 MR. SYKES: Okay, so next we'll move on to the approval of Resolution 455. This is the election not to 14 15 redeem bonds. Again, this is an action that has occurred 16 as a city council meeting outside of today's purview, and 17 the city manager has requested that we pull this forward. 18 So Mr. Flaten, would you like to comment? 19 MR. FLATEN: I'll hand that up to Mr. Sadowski. 20 MR. SYKES: Mr. Sadowski, the city 21 administrator. 22 MS. BROPHY: Since he's in charge now. 23 MR. SADOWSKI: I presented the option to redeem 24 or not to redeem bonds to the city council. Under our 25 bond covenant we have to pay a discount -- we have to pay

1 a premium, every year that premium reduces for five years, 2 and because of that they do not want to redeem any bonds. They would rather invest the surplus because they don't 3 4 want to pay the premium to redeem. So, like we discussed 5 before, when I get that dollar amount from legal counsel, 6 those bonds will be purchased. We'll follow the 7 investment policy which says they have to be AA or higher in the state of Michigan, which there's not very many of 8 9 them. I mean I think there's a list that's less than ten 10 usually continually and we'll purchase those bonds. And I 11 said before, we can liquidate those bonds, but the real 12 goal is to hold them for long-term and not lose any 13 interest and return the money. 14 MR. SYKES: Okay. Any questions? 15 All right, I'll entertain a motion to approve 16 Resolution 455, the election not to redeem the bonds. 17 MS. BROPHY: I'll move approval. 18 MR. BOVITZ: Support. 19 MR. SYKES: All those in favor say aye. 20 MR. BOVITZ: Aye. 21 MR. SYKES: Aye. MS. BROPHY: Aye. 2.2 23 MR. SYKES: Those opposed the same? 24 (No response.) 25 Resolution 455 has been approved. MR. SYKES:

1 The next item is checks released, and that was 2 for information only. So at this point we'll move to public comment. 3 4 MR. DOSTINE: Mr. Chair, there is --5 MR. FLATEN: Mr. Chair, we have one additional 6 item that we would like to bring up that's not on your 7 The city has presented, has been presented with a agenda. proposal by the Veterans Village, Incorporated. I'm sure 8 9 Pat's made you aware of this. 10 MR. SYKES: Yep. 11 I understand it's not on the agenda MR. FLATEN: 12 and that does create a concern for you. This item will go 13 before the city council tonight. I'm almost assured that 14 it will pass. It's not a money issue in general to the 15 city at this point, but it does create the need for a 16 contract for the placement of manufactured homes on 17 various lots that the city owns and will deed to these 18 individuals or this corporation, Veterans Village, to 19 place those homes on those lots. We have had several 20 meetings with these people. We've had several contracts that were drawn up, reviewed, redrafted, reviewed, and 21 2.2 drafted again. There is some concern by some individuals 23 that this is not a good deal. But in the sense that it's 24 a chance for us to rebuild in Ecorse and place homes in 25 Ecorse on lots where we have just demolished homes, the

1 contract itself lends itself to building so many within a 2 certain period of time. There's issues in the contract 3 that will, that if certain things are not accomplished, 4 then this contract becomes null and void and the city will 5 not suffer any loss. There are concerns about who this company is or what this company is, where they're from and 6 7 Those questions have all been answered, perhaps so forth. not to the satisfaction of some, but to the majority of 8 9 the council I would have to say that it has been, and 10 discussions with Pat, and I really appreciate this man's 11 help; I want you to know this. We sat this morning and 12 discussed it. He expressed that there are concerns of the 13 board, and again, it will go to council tonight, and what 14 I would request from the board at this time is if you 15 could schedule a special meeting perhaps Thursday or 16 Friday, probably not Friday of this week because I know 17 it's Holy Friday, perhaps Thursday, to take up this one 18 issue and determine your vote.

MR. SYKES: Well, there's a couple of things, and you're right, I had some discussions with Pat about this particular issue, and one of them, it does sound like it's not fully baked, and so there's some concerns from that standpoint. I don't know, it sounds like you said there's a number of contracts, different version of those contracts, and we haven't had an opportunity to sort of

1 review what the final one is. The one I did see still had 2 some holes in it. And again, I've heard some concerns from -- that maybe the city attorney has issues with this. 3 4 MR. FLATEN: That's true; he does. 5 MR. SYKES: And so right out of the gate, when 6 the city attorney has issues with something that hasn't 7 been to the city council yet, I wouldn't even be prepared yet necessarily to want to vote on this on Thursday. I'd 8 9 want to see where the city attorney's -- what the issues 10 were and how those issues are going to be resolved. I 11 mean this one does make me a little bit nervous. We do a 12 lot of work with developers and developers are always 13 telling you how you got to do it now, you got to get your 14 approval now, if this doesn't happen within a certain 15 period of time. So I understand, you know, your concern 16 there, but I'm also nervous that we're -- you're asking us 17 to approve something that really isn't ready to be 18 approved. Well, it's -- to be clear though, it isn't 19 ready for us to approve it because this hasn't been to the 20 city council yet. 21 MR. FLATEN: No. 2.2 MR. SYKES: And I understand that's why you're 23 saying can we come back on Thursday. 24 MR. FLATEN: Right, it's going tonight. 25 MR. SYKES: Yeah.

1 MR. FLATEN: And yeah, there are concerns. The 2 city attorney addressed several concerns. Truthfully, those concerned were levied when we first met with this 3 4 corporation, and that's why there's so many drafts of this 5 agreement, because we took into consideration some of 6 those concerns by the city attorney, and I have also 7 engaged the services of another attorney to provide not really an opinion, but to review that, the agreement that 8 9 we have, and expressed his concerns, and those concerns 10 were somewhat less than our own city attorney, but we've 11 addressed what he has brought forward and taken that into 12 consideration in this final agreement or tentatively final 13 agreement that has been presented.

14 We could provide you with the opinion of the 15 city attorney, Charlie Wycoff, and -- it's just that this 16 project, we're trying to move this city forward. We 17 understand hesitation, but at this point we think the 18 agreement is sufficient enough and clear enough that if 19 anything cannot be completed by them as agreed to, then 20 the property just reverts back to us and we're back to where we are with vacancies sitting around, and in the 21 2.2 meantime we're trying to get things done. We're trying to 23 move forward. The project itself is Veterans Village, 24 but, yes, will veterans be purchasing these homes? We 25 hope they do. But the general public can purchase these

too, and that's where the tax value comes in, and we can't put a number on that tax value right now until we see how this agreement goes.

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If it went according to what everybody's desire is, well, we'd be okay, and there'd be some additional revenue coming our way, and we think that with these homes coming in and the values of these homes, we may just increase our own taxable value from what it is now to something greater. You know, reflect -- and it would also bring other people into the city, both commercially and residentially, to help us improve our position.

So a lot of thought has gone into this, and to -- but we will provide you with the comments and that'll help you make a decision, but I would request that if not this week, then perhaps one day next week we could have a special meeting after you've had a chance to review it.

MR. SYKES: Okay, we can have a discussion about that.

19 This -- I want to make sure managing 20 expectations going forward on this and whenever the vote 21 takes place, I'm not suggesting that you're doing this at 2.2 all. I have a very -- a high amount of respect for you. 23 I get -- but I do get a little nervous when I hear folks 24 say that one attorney didn't tell them or give them the 25 information that they wanted, so they got another. We

1 usually call it pick me shopping --2 MR. FLATEN: No, it wasn't that. We needed clarification on an item. 3 4 MR. SYKES: Uh-huh. 5 MR. FLATEN: That's all. MR. SYKES: Just clarification. 6 7 MR. FLATEN: And a lot of times we'll do that. We hear one thing, need a little clarification because we 8 9 feel that the first opinion that we receive was somewhat 10 misquided. 11 MR. SYKES: Then in that point then it seems 12 like it'd be more prudent for the two of you to get 13 together and resolve the potential issue. 14 MR. FLATEN: Oh, I agree with that. It would be 15 great if we could do that, but it was quite adamant on the 16 part of one individual that this is not a good project. 17 MR. SYKES: Well, so then the other piece of it, 18 to head in that direction, is has anybody done any sort of 19 a review with the, I assume the correct term would be 20 developer of this particular project to see if they have the capacity? 21 2.2 I mean is this something, is this a group that's 23 done this numerous times throughout the country in other 24 states, in this state, or is this sort of their first 25 short at this?

1 MR. FLATEN: This is a group that has done 2 certain things with manufactured homes, yes. MR. SYKES: Uh-huh. So its capacity, you know, 3 to deliver on something like this would be important. 4 5 I am not suggesting at all again that this group 6 is doing this, but I think that there's a lot of respect 7 and there's a lot of desire on the public in general to do things for our veterans and they deserve everything that 8 9 we can do for them, but my fear is sometimes folks will 10 tack the word "veteran" onto something to get excitement 11 that might not be warranted. 12 That is a very understandable MR. FLATEN: 13 concern, Jeff. 14 MR. SYKES: Yeah. 15 MR. FLATEN: Very understandable concern, 16 because there are a number of organizations out there that 17 have taken full advantage of the fact that there are 18 veterans involved and they use that as a sympathy card, 19 you might say --20 MR. SYKES: Correct. 21 MR. FLATEN: -- to get what they want. I don't 2.2 see that this is the case here totally because they do 23 open it up to the general public for purchase too. 24 MR. SYKES: Okay, but so you feel that due 25 diligence on this entity, you feel that they have the

capacity to deliver?

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2 They do. They've got their funding MR. FLATEN: in place; we know that. We've been made aware of that. 3 4 The company that they deal with down in Indiana is 5 Champion Homes, and Champion Homes have built a number of 6 homes in the state of Michigan. So we know that they're a 7 decent builder. This contract also, we make sure that they have to comply with all of our building codes, and if 8 9 they can't do that, then they're not going to build 10 either. And then, here again, that is something that 11 where this will revert back to us if they can't complete 12 their agreement. 13 MR. SYKES: Okav. 14 Do you have any questions at this time? 15 MS. BROPHY: There's not a lot of information in 16 there, so. 17 MR. SYKES: Right. Right. 18 I'm happy to try and figure if there's a time 19 that we can get together sooner if that's something that 20 we could entertain, but again, the expectation is that I 21 just want to make sure that we've addressed what the city attorney --2.2 23 MR. FLATEN: I understand. 24 MR. SYKES: -- has said. And again, I don't 25 know if you -- do you have any particular standards or

1 anything that you look for to make sure that they have the 2 capacity? This development group? Because if you have anything that you can 3 4 provide to show information where they've done this before 5 and that it's not a concern, that would be very 6 appreciated. 7 MR. FLATEN: Okay. I'll see. I'll get you as much information as you possibly need. 8 9 MR. SYKES: Okay. And go ahead and go through -10 - Patrick? 11 MR. DOSTINE: Yeah, Mr. Chair. I will 12 coordinate with Mr. Flaten after the meeting. If you 13 could forward to me the agreement that council approved as 14 well as any other supporting documents, and then I'll make 15 sure I provide for the board members the background 16 information on what came out at council tonight. 17 MR. FLATEN: Okay. If you've got a few minutes 18 before you go I'll make you copies. 19 MR. DOSTINE: Okay. 20 MR. FLATEN: Take it with you. 21 MR. DOSTINE: Sounds good. 2.2 MR. SYKES: I certainly don't want to get in the 23 way of progress and the idea of development --24 MR. FLATEN: I understand. 25 MR. SYKES: -- and if we're truly doing

1 something beneficial to veterans, I would love to see 2 something like that happen. I just hope --MR. FLATEN: No, I understand. 3 4 MR. SYKES: -- you know, want to make sure it 5 gets done right. 6 MR. FLATEN: If I was in your position I'd be 7 asking the same questions. MR. SYKES: Okay. 8 9 MR. FLATEN: So I agree. 10 MR. DOSTINE: And then Mr. Chair, my question is 11 would you want me to pursue with Angela Dempkowski at 12 treasury a special meeting date and time? 13 MR. SYKES: Well, my only concern there is we'd like to be able to have a chance to sort of review and see 14 if there's additional questions or anything beforehand. 15 16 MR. DOSTINE: Sure. 17 MR. SYKES: But yeah, definitely, you know, once 18 we have been given a copy of this information and had a 19 chance to sort of digest it or see if we have any other 20 questions, and then plan on sending out something. MR. DOSTINE: Okay, so the first thing I'll do 21 2.2 is get the background information, what comes out of 23 council, and forward it to you guys for your review, and 24 then we'll look to the prospects of a special meeting. 25 MR. SYKES: Right.

1 MR. DOSTINE: Okay. 2 MR. SYKES: And so maybe you can sort of inquire with each of us if we're ready to set up --3 4 MR. DOSTINE: Yep. Yep. 5 MR. SYKES: -- a special meeting. 6 MR. DOSTINE: Yep. 7 MR. FLATEN: Okay. Thank you. MR. SYKES: Thank you. 8 9 Any further public comment? 10 MR. DOSTINE: Yeah, Mr. Chair. We have one 11 request from Ms. Linda Lozo. 12 MS. LOZO: Good morning. 13 MR. SYKES: Good morning. 14 MS. LOZO: My name is Linda Lozo. 15 I just want to take this time to tell Dave, 16 thank you for the time you put into the city. He was a 17 hard worker. I'm going to miss him, and thank you, and to 18 congratulate Tim on his new position. I've seen Dave --19 Tim in action, and he is a hard, honest worker, and I hope 20 he stays that way. I like to see the city move forward. I get tired of we're trying to make a step forward and we 21 2.2 get pushed back, you know, three or four, so this new 23 housing, I'm planning on being here to the council meeting 24 tonight. I would like to see it progress because we do 25 need to improve Ecorse, and we're trying, and it seems

1 like every time we try we get pushed back. So good luck 2 tonight. And Tim, good luck on your position. And Dave, thank you for all of the time you've put in. Thank you. 3 4 MR. SYKES: Thank you. 5 MR. DOSTINE: Mr. Chair, that concludes requests 6 for public comment. 7 MR. SYKES: All right. So we'll move on to board comment. 8 9 MS. BROPHY: Sure. I'll just echo what Ms. Lozo 10 said. Thank you, Dave, for your service. I can't believe 11 it's been almost a year maybe. 12 MR. FLATEN: You know, and I told the mayor it 13 was the longest 90 days I've ever spent. 14 MS. BROPHY: Yeah, I thought it was supposed to 15 be short term. So. 16 MR. FLATEN: It's been a pleasure. I've worked 17 with great people, and these people really want to do the 18 best for their city, and it's nice to see that they --19 they know there's a struggle, but they are struggling to 20 work through it, and that's -- it's a good thing. MR. SYKES: I think that Ecorse is a better 21 22 place for you having worked here for the last almost a 23 year. 24 MR. FLATEN: Got a lot of good people here. 25 MR. SYKES: Yeah.

1 Okay, so -- do you have any comments? 2 I just have one comment, and really it's to respond, unfortunately I don't think the person that had a 3 4 comment at the last meeting is here, but I was -- during public comments we were asked when it was that the RTAB 5 6 would be disbanded and control moved back over to the 7 city, and I said that we would take a look at that. And so for the record, I'll say that the last RTAB meeting 8 9 during public comments the question was asked, "What does 10 the city have to achieve to no longer be under RTAB 11 oversight?" 12 So there is criteria in Public Act 436 of 2012, 13 and the Act is posted on the treasury's website. There's relevant information that's on the website where 14

evaluation of city progress is discussed so that the city can move towards full local control. But it's also important to note that it's only the government, or governor that can end receivership and return local control to the unit.
So with that, I'll -- adjournment?
MR. BOVITZ: Move to adjourn.

MR. SYKES: Move to adjourn.
MS. BROPHY: Support.
MR. SYKES: All those in favor say aye.
MS. BROPHY: Aye.
