



Governor Whitmer is dedicated to helping working people thrive. She has delivered for unions and workers' rights. Recognizing Michigan workers

- Appointed more than 200 union members to boards, commissions, and full-time positions.
- Reinstated <u>prevailing wage</u> for all state contractors and subcontractors, ensuring working people are treated with dignity, and the state has highly-skilled laborers to build up roads, bridges, pipes, high-speed internet, and more.
- Recognized the rights, struggles, and contributions of Michigan workers, including <u>Worker's Memorial Day</u>, <u>Nurses Week</u>, <u>Professional Trades Month</u>, <u>Workplace Rights Week</u>, <u>Teacher Appreciation Week</u>, and <u>Essential</u> <u>Worker Appreciation Day</u>.

Supporting good-paying jobs

- Announced nearly 25,000 good-paying auto jobs and counting, including the first auto plant in Detroit in nearly 30 years.
- Secured new investments in union <u>training and pre-apprenticeship</u> programs.
- Established and <u>fully funded</u> programs to provide thousands of Michiganders access to tuition-free higher education or skills training, leading to a high-skill, good-paying job.
 - <u>Michigan Reconnect</u>, a program that pays tuition of Michiganders 25 and up to pursue an associate degree or earn a skills certificate in high-demand careers.
 - <u>Futures for Frontliners</u>, a program that provides a tuition-free path to postsecondary education or skills training for Michiganders who served on the frontlines of the pandemic.
- Invested in <u>Going Pro</u> to help businesses up-skill in-house talent and secured resources for talent retention and expansion in key industries.
- Eliminated <u>barriers to employment</u> for low-income Michiganders.

Fighting for Michigan workers

- Called on the legislature to deliver Hero Pay for frontline workers.
- Delivered \$2 per hour wage increase for direct care workers, increased it to \$2.35 per hour and made it permanent in the FY 2022 budget.
- Proposed a <u>rollback of Michigan's retirement tax</u> to save half a million households an average of \$1,000 a year for Michigan retirees.
- Signed an executive directive to <u>fight payroll fraud</u>, ensuring companies can't misclassify their employees to deny them pay and benefits. Incentivized the state to increase the number of contracts awarded to companies that create good-paying jobs in Michigan and are good stewards of the state.
- Called on the legislature to pass HB 4175 and 4176 which would repeal of "Right to Work."
- Created a <u>Nursing Home Workforce Stabilization Council</u> to promote living wages and benefits and worked to <u>reinstate the practical exam</u> for plumbers.
- Ensured <u>employees were protected from COVID-19</u> in the workplace by establishing enhanced MIOSHA protections. Provided employers education on the rules and offered them as many tools as they needed to help keep workers safe.

Rebuilding our infrastructure

- During Governor Whitmer's first term, Michigan will fix more than 16,000 lane miles of road and 1,200 bridges, supporting over 89,000 jobs.
- Launched the <u>Rebuilding Michigan Plan</u>, a \$3.5 billion bond plan that expands hundreds of major new road projects, building up our state highways and bridges over the next 5 years, without an increase at the pump.
- Launched MI Clean Water, and invested over \$2 billion to upgrade drinking water, stormwater, and wastewater facilities across the state, supporting 30,000 jobs.
- Signed the <u>Building Michigan Together Plan</u>, which invests:
 - Over \$2 billion, supporting 27,000 jobs to remove lead service lines, reduce toxic contaminants like PFAS, rebuild wastewater and sewer infrastructure, provide clean water for schools and childcare centers, and so much more.
 - \$316 million into roads and bridges and \$66 million into pump station generators to keep highways clear during severe storms.
 - \$100 million to expand access to <u>affordable, attainable housing</u>, help close equity gaps, and create vibrant communities in urban areas.
- Signed an <u>FY 2023 budget</u> that improved local rail crossings and funded key infrastructure projects in every region.
- Invested more than \$45 million in electric vehicle charging infrastructure.
- Signed an executive directive to streamline and improve permitting for infrastructure projects.
- Signed four executive directives and launched the <u>Michigan Infrastructure Office</u> readying Michigan to use incoming resources from the bipartisan Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act. These directives put Michigan workers and businesses first while fixing the damn <u>roads and bridges</u>, connecting Michiganders to <u>high-speed internet</u>, replacing <u>lead service lines</u>, and building more <u>electric vehicle chargers</u>.

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
