

Michigan's Federal Funding Wins

A look at the impact of the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law and Inflation Reduction Act on the Great Lakes State

\$13.5 Billion in federal funds secured as of August 2024

1060 funding applications awarded to Michigan stakeholders

Since the passage of the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law and Inflation Reduction Act, Michigan has secured billions in both apportioned and competitive funding. These federally selected projects will help Michigan rebuild, repair, and reimagine our infrastructure, including everything from roads and bridges to broadband expansion and clean energy. See below for some of the largest projects and funding streams Michigan has secured so far.

Broadband Equity and Access Program - \$1,559,362,479

Led by the <u>Michigan High Speed Internet Office</u>, this funding will be deployed with the goal of bringing high speed internet to 1.2 million unserved/underserved Michigan households and closing the digital divide.

Palisades Nuclear Plant - \$1,520,000,000

Holtec International, with the support of the State of Michigan, <u>has secured financing</u> to restart the Palisades Nuclear Plant and bring 800MW of zero-emission clean power back online – enough to power more than 800,000 homes.

National Highway Performance Program - \$2,285,544,215

Funding to improve the condition of Michigan's highways, the construction of new facilities on highway system, and to support progress towards the goals outlined in <u>Michigan's transportation asset management plan</u>.

Sault Ste. Marie Lock Megaproject - \$730,445,000

This funding enables the construction of <u>a new lock</u> at the Soo. Built in the footprint of the existing Sabin Lock, this facility will eliminate the weakest link in our nation's iron ore supply chain and shore up the \$500b dollar industry.

Weatherization Assistance Program - \$183,184,905

Administered by the Michigan State Housing Development Authority, <u>this program</u> provides energy conservation and related health & safety services for eligible low-income households at no cost to the resident.

Solar for All Program - \$156,120,000

Michigan's <u>Solar for All Program</u> is a statewide initiative that will deploy residential rooftop and community-serving solar projects to thousands of low-income and disadvantaged community (LIDAC) households across the state.

I-375 Community Reconnection Project - \$104,657,051

Through this <u>Reconnecting Communities Project</u>, the I-375 freeway in Detroit will be converted to a street-level boulevard. This solution considers safety, connectivity and operations while addressing existing and future transportation needs for all users.

Renewable Ready Communities Program - \$129,100,000

This funding will be used to help implement the MI Healthy Climate Plan's goal of reaching 60% renewable energy in Michigan by 2030 through the establishment of the Renewable Ready Communities Program.

MI Clean Water Grants - \$265,830,000

<u>MI Clean Water grants</u> have invested more than \$4 Billion since 2019 in upgrades to drinking water, stormwater, and wastewater facilities across the state, supporting over 57,000 jobs. These funds will further support this program.
