Fostering economic growth in rural communities

- <u>Created the Office of Rural Development</u> to address the unique challenges that face rural communities.
- Signed bills to <u>boost the food and agriculture industry</u> by ensuring Michigan food and agriculture businesses can export their products to other nations.
- Made infrastructure <u>investments to support the agriculture economy</u> in Ottawa and Muskegon counties, generating \$187 million in investment and supporting 145 jobs.
- Signed <u>budgets</u> that invested more than \$50 million in <u>food and agriculture economic development</u> projects and funded community revitalization and placemaking grants to spur economic growth in rural communities.
- Launched a 'Buy Michigan' marketing campaign to highlight Michigan growers and agricultural products.
- Invested over \$53 million in Michigan State University's dairy center and greenhouses.
- <u>Opened</u> the hemp market to Michigan's producers, bringing a new commodity to Michigan's diverse agricultural market.
- <u>Requested federal relief</u> and signed a bill authorizing <u>\$15M in loans for farmers</u> reeling from crop loss and damage during one of the rainiest years in state history.
- Invested \$15 million into the <u>Michigan Agricultural Safety Grant Program</u> and <u>Small Farm Safety Grant</u> <u>Programs</u> to support farmers and food processors during COVID-19.

Rebuilding our infrastructure

- Leveraged over \$900 million through federal investments, the <u>Connecting Michigan Grant program</u>, and the <u>Building Michigan Together Plan</u>, to connect more families and small businesses to fast, reliable expand high-speed internet that meets their needs. and access to internet-capable devices for Michigan families.
- Signed the <u>Broadband Expansion Act of Michigan</u> a grant program to fill internet access gaps in underserved communities.
- Created the <u>Michigan High-Speed Internet Office</u> to coordinate the state's high-speed internet work and align the work with economic development opportunities across the state.

- Since Governor Whitmer took office through the end of this year, Michigan fill fix over 16,000 lane miles of road and 1,200 bridges, supporting over 89,000 jobs.
- Launched the <u>Rebuilding Michigan Plan</u>, a \$3.5 billion bond plan that expands hundreds of major new road projects, building up our state highways and bridges over the next 5 years, without an increase at the pump.
- Invested over \$4 billion to upgrade drinking water, stormwater, and wastewater facilities across the state, supporting 57,000 jobs.
- Invested the largest amount in history to reduce pollution in the Great Lakes and increased funding to <u>local</u> <u>conservation districts</u> and <u>farmers</u> for implementation of conservation practices.
- Signed the Building Michigan Together Plan, which invests:
 - Over \$2 billion, supporting 27,000 jobs to remove lead service lines, reduce contaminants, build water infrastructure, and more.
 - \$450 million in state and community parks, trails, and recreation facilities.
 - \$316 million into roads and bridges.
 - \$249 million to expand access to reliable high-speed internet
 - \$100 million to expand access to affordable, attainable housing.
- Released Michigan's first <u>Statewide Housing Plan</u> to leverage public and private investment in housing and ensure the state has a plan to address the housing shortage.
- Created the <u>Food and Agricultural Housing Task Force</u> to address the impediment housing has had on rural economic development.

Expanding access to childcare, education, and skills

- Put Michigan students first with <u>\$9,150 per student</u> funding, the highest ever state funding without raising taxes.
- <u>Closed the funding gap</u> between schools, ensuring every school district has the same baseline funding.
- Dedicated more state resources to students with the highest needs, including increased funding for at-risk and special education in the FY <u>20</u>, <u>21</u>, <u>22</u>, and <u>23</u> budgets.
- Kept childcare businesses open and care affordable for families by <u>signing</u> a record \$1.4 billion investment in federal childcare funding.
- Created and fully funded the bipartisan <u>Michigan Reconnect</u> and <u>Futures for Frontliners</u> programs to provide a tuition-free path to a degree or skill certificate for Michiganders ages 25 and up. 170,000+ Michiganders have already applied.
- Created the <u>Michigan Achievement Scholarship</u> to make college more affordable for high school graduates. Starting with the class of 2023, students will be eligible for an annual scholarship worth up to \$5,500 depending on where they go to college and family need.

Expanding access to health services

- Extended <u>Healthy Michigan</u> to over 1 million people.
- Established the <u>Michigan Opioids Task Force</u>, secured <u>\$80 million in federal funding</u> to combat the opioid crisis, and supported Attorney General Nessel's work to sue major opioid distributors and win a <u>historic \$800 million settlement</u>.
- Secured <u>funding to respond to mental stress</u> and fatigue of Michigan farmers and agricultural workers and their families.
- Expanded access to telemedicine and signed bipartisan legislation requiring all insurers to cover telehealth.
- Secured millions to <u>support rural health care workers</u>, <u>employees and hospitals</u> with staffing shortages and COVID-19 <u>testing and mitigation</u>.
- Secured funding to <u>respond to mental stress</u> and fatigue of Michigan farmers and agricultural workers and their families.
