The Tribal High Priority Program has two types of grants: Priority Project grants which support TTP projects that haven't received funding and Emergency or Disaster Project grants which address damage to built infrastructure

Match funding requirement: 0%

High level requirements for Tribal High Priority Projects grant

The Tribal High Priority Projects grant requires a number of components, including relevant crash and weather data





Key Grant Application Components¹

- Federally recognized Tribes that receive less than \$1M annual allocation of statutory formula Tribal shares through Tribal Transit Program
- Application form signed by authorized Tribe official
- Applicant information
- Project description
- Safety information

- Cost estimate breakdown
- NTTFI data sheet showing route(s) and sections
- Official Tribal Action requesting project AND authority from Secretary of Interior to place project on TIP
- Crash data / other supporting documentation
- Cover sheet (if applying for construction funds)
- Strip map identifying proximity to elements to verify all weather access
