

As a former prosecutor, public safety is a core issue for Governor Whitmer. She has worked closely with law enforcement officers and community organizations to bring down crime and ensure people feel safe in their neighborhoods.

Made investments to keep communities safe

- Invested over \$1.6 billion into public safety programs across 6 bipartisan budgets to assist police, firefighters, EMTs, and public safety departments with training, equipment, recruitment, retention, and support.
- Signed <u>commonsense gun violence prevention legislation</u> establishing universal background checks, safe storage requirements, and <u>extreme risk protection orders</u>.
- Established Gun Violence Prevention Task Force to save lives, reduce violence.
- Signed bipartisan legislation to keep guns out of the hands of criminals.
- Funded and <u>expanded</u> the <u>Office of Community Violence Intervention</u>, using evidence-based solutions to tackle the root causes of community violence.
- Launched <u>Operation Safe Neighborhoods</u> to reduce gun violence by getting more than <u>800</u> illegal guns off the street before they could be used in the commission of a crime.
- Established a \$75 million new Revenue Sharing Trust Fund to continue support for counties, cities, villages, and townships across the state.
- <u>Established</u> a \$75 million new Public Safety and Violence Prevention Fund to provide cities, villages, and townships with additional resources for police services and to support community violence intervention efforts.
- Signed a bill to increase road patrol funding by 50%, putting more officers on the road.
- Funded <u>gun violence prevention research</u> and signed an <u>executive directive</u> to more effectively use federal and state resources to reduce crime and gun violence.
- Established <u>Jobs Court</u>, a court diversion program to put hundreds of Michiganders accused of low-level, nonviolent offenses in good-paying jobs.
- Signed legislation to <u>protect Michigan students at schools, colleges, and universities</u> from abuse and keep communities safe.
- <u>Signed a budget</u> delivering lifecycle upgrades to the state's safety communication system, grants for local prosecutors, firearm injury and violence prevention grants.
- <u>Signed legislation</u> to help communities retain police officers.
- <u>Signed bipartisan</u> legislation to support crime victims and strengthen privacy.
- <u>Signed legislation</u> equipping school buses with camera systems that track failures to stop and keep kids safe.
- <u>Signed legislation</u> combatting human trafficking in Michigan by updating the process to gather and use evidence against perpetrators.
- Required information on the safe storage of firearms to be distributed to parents of students.
- <u>Proposed budget</u> expanding opioid recovery efforts, investing in victim support services for over 200,000 victims of crime, putting more Michigan State Police troopers on the street, and helping local governments hire, train, and retain local first responders to improve public safety, drive down crime, and keep families safe.

Improved relationships between the public and law enforcement

- Developed <u>a plan to strengthen police-community relations</u> and the Bridges to BLUE Build Listen Unite Engage to provide the department with an outside perspective.
- Directed the <u>Michigan Commission on Law Enforcement Standards</u> to provide guidance to law enforcement agencies on new laws and issues facing the communities they protect. <u>Delivered</u> \$18.2 million to support in service training for over 18,300 officers.
- Announced <u>new protocols</u> so EMS responders can carry emergency contraception and are prepared to work with sexual assault survivors.
- Signed a <u>package of bills</u> to provide behavioral health crisis grants to local governments and expand community-based mobile crisis intervention services.
- Signed <u>bills</u> increasing compensation and mental health resources for victims.
- Signed a bill guaranteeing <u>access to college tuition grants</u> for the children of police and firefighters who lost their lives on the line of duty in Michigan.
- <u>Signed a budget</u> investing in public safety service providers, community-based solutions, and victim services across the state.

Governor Whitmer has worked across the aisle to enact historic criminal justice reform. She will work with anyone to reduce recidivism, expand opportunity, and put more Michiganders on paths to a brighter future.

Reforming criminal justice

- Signed <u>Clean Slate bills</u> making hundreds of thousands of Michiganders eligible for automatic set aside of criminal records, expanding their opportunities for jobs and housing. Invested millions of dollars to assist returning citizens with expungement.
- Signed <u>Clean Slate For Kids</u> creating a process to automatically expunge juvenile records for those who don't commit future offenses.
- Signed Raise the Age ensuring anyone under 18 is treated as a minor in juvenile court and receives rehabilitation services in the juvenile justice system to reduce recidivism.
- Launched the <u>Task Force on Juvenile Justice Reform</u> to improve the juvenile justice system <u>and proposed \$8.5 million</u> to implement the task force's recommendations.
- Signed <u>Juvenile Justice Reform</u> bills investing in diversion and re-entry services to better position Michigan youth for successful adulthoods.
- Signed the <u>Good Moral Character</u> package expanding opportunities for Michiganders post-conviction or post-judgment.
- Signed a <u>civil asset forfeiture</u> package increasing property protections for individuals who have not been convicted of a crime.
- Signed <u>a bill</u> allowing individuals who committed a drug-related offense, or have outstanding warrants for such offenses, to access benefits like SNAP.
- Established <u>Jobs Court</u>, a court diversion program to put hundreds of Michiganders accused of low-level, nonviolent offenses in good-paying jobs.
- <u>Created Family Treatment Court</u> expanding access to drug treatment options, mental health resources, and support programs to help keep families together.
- <u>Signed a budget</u> helping local trial courts support effective and fair assistance of counsel for indigent criminal defendants across the state.
- Invested in <u>community jail diversion programs</u> to divert individuals with mental illness, substance abuse disorders, or disabilities from custody and provide support services.
- Established a policy that will guarantee critical medical resources and support to Department of Corrections' <u>pregnant and post-partum prisoners and their newborns</u>.
- Launched the <u>Task Force on Jail and Pretrial Incarceration</u> to expand alternatives to jail and improve the effectiveness of the front end of Michigan's justice system.
- Secured \$150 million for Statewide Judicial Case Management to make court operations more efficient. Signed a
 budget with more than \$500 million for our courts, law enforcement, and communities.
- Invested <u>nearly \$15 million</u> to reduce the cost of prisoner telephone charges, promoting their successful rehabilitation and reentry in society.

Building relationships between the public and law enforcement

- Secured \$15+ million to fund community violence intervention programs, using evidence-based solutions to tackle the root causes of community violence.
- Made Michigan a leader in police <u>transparency and accountability</u> with public access to force and traffic stop data and department policies and training requirements.
- Signed a <u>package of bills</u> to provide behavioral health crisis response grants to local governments and expand community-based mobile crisis intervention services.
- Invested <u>millions</u> to expand the use of body cameras, provide de-escalation trainings and other professional development and training efforts for law enforcement.
