the event that the TIFA funds were unable to subsidize the expense to use general fund moneys to do this. Once everything came together, we discovered that the amount originally approved, authorized by this Board for the attorney fees, \$3,500, was, in fact, incurred by the TIFA Board. We also learned around that time that the city's audit demonstrated that we had approximately a \$200,000 fund balance from the year-end of June 30 of 2013, which was unanticipated, meaning that the City's contribution to the TIFA fund could be reduced by \$200,000 for the current fiscal year.

From the Emergency Manager's '14/'15 budget,
there were six funds with anticipated surpluses, there
are now two. The Emergency Manager had anticipated
seven deficit funds to occur on an annual deficit
during the year, the city now anticipates ten. And the
number of budgets without change or number of funds
without change went from seven to nine. This gives me
pause in looking at this, as the City is shifting
towards a greater number of funds which will incur
annual deficits.
Further examination then looked at, on a
fund-by-fund basis, how much of the current City's
'14/'15 budget, how much annual deficit is anticipated

The City now has ten funds with annual deficits anticipated for '14/'15, including the general fund, approximately 363,000 of deficit; the Cable Fund, Major streets, Senior Activities, the Drain Fund, Brownfield, Capital Improvement, Drug Enforcement, Parking and Insurance. Some of these funds may naturally incur annual deficits. Some of them may have a fund balance for use in those areas. But, in general, when we're seeing ten or one-half of the City's funds incurring annual deficits, this should give us pause.

Looking at how much fund balance is available, these ten different funds which are anticipated to incur just shy of \$5.3 million of annual deficits, just in one year, they have a combined \$19.4 million of fund balance, most of which is in the parking Fund, going into a greater level of detail page 22

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SR140618.txt examining what major categories of expenditures and revenues shifted. And as part of the analysis I looked for large dollar amounts and large percentages, anything more than a ten percent shift, anything more than a hundred thousand dollars of change between the emergency manager's original budget and the City's most current budget. The City's anticipating other revenues to increase by 14 percent or 132,000. It's anticipating 27 Public Works expenditures to increase by 138,000 or more than ten percent. Community Economic Development has an anticipated increase of over 850,000 or 251 percent. 4 Overall, the General Fund's expenditures are 5 anticipated increase \$1,596,000 compared to the EM's 6 original '14/'15 budget. Other funds which have -- or 7 which have significant increases: Major Streets, 8 \$820,000, 32.8 percent; the Capital Improvement Fund, 9 \$625,000, 104 percent; and the Insurance Fund has a 10 decrease in revenue of 431,000 or 30 percent.

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Because of these very significant changes from the EM's budget and the apparent significant increases in expenditures, I further looked at, in a little bit more detail, are there enough small revenue increases to offset some of this. Total, in the General Fund from the EM's budget to the current City budget, it's anticipated that the City will generate \$735,000 more in revenues, a 2.47 percent increase. But that is substantially more than offset by the

21 .	\$1,595,000 worth of expenditure increases, an increase
22	of 5.56 percent. In essence the City is spending \$2
23	for every \$1 of additional revenue it's garnishing.

10	items that we are proposing in the budget amendment are
11	proposed decreases in the level of expenditures that
12	the City the Emergency Manager had budgeted before
13	he left.
14	And I'll point out, for example, one of the
15	contracts that we were able to reduce by a hundred
16	thousand dollars, the SARCOM contract. And there are
17	other telephones, the telephone expenditures are
18	proposed to be decreased by \$11,000, based on the new
19	contract we signed with AT&T.
20	The other major savings that we are proposing
21.	is to the transfer to the court. We are decreasing
22	or proposing to decrease that by \$167,000. And
23	overall overall, the proposed increase or
24	revenues, the expenditures, at least in my documents,
25	are not are not showing a major deficiency. Those
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are well thought out, well documented or we have tried to -- to document the proposed increases.

And we do have another major item for the General Fund that -- that has not made its way through the budget amendment yet and that is the increase or I do -- I believe we have the increase in the pension payment to the police and fire pension for 2014/15.

We are -- the Emergency Manager budgets -- budget, 8 original budget, had a \$2 million to be made. And 9 based on the reports, the actuary reports that we have 10 received, that payment should be 300 -- \$2,328,000. Now, when I was first given the draft of the budget for consideration by both the City Administrator and the Financial Director, of course that budget reflected the fact that there were some structural deficits that begin to kick in for the 2015/116 years for matters that were only temporarily resolved by the departure of the Emergency Manager solutions. And that budget had a \$13 million deficit.

Now, that was something that, by working with the City Administrator, the Council and others, that we were -- we had to make certain assumptions in order to

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achieve a balanced budget because that was what I was determined to do in terms of my obligation. And that required certain assumptions of settlements and, because there was no \$13 million increase in revenue that I could find and there's certainly not \$13 million worth of expenses that we could cut, as we had been determined to balance this budget.

so that was what we did and we did come up with a total of a balanced budget and including a fund balance, which was going to be increased from the end of the 2013/'14 year, which I thought was a great

We started back in 21 February, telling Council we wanted you to work with us 22 in setting goals -- having a goal-setting session and 23 we were receptive all along to this. 24 so now if we get to the end of this process, 25 48 after doing all that, and then find out there was some 1 expectations of how fund balances were organized, then 2 that's something we should have known at the beginning, 3 you know. 4 And that's one of the things that I addressed 5 to the TAB early on is, you know, if we're going to 6 call best practices, then we got to know what the 7 benchmarks are from the beginning, not after the fact, 8 after we had gone through the whole process and now you 9 say, "Well, we really meant for you to do this instead 10 of what this actually says in the Charter." so that's 11 my one misgiving to that. 12 And I would ask that -- for your 13 consideration that there be time for discussion of 14 that. We will have discussion after the fact now, 1.5 we'll go back and revisit, according to the analysis 16 that's been done. But, you know, we were looking at 17

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that with the budget that we have before us.

will go from there. 21 The other items here I will take a little 22 less time on, just to let you know, the Master Plan 23 that we are visiting, it was last -- rewritten in 2008, 24 it was due to be revised. I decided to make this an 25

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open process in which we got a lot of community engagement, There's been a paradigm shift in Pontiac's economic situation since that last Master Plan was re-written. We had a very engaging process, had a steering committee that was very voluntarily committed to looking at the City's goals in terms of livability place, making all the things now that we want to have as we rediscover Pontiac and discover that in the spirit that we talked about.

And we had over 20 visioning sessions in which we took that master plan concept out to the community to see how they wanted to re-purpose buildings, how they wanted us to deal with situations of blight but also rehabbing and renovating and bringing the new spirit and the new developments to Pontiac. And, certainly, economic development is certainly one of the key areas that we worked with in terms of my administration.

And that was approved by the Planning Commission, will be taken out and will certainly help to guide future land use in Pontiac. And the kind of land we have available and properties is certainly one of the resources that we have in Pontiac that makes us unique in Oakland County right now. So we wanted to make sure we avail ourselves of having that be a clear Page 42

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1	part of our package of economic development in the
2	city.
3	We actually are starting to work now, which
4	is a third item on the economic development grant for
5	the economic recovery plan for Pontiac that's certainly
6	going to help with our budgets as we go forward, as we
7	develop that plan that's being done in conjunction with
8 -	oakland County, we have developed a steering committee
9	for that. I am going to be co-chair along with
10	Dan Hunter, who is the Oakland County Deputy Director
11	and also Director of Economic Development and Community
12	Affairs for Oakland County. So we look forward to that
13	process.
14	we're going to have a large stakeholder group
15	representing all the stakeholder entitles that I
16	mentioned there. And I won't go further into that
17	process. But that is underway, in terms of blight

Analyst, Lisa Rawls, resigned. That's the reason for the temporary hire in the Treasurer's Office to help with processing. Speaking with Mr. Nazarko and knowing that we have a huge income tax possibility, in terms of additional revenue to the City sitting in front of us, page 46

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Mr. Nazarko and I have discussed the matter and have decided that we'd like to redefine the position of Treasury Analyst and make it more of an income tax Administrator and that person would be responsible for initiating court action against the various individuals who are in -- not in compliance with the City's Income Tax Ordinance and representing the City in court.

That is some -- that is a duty that is not one of the responsibilities of our current Income Tax

vendor. So we are anxiously awaiting the State's tapes from the Treasury Department. We were hoping for five years. They have since advised us that we'll only be able to go back three years, in terms of the tapes. And as soon as those tapes come in, we'll have an idea as to how large of a potential amount of money is owed to the city of Pontiac. And then we'll be able to make an educated determination as to how much will actually be collectible.

so the recreation, redesign of that position, will probably be before this Board next month so that we can begin advertising with an appropriate job description. We're hoping to use the salary of the Treasury Analyst and we also have set aside in the budget a hundred thousand dollars for delinquent income tax collections, offset by a hundred thousand dollars in revenues from that program.

so, using a combination of those funds, hopefully we'll be able to track someone who is qualified for that type of work.

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21	sr140618.txt Regarding the current year finances, we
22	received, I guess you can say, a windfall from the
23	County Treasurer, in that they did not charge us back
24	the \$700,000 in property tax charge-backs that we were
25	anticipating but rather they charged us back only
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1	\$13,000. So that is good news, in terms of additional
2	revenue because we just netted out for the city of
3	Pontiac. That was not anticipated.
4	We're hoping that this trend continues in
- 5	future fiscal years, however being conservative as we
6	are, in terms of revenue estimates, we need to see a
7	pattern of this. So we are still anticipating

9 .	charge-back for next fiscal year. Hopefully, this
