

Capitol Region's Federal Funding Wins

A look at the impact of the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law and Inflation Reduction Act on the Great Lakes State

Since the passage of the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law and Inflation Reduction Act, Michigan has secured billions in both apportioned and competitive funding, \$13.5 Billion from more than 1000 awarded funding applications as of August 2024. These federally selected projects will help Michigan rebuild, repair, and reimagine our infrastructure, including everything from roads and bridges to broadband expansion and clean energy. See below for some of the largest projects and funding streams Michigan's Capitol Region has secured so far.

Broadband Equity and Access Program - \$1,559,362,479 (Regional Share TBD*)

Led by the Michigan High Speed Internet Office, this funding will be deployed with the goal of bringing high speed internet to 1.2 million unserved/underserved Michigan households and closing the digital divide.

MSU National Laboratory Infrastructure - \$31,840,000

<u>Funding to significantly expand</u> the scientific and production capabilities of the university's Free Rare Isotope Beam Facility (FRIB) and support MSU's continued contributions to the Office of Science National Laboratories.

<u>Urbanized Area Formula Grants: Capitol Region - \$20,494,058</u>

These grants make federal resources available for urban areas to invest in <u>building and planning transportation projects</u>. Funding goes towards project costs, engineering design, job access, and operating expenses, helping build strong transportation networks across the region.

<u>City of Ovid - Drinking Water Lead Service Lines Replacement - \$9,820,000</u>

This funding assists the city of Ovid's efforts to <u>replace lead service lines</u> for drinking water, leading to vital protection of public health and a significant reduction of lead in drinking water.

Michigan Capitol Area Regional EV Charging Gateway Initiative - \$8,000,000

This Charging and Fueling Infrastructure grant will support the <u>development of EV charging hubs</u> throughout the Capitol region, particularly in Downtown Lansing and university hotspots.

<u>Airport Infrastructure Grants: Capitol Region - \$7,119,676</u>

Funding for <u>airport improvements</u> such as terminal expansions, baggage system upgrades, and runway safety enhancements, helping strengthen safety and improve efficiency for travelers.

<u>Lansing Electric School Bus Project - \$5,925,000</u>

Allotted from nearly \$900 million invested in Clean School Bus Programs nationwide, this funding will help the Lansing school district purchase <u>new electric and clean school buses</u>. The program provides safer and cleaner rides while decreasing costs, improving air quality by reducing diesel fumes, and safeguarding student health.

Restoring Roots: Greater Lansing Urban & Community Forestry Program - \$5,000,000

This project will prioritize, preserve, and grow <u>Greater Lansing's tree canopy</u>, prioritizing disadvantaged neighborhoods. The Greater Lansing project will undertake tree planting and maintenance, stakeholder engagement, education and outreach, workforce training, educational pathways, and utilization.

Bus and Bus Facilities Formula Grants: Capitol Region - \$1,525,024

These grants provide federal resources to replace, rehabilitate, purchase and construct bus-related facilities, including technological changes to modify low or no emission vehicles or facilities.
