

Governor Whitmer has worked to ensure Michigan's service members, veterans, and their families have the opportunities and support they need to succeed. The administration has boosted outreach to veterans, ensuring they and their families have affordable healthcare, attainable housing, and paths to education and good-paying jobs.

### Recognizing Michigan's servicemembers, veterans, and military families

- Appointed over 100 active military and veterans to numerous statewide boards and commissions to ensure their voices are heard.
- Appointed by President Biden to the Council of Governors to work with federal officials on defense, National Guard, disaster response, and other security issues.
- <u>Signed</u> legislation designating February 1 as "Blue Star Mothers Day"
- Signed legislation expanding eligibility of the Disabled Veteran registration plate.
- <u>Created</u> a "woman veteran" special license plate, increasing recognition for women veterans and allowing them to proudly display their service.

### Standing up for Selfridge

- <u>Pushed</u> for a new fighter mission and <u>funding</u> at Selfridge Air National Guard Base in Macomb County and secured resources to <u>modernize</u> and <u>improve the base</u>.
- <u>Signed a budget</u> investing \$5 million to protect and grow Michigan's cutting-edge defense and homeland security industry and expand R&D opportunities.
- Announced the Unmanned Triple Challenge, a competition to drive innovation in autonomous drone technology.

# Securing paths to opportunity and career advancement

- Signed <u>bipartisan bills</u> to make it easier for military service members, veterans, and their families to receive a professional license within the state.
- Signed <u>bipartisan bills</u> expanding the Michigan National Guard State Tuition Assistance Program, lowering the cost of education for military families.
- Announced a partnership between the Michigan National Guard (MING) and Michigan Helmets to Hardhats, a program
  connecting veterans to skill-training opportunities and careers in the construction trades.
- Reinvigorated the Michigan <u>Veteran Friendly Schools Program</u>, to highlight Michigan educational institutions that support the needs of military-connected students.

## Providing services for veterans, servicemembers, and military families

- Consistently increased funding for <u>veteran's services organizations</u> and officers.
- <u>Signed bipartisan budgets</u> consistently investing in suicide prevention outreach for service members, veterans, and their families.
- Launched the "She is a Veteran" campaign to reach 47,000 women veterans and created Check on MIVet, serving 500+
  families requesting a check-in on their loved ones.
- Received the state's fourth <u>Abraham Lincoln Pillar Award</u> from the VA, recognizing outstanding programs that support veterans.
- Signed legislation expanding voting rights for military members and families serving overseas.
- <u>Eliminated the fee</u> associated with having a veteran-designated license plate.
- Lowered costs and property taxes for disabled veterans and their families.
- Announced expansion of child care benefits for military families in Michigan.
- <u>Delivered</u> \$2.5 million in grants to nonprofits reducing veteran homelessness.

### Investing in facilities for veterans and servicemembers

- Fully funded the construction of a new veteran's home in Marquette and celebrated the opening of <u>two new Michigan Veterans Home facilities</u> in Grand Rapids and Chesterfield Township.
- Invested in the modernization of all Michigan National Guard armories to accommodate female service members.
- Opened the <u>Kelly Johnson Joint All Domain Innovation Center</u> for military members, government, and industry professionals to research and collaborate.
- Stood up the <u>National All-Domain Warfighting Center</u> at Camp Grayling and Alpena Combat Readiness Training Center.
- Secured funding for a new <u>state veterans cemetery</u> in the Northern lower peninsula and to evaluate the need for a state veterans cemetery in northern Michigan.
- Hosted over 17,000 military and coalition forces between 2019 and 2022.
