## Making record investments in childcare

- <u>Signed</u> a record \$1.4 billion in childcare funding to expand access to high-quality, affordable childcare by:
  - Strengthening existing childcare programs and opening more childcare businesses across the state.
  - Retaining and recruiting childcare professionals with \$1,000 bonuses and access to affordable college degrees and certificates.
  - Increasing childcare subsidy rates to better align state payments with the cost of providing high quality care.

## Expanding access to affordable early learning and care

- Expanded access to free preschool for <u>22,000 more four-year-olds</u> through Great Start Readiness Program and proposed grants to <u>open classrooms in more communities.</u>
- Expanded access to affordable childcare for <u>112,000 more children</u>. Families earning less than \$49,000 are eligible for free or low-cost childcare.
- Kept childcare providers open and serving kids:
  - Invested \$700 million through the <u>Child Care Stabilization Grant</u> to provide operational grants to <u>nearly 6,000</u> local childcare businesses.
  - Invested \$215 million to support over 7,000 childcare providers with emergency federal relief through the <a href="Child Care">Child Care</a> Relief Fund.
  - Signed a budget providing \$105 million in <u>funding for childcare businesses</u> that accept the childcare subsidy.
- Created <u>Disaster Relief Childcare Centers</u> to ensure essential workers had access to care and partnered with <u>Help Me</u> <u>Grow</u> to connect workers to open childcare programs.
- Launched pilots of the Tri-Share program to expand childcare access to more families in 59 counties.

## **Strengthening Michigan families**

- Led by example by enacting paid parental leave up to 12 weeks for state employees.
- Supported an expansion of the federal <u>Child Tax Credit for nearly 2 million Michigan families</u>.
